1.6	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.7	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 65B.472, is amended to read:
1.8	65B.472 TRANSPORTATION NETWORK FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY.
1.9	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) Unless a different meaning is expressly made applicable
1.10	the terms defined in paragraphs (b) through $\frac{g}{(p)}$ have the meanings given them for the
1.11	purposes of this ehapter section.
1.12	(b) A "Digital network" means any online-enabled application, software, website, or
1.13	system offered or utilized by a transportation network company that enables the
1.14	prearrangement of rides with transportation network company drivers.
1.15	(c) "Disability and income loss benefits" means compensation for 85 percent of the
1.16	injured person's loss of present and future gross income from inability to work proximately
1.17	caused by the nonfatal personal injury sustained.
1.18	(d) "P1," "P2," and "P3" have the meanings given in section 181C.01, subdivision 4.
1.19	(e) "Funeral and burial expenses" has the meaning given in section 65B.44, subdivision
1.20	<u>4.</u>
1.21	(f) "Medical expense benefit" has the meaning given in section 65B.44, subdivision 2,
1.22	except that medical expenses for rehabilitative services are not subject to section 65B.45.

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2.1	(g) "Personal injury" means a physical injury or mental impairment arising out of and
2.2	in the course of work and includes personal injury caused by occupational disease. A personal
2.3	injury is only covered if the injury occurs to a driver during the driver time periods. Physical
2.4	stimulus resulting in mental injury and mental stimulus resulting in physical injury shall
2.5	remain compensable.
2.6	(e) A (h) "Personal vehicle" means a vehicle that is used by a transportation network
2.7	company TNC driver in connection with providing a prearranged ride and is:
2.8	(1) owned, leased, or otherwise authorized for use by the transportation network company
2.9	driver; and
2.10	(2) not a taxicab, limousine, for-hire vehicle, or a private passenger vehicle driven by a
2.11	volunteer driver.
2.12	(d) A (i) "Prearranged ride" means the provision of transportation by a driver to a rider,
2.13	beginning when a driver accepts a ride requested by a rider through a digital network
2.14	controlled by a transportation network company, continuing while the driver transports a
2.15	requesting rider, and ending when the last requesting rider departs from the personal vehicle.
2.16	A prearranged ride does not include transportation provided using a taxicab, limousine, or
2.17	other for-hire vehicle.
2.18	(j) "Replacement services loss benefits" means all expenses reasonably incurred by or
2.19	on behalf of the nonfatally injured person in obtaining usual and necessary substitute services
2.20	in lieu of those that, had the injured person not been injured, the injured person would have
2.21	performed not for income but for direct personal benefit or for the benefit of the injured
2.22	person's household. If the nonfatally injured person normally, as a full-time responsibility,
2.23	provides care and maintenance of a home with or without children, the benefit to be provided
2.24	under this subdivision shall be the reasonable value of such care and maintenance or the
2.25	reasonable expenses incurred in obtaining usual and necessary substitute care and
2.26	maintenance of the home, whichever is greater.
2.27	(k) "Survivors economic loss benefits" has the meaning given in section 65B.44,
2.28	subdivision 6, except that these benefits are not subject to the weekly maximum amount.
2.29	(l) "Survivor replacement services loss benefits" has the meaning given in section 65B.44,
2.30	subdivision 7, except that these benefits are not subject to the weekly maximum amount.
2.31	(e) A (m) "Transportation network company" or "TNC" means a corporation, partnership,
2.32	sole proprietorship, or other entity that is operating in Minnesota that uses a digital network

to connect transportation network company riders to transportation network company drivers 3.1 who provide prearranged rides. 3.2 (f) A (n) "Transportation network company driver," "TNC driver," or "driver" means 3.3 an individual who: 3.4 (1) receives connections to potential riders and related services from a transportation 3.5 network company in exchange for payment of a fee to the transportation network company; 3.6 and 3.7 (2) uses a personal vehicle to provide a prearranged ride to riders upon connection 3.8 through a digital network controlled by a transportation network company in return for 3.9 compensation or payment of a fee. 3.10 (g) A (o) "Transportation network company rider," "TNC rider," or "rider" means an 3.11 individual or persons who use a transportation network company's digital network to connect 3.12 with a transportation network driver who provides prearranged rides to the rider in the 3.13 driver's personal vehicle between points chosen by the rider. 3.14 (h) A (p) "Volunteer driver" means an individual who transports persons or goods on 3.15 behalf of a nonprofit entity or governmental unit in a private passenger vehicle and receives 3.16 no compensation for services provided other than the reimbursement of actual expenses. 3.17 Subd. 2. Maintenance of transportation network financial responsibility. (a) A 3.18 transportation network company driver or transportation network company on the driver's 3.19 behalf shall maintain primary automobile insurance that recognizes that the driver is a 3.20 transportation network company driver or otherwise uses a vehicle to transport passengers 3.21 for compensation and covers the driver: during P1, P2, and P3. 3.22 (1) while the driver is logged on to the transportation network company's digital network; 3.23 or 3.24 (2) while the driver is engaged in a prearranged ride. 3.25 (b) During P1, the following automobile insurance requirements apply while a 3.26 3.27 participating transportation network company driver is logged on to the transportation network company's digital network and is available to receive transportation requests but 3.28 is not engaged in a prearranged ride: 3.29 (1) primary coverage insuring against loss resulting from liability imposed by law for 3.30 injury and property damage, including the requirements of section 65B.49, subdivision 3, 3.31

