1.8	Subdivision 1. Establishment and authority. (a) The commissioner is authorized
1.9	to make grants from available appropriations to assist:
1.10	(1) counties;
1.11	(2) Indian tribes;
1.12	(3) children's collaboratives under section 124D.23 or 245.493; or
1.13	(4) mental health service providers.
1.14	(b) The following services are eligible for grants under this section:

Early childhood mental health consultation grants. (a) \$1,000,000 2.25 in fiscal year 2017 is appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of human 2.26 services for early childhood mental health consultation grants under Minnesota Statutes, 2.27 section 245.4889, subdivision 1, paragraph (b), clause (14). Grants under this section shall 2.28 be awarded proportionately among current grantees under Minnesota Statutes, section 2.29 245.4889, subdivision 1, paragraph (b), clause (9), based on the number of regions served 2.30 by a grantee. 2.31 (b) For purposes of the grants in paragraph (a), mental health consultation includes 2.32 staff training provided by a mental health professional with early childhood competency; 2.33 regular on-site consultation to staff serving high-risk and low-income families; and 2.34 referrals to clinical services for parents and children with mental health conditions. 2.35

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(c) This appropriation is added to the base.

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Subd. 2. Children's mental health grants. \$500,000 in fiscal year 2017 is
appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of human services for children's
mental health grants under Minnesota Statutes, section 245.4889, subdivision 1, paragraph
(b), clause (17), to promote and develop the capacity of mental health providers to
deliver evidence-based multigenerational treatments designed to increase supportive and
responsive caregiving by parents with serious mental illness, and to conduct an independent
evaluation of the effectiveness of these interventions. This is an ongoing appropriation.
