1.7	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 124D.111, is amended to read:

1.10	Subdivision 1. School lunch aid computation meal policy; definitions. Each school
1.11	year, the state must pay participants in the national school lunch program the amount of
1.12	12.5 cents for each full paid and free student lunch and 52.5 cents for each reduced-price
1.13	lunch served to students. (a) For purposes of this section the following terms have the
1.14	meanings given:

3.1 (1) the criteria the commissioner uses to approve or disapprove an application, including
3.2 how an applicant demonstrates financial viability for the Minnesota program, among other
3.3 criteria;

3.4 (2) the commissioner's process and time line for notifying an applicant when its

application is approved or disapproved and, if the application is disapproved, the explanation
the commissioner provides to the applicant; and

3.7 (3) any appeal or other recourse available to a disapproved applicant.

3.8 Subd. 3. School food service fund. (a) The expenses described in this subdivision must
3.9 be recorded as provided in this subdivision.

3.10 (b) In each district, the expenses for a school food service program for pupils must be
3.11 attributed to a school food service fund. Under a food service program, the school food
3.12 service may prepare or serve milk, meals, or snacks in connection with school or community
3.13 service activities.

3.14 (c) Revenues and expenditures for food service activities must be recorded in the food
3.15 service fund. The costs of processing applications, accounting for meals, preparing and
3.16 serving food, providing kitchen custodial services, and other expenses involving the preparing
3.17 of meals or the kitchen section of the lunchroom may be charged to the food service fund
3.18 or to the general fund of the district. The costs of lunchroom supervision, lunchroom custodial
3.19 services, lunchroom utilities, and other administrative costs of the food service program
3.20 must be charged to the general fund.

3.21 That portion of superintendent and fiscal manager costs that can be documented as 3.22 attributable to the food service program may be charged to the food service fund provided 3.23 that the school district does not employ or contract with a food service director or other 3.24 individual who manages the food service program, or food service management company. 3.25 If the cost of the superintendent or fiscal manager is charged to the food service fund, the 3.26 charge must be at a wage rate not to exceed the statewide average for food service directors 3.27 as determined by the department.

3.28 (d) Capital expenditures for the purchase of food service equipment must be made from
3.29 the general fund and not the food service fund, unless the restricted balance in the food
3.30 service fund at the end of the last fiscal year is greater than the cost of the equipment to be
3.31 purchased.

3.32 (e) If the condition set out in paragraph (d) applies, the equipment may be purchased3.33 from the food service fund.

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(f) If a deficit in the food service fund exists at the end of a fiscal year, and the deficit
is not eliminated by revenues from food service operations in the next fiscal year, then the
deficit must be eliminated by a permanent fund transfer from the general fund at the end of
that second fiscal year. However, if a district contracts with a food service management
company during the period in which the deficit has accrued, the deficit must be eliminated
by a payment from the food service management company.

4.7 (g) Notwithstanding paragraph (f), a district may incur a deficit in the food service fund
4.8 for up to three years without making the permanent transfer if the district submits to the
4.9 commissioner by January 1 of the second fiscal year a plan for eliminating that deficit at
4.10 the end of the third fiscal year.

(h) If a surplus in the food service fund exists at the end of a fiscal year for three
successive years, a district may recode for that fiscal year the costs of lunchroom supervision,
lunchroom custodial services, lunchroom utilities, and other administrative costs of the food
service program charged to the general fund according to paragraph (c) and charge those
costs to the food service fund in a total amount not to exceed the amount of surplus in the
food service fund.

Subd. 4. No fees. A participant that receives school lunch meal aid under this section 4.17 must make lunch meals available without charge and must not deny a school meal to all 4.18 participating students who qualify for free or reduced-price meals or who qualify for school 4.19 meal aid under section 126C.05, subdivision 16, paragraph (b), whether or not that student 4.20 has an outstanding balance in the student's meal account attributable to a la carte purchases 4.21 or for any other reason. The participant must also ensure that any reminders for payment 4.22 of outstanding student meal balances do not demean or stigmatize any child participating 4.23 in the school lunch program. 4.24

Subd. 5. Respectful treatment. (a) A participant must provide meals to students in a 4.25 respectful manner according to the policy adopted under subdivision 1. A participant must 4.26 ensure that any communication regarding payment of outstanding student meal debt does 4.27 not demean or stigmatize any child participating in the school meal program. A participant 4.28 must not impose any restriction prohibited under section 123B.37 due to unpaid student 4.29 meal debt. A participant must not limit a student's participation in any school activities, 4.30 graduation ceremonies, field trips, athletics, activity clubs, or other extracurricular activities 4.31 or access to materials, technology, or other items provided to students due to an unpaid 4.32 4.33 student meal debt.