in the amount of not less than \$50,000 because of death or bodily injury to one person in

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any accident, \$100,000 because of death or bodily injury to two or more persons in any accident, and \$30,000 for injury to or destruction of property of others in any one accident;

(2) security for the payment of basic economic loss benefits where required by section 65B.44 pursuant to the priority requirements of section 65B.47. A transportation network

company and a transportation network company driver, during the period set forth in this paragraph, are deemed to be in the business of transporting persons for purposes of section 65B.47, subdivision 1, and the insurance required under this subdivision shall be deemed

to cover the vehicle during the period set forth in this paragraph;

- (3) primary uninsured motorist coverage and primary underinsured motorist coverage where required by section 65B.49, subdivisions 3a and 4a; and
- (4) the coverage requirements of this subdivision may be satisfied by any of the following: must be satisfied by the transportation network company.
 - (i) automobile insurance maintained by the transportation network company driver;
 - (ii) automobile insurance maintained by the transportation network company; or
- 4.15 (iii) any combination of items (i) and (ii).

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- (c) <u>During P2 and P3</u>, the following automobile insurance requirements apply while a transportation network company driver is engaged in a prearranged ride:
 - (1) primary coverage insuring against loss resulting from liability imposed by law for injury and property damage, including the requirements of section 65B.49, in the amount of not less than \$1,500,000 for death, injury, or destruction of property of others;
 - (2) security for the payment of basic economic loss benefits where required by section 65B.44 pursuant to the priority requirements of section 65B.47. A transportation network company and a transportation network company driver, during the period set forth in this paragraph, are deemed to be in the business of transporting persons for purposes of section 65B.47, subdivision 1, and the insurance required under this subdivision shall be deemed to cover the vehicle during the period set forth in this paragraph;
 - (3) primary uninsured motorist coverage and primary underinsured motorist coverage where required by section 65B.49, subdivisions 3a and 4a; and
- (4) the coverage requirements of this subdivision may be satisfied by any of the following:
 must be satisfied by the transportation network company.
- 4.31 (i) automobile insurance maintained by the transportation network company driver;
- 4.32 (ii) automobile insurance maintained by the transportation network company; or

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(iii) any combination of items (i) and (ii).

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(d) During P2 and P3, a TNC must keep in place, at no cost to a driver, insurance that
provides reimbursement for all loss suffered through injury arising from the driver's work
for the TNC that is not otherwise covered by the insurance required under paragraphs (b)
and (c). The insurance coverage shall be in the amount of not less than \$1,000,000 per
incident due to personal injury and includes medical expense benefits, disability and income
loss benefits, funeral and burial expenses, replacement services loss benefits, survivor's
economic loss benefits, and survivor's replacement services loss benefits.

- (e) Any insurer authorized to write accident and sickness insurance in this state shall have the power to issue the blanket accident and sickness policy described in paragraph (d).
- (f) A policy of blanket accident and sickness insurance as described in paragraph (d) must not be issued or delivered in this state unless a copy of the form has been approved by the commissioner. The form must include in substance the provisions required for individual policies that are applicable to blanket accident and sickness insurance and the following provisions:
- (1) a provision that the policy and the application of the policyholder constitutes the entire contract between the parties, and that, in the absence of fraud, all statements made by the policyholder are deemed representations and not warranties, and that a statement made for the purpose of affecting insurance does not avoid insurance or reduce benefits unless the statement is contained in a written instrument signed by the policyholder, a copy of which has been furnished to such policyholder; and
- (2) a provision that to the group or class originally insured shall be added from time to time all new persons eligible for coverage.
- (d) (g) If insurance maintained by the driver in paragraph (b) or (c) has lapsed or does not provide the required coverage, insurance maintained by a transportation network company shall provide the coverage required by this subdivision beginning with the first dollar of a claim and have the duty to defend the claim.
- (e) (h) Coverage under an automobile insurance policy maintained by the transportation network company shall not be dependent on a personal automobile insurer first denying a claim nor shall a personal automobile insurance policy be required to first deny a claim.
- 5.31 (f) (i) Insurance required by this subdivision must satisfy the requirements of chapter 60A.

