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Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 15A.082, as amended by Laws 2023, chapter 62, article 2, sections 39 to 43, is amended to read:

15A.082 COMPENSATION COUNCIL.

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Subdivision 1. **Creation.** A Compensation Council is created each odd-numbered year to establish the compensation of constitutional officers and the heads of state and metropolitan agencies identified in section 15A.0815, and to assist make recommendations to the legislature in establishing the compensation of justices of the supreme court and judges of the court of appeals and district court.

- Subd. 2. **Membership.** (a) The Compensation Council consists of the following members: eight nonjudges appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court, of whom no more than four may belong to the same political party; and one member from each congressional district appointed by the governor, of whom no more than four may belong to the same political party. The speaker and minority leader of the house of representatives must each appoint two members one member. The majority leader and minority leader of the senate must each appoint two members one member. Appointments must be made after the first Monday in January and before January 15. The compensation and removal of members shall be as provided in section 15.059, subdivisions 3 and 4. Members continue to serve until new members are appointed. Members appointed by the governor may not vote on the salary of the governor. In the case of a vacancy on the council, the appointing authority must appoint a person to fill the vacancy for the remainder of the unexpired term. The Legislative Coordinating Commission shall provide the council with administrative and support services. The commissioner of management and budget must provide analytical and policy support to the council related to the compensation of agency heads. The provision of analytical and policy support under this subdivision shall not be considered ex parte communication under subdivision 7.
 - (b) Members appointed under paragraph (a) may not be a:
- 3.27 (1) current or former judge, or current listed senior judge;
- 3.28 (2) current lobbyist registered under Minnesota law;
- 3.29 (3) current employee in the judicial, legislative, or executive branch of state government;
- (4) current or former governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, secretary of state,
 or state auditor; or
- 3.32 (5) current or former legislator, or the spouse of a current legislator.

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Subd. 3. Submission of recommendations and Determination of constitutional officer and agency head salaries. (a) By April 1 in each odd-numbered year, the Compensation Council shall submit to the speaker of the house and the president of the senate salary recommendations for justices of the supreme court, and judges of the court of appeals and district court. The recommended salaries take effect on July 1 of that year and July 1 of the subsequent even-numbered year and at whatever interval the council recommends thereafter, unless the legislature by law provides otherwise. The salary recommendations take effect if an appropriation of money to pay the recommended salaries is enacted after the recommendations are submitted and before their effective date. Recommendations may be expressly modified or rejected. prescribe salaries for constitutional officers and for the agency and metropolitan agency heads identified in section 15A.0815. The prescribed salary for each office shall take effect July 1 of that year and July 1 of the subsequent even-numbered year, unless the legislature by law provides otherwise. Salary determinations may be in the form of an across-the-board increase. An appropriation by the legislature to fund the relevant office, branch, or agency of an amount sufficient to pay the salaries prescribed by the council constitutes a prescription by law as provided in the Minnesota Constitution, article V, sections 4 and 5. (b) By April 1 in each odd-numbered year, the Compensation Council must prescribe salaries for constitutional officers, and for the agency and metropolitan agency heads identified in section 15A.0815. The prescribed salary for each office must take effect July

The prescribed salary for each office must take effect July 1 of that year and July 1 of the subsequent even-numbered year and at whatever interval the council determines thereafter, unless the legislature by law provides otherwise. An appropriation by the legislature to fund the relevant office, branch, or agency of an amount sufficient to pay the salaries prescribed by the council constitutes a prescription by law as provided in the Minnesota Constitution, article V, sections 4 and 5. November 1 of each even-numbered year, the Compensation Council may prescribe additional salary changes for constitutional officers and for the agency and metropolitan agency heads identified in section 15A.0815. As applicable, the changes take effect on July 1 of the next odd-numbered year and July 1 of the subsequent even-numbered year, unless the legislature by law provides otherwise.

(c) Notwithstanding the effective dates specified in paragraphs (a) and (b), determinations under this subdivision for the salary of the governor must not take effect until July 1 of the year the current term of the governor ends.

Subd. 3a. **Recommendation of judicial salaries.** By November 1 of each even-numbered year, the Compensation Council shall submit to the speaker of the house and the president

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of the senate salary recommendations for justices of the supreme court and judges of the court of appeals and district court. The recommended salaries take effect on July 1 of the next year and July 1 of the subsequent odd-numbered year, unless the legislature by law provides otherwise. The salary recommendations take effect if an appropriation of money to pay the recommended salaries is enacted after the recommendations are submitted and before their effective date. Recommendations may be expressly modified or rejected.

Subd. 4. **Criteria.** In making compensation recommendations and determinations, the council shall consider the amount of compensation paid in government service and the private sector to persons with similar qualifications, the amount of compensation needed to attract and retain experienced and competent persons, and the ability of the state to pay the recommended compensation, and the cost of labor inflation indices published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics.

Subd. 4a. Constitutional officers Compensation for unused vacation or sick leave accrual. No constitutional officer whose compensation is set under this section may receive monetary compensation for unused vacation or sick leave accruals.

Subd. 6. **Expiration.** Each Compensation Council shall expire upon submission of the recommendations required by subdivision 3 3a.

Subd. 7. No ex parte communications. Members may not have any communication with a constitutional officer, a head of a state agency, or member of the judiciary during the period after the first meeting is convened under this section and the date the prescribed and recommended salaries are submitted under subdivision 3.

Sec. 3. COMPENSATION COUNCIL SALARY RECOMMENDATIONS.

In addition to the recommendations required under section 2, the Compensation Council, by April 1, 2025, may submit to the speaker of the house and the president of the senate salary recommendations for justices of the supreme court and judges of the court of appeals and district court. Salary recommendations may be in the form of an across-the-board increase. In determining salary recommendations, the council should consider the cost of labor inflation indices published by the United States Bureau of Labor Statistics. The recommended salaries take effect on July 1, 2025, and July 1, 2026, unless the legislature by law provides otherwise. The salary recommendations take effect if an appropriation of money to pay the recommended salaries is enacted after the recommendations are submitted and before their effective date. Recommendations may be expressly modified or rejected.
