BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

## Section 1. SAFETY OF PERSONS WITH DEMENTIA OR ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE; APPROPRIATION.

Subdivision 1. Appropriation. \$600,000 in fiscal year 2022 and \$400,000 in fiscal year 2023 are appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of public safety for the purposes of this section.

Subd. 2. Law enforcement training. (a) \$400,000 in fiscal year 2022 and \$400,000 in fiscal year 2023 are for the Office of Justice Programs to administer regional and statewide voluntary training grants to state and local law enforcement and first responders to contract with a training organization for training on communication strategies, behavioral studies, and issues associated with persons with dementia and Alzheimer's disease, including at a minimum wandering, driving, abuse, and neglect. The office shall consult with the Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) Board and stakeholders, including at a minimum the Minnesota Crisis Intervention Team and the Alzheimer's Association, regarding the content of the training, which must include at a minimum the requirement that trainers have at least two years of direct care of a person with Alzheimer's disease or dementia, crisis intervention training, and mental health experience. When awarding grants, the office shall give priority to law enforcement or first responder agencies with less than 45 officers.