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(g) (j) Insurance satisfying the requirements of this subdivision shall be deemed to satisfy the financial responsibility requirements under the Minnesota No-Fault Automobile Insurance Act, sections 65B.41 to 65B.71.

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- (h) (k) A transportation network company driver shall carry proof of coverage satisfying paragraphs (b) and (c) at all times during the driver's use of a vehicle in connection with a transportation network company's digital network. In the event of an accident, a transportation network company driver shall provide this insurance coverage information to the directly interested parties, automobile insurers, and investigating police officers upon request pursuant to section 65B.482, subdivision 1. Upon such request, a transportation network company driver shall also disclose to directly interested parties, automobile insurers, and investigating police officers whether the driver was logged on to the transportation network company's digital network or on a prearranged ride at the time of an accident.
- Subd. 3. **Disclosure to transportation network company drivers.** The transportation network company shall disclose in writing to transportation network company drivers the following before they are allowed to accept a request for a prearranged ride on the transportation network company's digital network:
- (1) the insurance coverage, including the types of coverage and the limits for each coverage <u>under subdivision 2</u>, <u>paragraphs (b), (c), and (d)</u>, that the transportation network company provides while the transportation network company driver uses a personal vehicle in connection with a transportation network company's digital network;
- (2) that the transportation network company driver's own automobile insurance policy might not provide any coverage while the driver is logged on to the transportation network company's digital network and is available to receive transportation requests or is engaged in a prearranged ride depending on its terms; and
- (3) that using a vehicle with a lien against the vehicle to provide transportation network services may violate the transportation network driver's contract with the lienholder.
- Subd. 4. **Automobile insurance provisions.** (a) Insurers that write automobile insurance in Minnesota may exclude any and all coverage afforded under the owner's insurance policy for any loss or injury that occurs while a driver is logged on to a transportation network company's digital network or while a driver provides a prearranged ride during P1, P2, and P3. This right to exclude all coverage may apply to any coverage included in an automobile insurance policy including, but not limited to:
 - (1) liability coverage for bodily injury and property damage;

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(2) uninsured and underinsured motorist coverage;

- (3) basic economic loss benefits as defined under section 65B.44;
- 7.3 (4) medical payments coverage;

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- 7.4 (5) comprehensive physical damage coverage; and
- 7.5 (6) collision physical damage coverage.

These exclusions apply notwithstanding any requirement under the Minnesota No-Fault Automobile Insurance Act, sections 65B.41 to 65B.71. Nothing in this section implies or requires that a personal automobile insurance policy provide coverage while the driver is logged on to the transportation network company's digital network, while the driver is engaged in a prearranged ride, or while the driver otherwise uses a vehicle to transport passengers for compensation during P1, P2, or P3.

Nothing in this section shall be deemed to preclude an insurer from providing coverage for the transportation network company driver's vehicle, if it so chooses to do so by contract or endorsement.

- (b) Automobile insurers that exclude coverage as permitted in paragraph (a) shall have no duty to defend or indemnify any claim expressly excluded thereunder. Nothing in this section shall be deemed to invalidate or limit an exclusion contained in a policy, including any policy in use or approved for use in Minnesota prior to May 19, 2015, that excludes coverage for vehicles used to carry persons or property for a charge or available for hire by the public.
- (c) An automobile insurer that defends or indemnifies a claim against a driver that is excluded under the terms of its policy as permitted in paragraph (a) shall have a right of contribution against other insurers that provide automobile insurance to the same driver in satisfaction of the coverage requirements of subdivision 2 at the time of loss.
- (d) In a claims coverage investigation, transportation network companies and any insurer potentially providing coverage under subdivision 2 shall cooperate to facilitate the exchange of relevant information with directly involved parties and any insurer of the transportation network company driver if applicable, including the precise times that a transportation network company driver logged on and off of the transportation network company's digital network in the 12-hour period immediately preceding and in the 12-hour period immediately following the accident and disclose to one another a clear description of the coverage, exclusions, and limits provided under any automobile insurance maintained under subdivision 2.

