2.3 peacetime emergency. A peacetime declaration of emergency may be declared only when

- 2.4 <u>any of the following endangers life and property and local government resources are</u>
- 2.5 <u>inadequate to handle the situation:</u>
- 2.6 <u>(1)</u> an act of nature;;
- 2.7 (2) a technological failure or malfunction;

2.8 (3) a terrorist incident;

2.9 (4) a cyber attack, including a physical or electronic attack on the state's information

2.10 <u>and telecommunications technology infrastructure, systems, or services;</u>

2.11 (5) an industrial accident;

2.12 (6) a hazardous materials accident; or

2.13 (7) a civil disturbance endangers life and property and local government resources are 2.14 inadequate to handle the situation.

If the peacetime emergency occurs on Indian lands, the governor or state director of 2.15 emergency management shall consult with tribal authorities before the governor makes such 2.16 a declaration. Nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the governor's authority to 2.17 act without such consultation when the situation calls for prompt and timely action. When 2.18 the governor declares a peacetime emergency, the governor must immediately notify the 2.19 majority and minority leaders of the senate and the speaker and majority and minority leaders 2.20 of the house of representatives. A peacetime emergency must not be continued for more 2.21 than five days unless extended by resolution of the Executive Council up to 30 days. An 2.22 order, or proclamation declaring, continuing, or terminating an emergency must be given 2.23 prompt and general publicity and filed with the secretary of state. 2.24

(b) By majority vote of each house of the legislature, the legislature may terminate a
peacetime emergency extending beyond 30 days. If the governor determines a need to extend
the peacetime emergency declaration beyond 30 days and the legislature is not sitting in
session, the governor must issue a call immediately convening both houses of the legislature.
Nothing in this section limits the governor's authority over or command of the National
Guard as described in the Military Code, chapters 190 to 192A, and required by the
Minnesota Constitution, article V, section 3.

12.03 DEFINITIONS.
