1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 121A.39, is amended to read:
1.7	121A.39 SCHOOL COUNSELORS.
1.8	(a) A school district is strongly encouraged to have an adequate student-to-counselor
1.9	ratio for its students beginning in the 2015-2016 school year and later or charter school
1.10	must provide counseling services to promote the academic and mental health of its pupils
1.11	and must employ personnel, including at least one full-time equivalent licensed school
1.12	counselor, in each school building.
1.13	(b) A school counselor shall must assist a student in meeting the requirements for high
1.14	school graduation, college and career exploration, and selection, college affordability
1.15	planning, and successful transitions into postsecondary education or training.
1.16	(c) Appropriate duties for school counselors include:
1.17	(1) advisement and appraisal for academic planning;
1.18	(2) orientation, coordination, and academic advising for new students;
1.19	(3) interpreting cognitive, aptitude, and achievement tests;
1.20	(4) providing counseling to students who have disciplinary problems;
1.21	(5) providing counseling to students who are tardy or absent;

2.19	(5) performing disciplinary actions or assigning discipline consequences;
2.20	(6) providing long-term counseling in schools to address psychological disorders;
2.21	(7) covering classes when teachers are absent or to create teacher planning time
2.22	maintaining student records;
2.23	(8) computing grade-point averages;
2.24	(9) supervising classrooms or common areas;

2.26	(11) assisting with duties in the principal's office;

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Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 122A.14, is amended by adding a subdivision to read:

Subd. 11. Mental illness. The board must adopt rules that require all school administrators renewing a license to include in the renewal requirements at least two hours of mental illness training. The training must include at least one hour of suicide prevention training in each licensure renewal period that is a nationally recognized evidence-based program. At least one additional hour of training must include understanding the key warning signs of early-onset mental illness in children and adolescents, trauma, accommodations for students' mental illness, parents' roles in addressing students' mental illness, fetal alcohol spectrum disorders, autism, and de-escalation methods, among other similar topics.

Sec. 3. LICENSURE RENEWAL REQUIREMENTS.

The Professional Educator Licensing and Standards Board must examine the licensure renewal requirements under Minnesota Statutes, section 122A.187, and make recommendations on what licensure renewal requirements are suitable for other licensed educators, including school counselors. Recommendations must be submitted in a report to the legislative committees having jurisdiction over education by July 1, 2022.

EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.