8.29	Subdivision 1. Compensation notice. (a) Upon initial or subsequent account activation,

10.16	(a) Minimum compensation of a TNC driver under this section must be paid in a per

10.20	(i) \$ per mile and \$ per minute for any transportation of a rider by a driver; and

11.15	later than the driver's next scheduled payment.
11.16	(d) For each earnings period, a TNC shall compare a driver's earnings, excluding
11.17	gratuities, against the required minimum compensation for that driver during the earnings
11.18	period. If the driver's earnings, excluding gratuities, in the earnings period are less than the
11.19	required minimum compensation for that earnings period, the TNC shall include an additional
11.20	sum accounting for the difference in the driver's earnings and the minimum compensation
11.21	no later than during the next earnings period.
11.22	(e) A TNC that uses software or collection technology to collect fees or fares must pay
11.23	a driver the compensation earned by the driver, regardless of whether the fees or fares are
11.24	actually collected.
11.25	(f) Beginning January 1, 2026, and each January 1 thereafter, the minimum compensation
11.26	required under paragraph (a) must be adjusted annually by the same process as the statewide
11.27	minimum wage under section 177.24, subdivision 1.

11.29	Subdivision 1. Deactivation policy; requirements. (a) A TNC must maintain a written
11.30	plain-language deactivation policy that provides the policies and procedures for the
11.31	suspension or termination of a driver's ability to receive connection to riders from the TNC.
11.32	<u>Drivers</u> must be provided a copy of the deactivation policy upon initial or subsequent account
11.33	activation and annually each year while the driver continues to maintain an account with

2.2	both online and in written form to the drivers at least 30 days before they are in effect.
2.3	(b) The deactivation policy must be provided in English, Amharic, Arabic, Hmong,

2.5	languages in which they offer the deactivation policy each year.
2.6	(c) Serious misconduct must be clearly defined in the TNC deactivation policy.
2.7	Subd. 2. Prohibitions for deactivation. A TNC must not deactivate a driver for:
2.8	(1) a violation not explicitly part of a TNC's written deactivation policy;
2.9	(2) a driver's ability to work a minimum number of hours;
2.10	(3) a driver's acceptance or rejection of a ride, as long as the acceptance or rejection is
2.11	not for a discriminatory purpose;
2.12	(4) a driver's good faith statement regarding compensation or working conditions made
2.13	publicly or privately; or
2.14	(5) a driver asserting their legal rights under any local, state, or federal law.
2.15	Subd. 3. Written notice. Except in cases of serious misconduct under subdivision 1,
2.16	paragraph (c), the TNC must provide written notice of deactivation three business days
2.17	before deactivation occurs. In cases of serious misconduct, the TNC must provide the driver
2.18	with written notice within three business days following deactivation. A written notice must
2.19	include:
2.20	(1) the reason for deactivation;
2.21	(2) anticipated length of the deactivation;
2.22	(3) when the deactivation will go into effect;
2.23	(4) an explanation of whether or not the deactivation can be reversed and clear steps for
2.24	the driver to take to reverse a deactivation;
2.25	(5) instructions for a driver to challenge the deactivation and information on their rights
2.26	under the appeals process provided under paragraph (f); and
2.27	(6) a notice that the driver has a right to assistance and information on how to contact a
2.28	driver advocacy group to assist in the deactivation appeal process, including the telephone
2.29	number and website information for one or more driver advocacy groups.
2.30	Subd. 4. Driver advocacy organizations. A driver advocacy group identified in the
2.31	notice must be an independent organization operating without influence from the TNC, and

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a TNC may not have any control or influence over the day-to-day operations of the organization's staff or management.

