1.7	Subdivision 1. Program established. The commissioner shall administer a youth skills
1.8	training program established for the purpose of providing work-based skills training for
1.9	student learners ages 16 and 17. The commissioner shall award grants to local partnerships
1.10	for the implementation and coordination of local youth skills training programs as provided
1.11	in this section.
1.12	Subd. 2. Definitions. (a) For purposes of this section, the terms in this subdivision have
1.13	the meanings given.
1.14	(b) "Local partnership" means one or more school districts, or any combination of one

1.16	\$500,000 is appropriated in fiscal year 2018 from the workforce development fund to
1.17	the commissioner of labor and industry to implement the youth skills training program under
1.18	Minnesota Statutes, section 175.46. The commissioner shall award up to five grants to local
1.19	partnerships located throughout the state, not to exceed \$ per local partnership grant.
1.20	The commissioner may expend up to five percent of this appropriation for administration
1.21	of the program.