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- Subd. 5. Request for appeal. (a) The deactivation policy must provide the driver with an immediate opportunity to appeal the deactivation upon receipt of the written notice and an opportunity to provide information to support the request. An appeal process must provide the driver with no less than 30 days to appeal the deactivation, allow the driver to have an advocate or attorney present, and allow for an initial meeting no later than seven days after the deactivation, unless the driver requests or agrees to a later date.
- (b) A decision on the appeal must not take more than 15 days from the receipt of the requested appeal and information to support the request. A TNC may use a third party to assist with appeals.
- (c) Except for allegations of serious misconduct under subdivision 1, paragraph (c), if a decision on the appeal is not made within the time provided in this subdivision, unless the driver requests or agrees to a continuance the alleged violation must be dismissed and cannot form the basis of any further deactivation or other sanction.
- (d) If the basis of a deactivation is an allegation of serious misconduct, the TNC must:
- (1)(i) make a decision within 15 days from the receipt of the requested appeal and after information to support the request has been provided, or (ii) provide the driver with a written notice describing the reason the TNC is unable to provide a timely decision on the appeal; and
- (2) issue a decision on the appeal within 30 days of the request for the appeal when the notice in item (i) has been provided or dismiss the allegation if the TNC fails to issue a decision within this time period.
- (e) The TNC must consider any information presented by the driver under the appeal process. For a deactivation to be upheld, there must be evidence under the totality of the circumstances to find that it is more likely than not that a rule violation subjecting the driver to deactivation has occurred. A traffic ticket or other traffic or criminal charge alone is not conclusive of a rule violation unless there has been a conviction.
- (f) This section does not affect deactivations for economic reasons that are not targeted at a particular driver or drivers.
- (g) When a deactivation occurs due to a technical issue, the driver must be provided
 reasonable compensation for the period of time the driver was not able to accept rides
 through the TNC. For the purposes of this paragraph, "reasonable compensation" means

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14.1	compensation for each day the driver was deactivated using the driver's daily average in
14.2	earnings from the TNC for the 90 days prior to the deactivation.
14.3	Subd. 6. Prior deactivations. (a) Consistent with the deactivation policy created under
14.4	this section, a driver who was deactivated after January 1, 2021, but before August 1, 2024,

14.12	(2) texting notice to the last known cell phone number;

14.15	A TNC is not required to use all the contact methods in clauses (1) to (4) if the deactivated
14.16	driver confirms receipt of the notice. A TNC is not required to contact a previously

14.18	(c) A deactivated driver notified under paragraph (d) has 90 days to appeal a deactivation.
14.19	If a driver appeals a deactivation, the procedures provided in this section apply, except that
14.20	the TNC may take up to 30 days to conduct an initial meeting and may take up to 45 days
14.21	to issue a final decision.
14.22	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective August 1, 2024, and applies to
14.23	deactivations that occur on or after that date except as provided in subdivision 6, paragraph

14.25	Sec. 6. [181C.05] PRIVATE CIVIL ACTION; ENFORCEMENT.
14.26	(a) As provided under section 181.171, a driver or a driver's beneficiary may bring a
14.27	civil action seeking redress for violations of paragraph (d) and sections 181C.02, 181C.03,
14.28	and 181C.04 directly to district court. An action brought under this section must be
14.29	commenced within two years.
14.30	(b) The commissioner may issue an order under section 177.27, subdivision 4, requiring
14.31	an employer to comply with sections 181C.02 and 181C.03 under section 177.27, subdivision

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(c) As provided under section 181.1721, and in addition to enforcement by the department under paragraph (a), the attorney general may enforce sections 181C.02 and 181C.03 under section 181.1721.
 (d) A TNC must not retaliate against or discipline a driver for (1) raising a complaint

(d) A TNC must not retaliate against or discipline a driver for (1) raising a complaint under this chapter, or (2) pursuing enactment or enforcement of this chapter. A TNC must not give less favorable or more favorable rides to a driver for making public or private comments supporting or opposing working conditions or compensation at a TNC.

Sec. 7. [181C.06] DISCRIMINATION PROHIBITED.

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- (a) A TNC may not discriminate against a TNC driver or a qualified applicant to become a driver, due to race, national origin, color, creed, religion, sex, disability, sexual orientation, marital status, or gender identity. Nothing in this section prohibits providing a reasonable accommodation to a person with a disability, for religious reasons, due to pregnancy, or to remedy previous discriminatory behavior.
- 15.14 (b) A TNC driver injured by a violation of this section is entitled to the remedies under sections 363A.28 to 363A.35.

15.16 Sec. 8. [181C.07] COLLECTIVE BARGAINING.

Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, nothing in this chapter prohibits collective bargaining.

Sec. 9. [181C.08] FORCED ARBITRATION PROHIBITED.

The rights and remedies established in this chapter are not required to be pursued through arbitration and shall only be pursued through arbitration at the election of the driver. Contracts that have already been executed must have an addendum provided to each driver that includes a copy of this chapter and notice that a driver may elect to pursue the remedies provided in this chapter, rather than through arbitration. For cases that go to arbitration, the rights and damages that drivers are entitled to in an arbitration proceeding shall be as provided in this chapter.

Sec. 10. [181C.09] REVOCATION OF LICENSE.

A local unit of government may refuse to issue a license or may revoke a license and right to operate issued to a TNC by the local unit of government for a TNC's failure to comply with the requirements of this chapter.
