1.4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.5	Section 1. APPROPRIATION; SERVICE-LEARNING GRANT PROGRAM.
1.6	Subdivision 1. Appropriation. (a) \$599,000 in fiscal year 2020 is appropriated from
1.7	the general fund to the commissioner of education for a grant to the National Youth
1.8	Leadership Council for a service-learning grant program.
1.9	(b) Of the amount in paragraph (a):
1.10	(1) \$500,000 is for start-up grants under subdivision 4;
1.11	(2) \$61,000 is for the National Youth Leadership Council for regional meetings, start-up
1.12	grant administration, and technical assistance to each of the grantees;
1.13	(3) \$35,000 is for the evaluation under subdivision 5; and
1.14	(4) \$3,000 is for Department of Education grant administration expenses.
1.15	(c) The appropriation is available until June 30, 2021. This is a onetime appropriation.
1.16	Subd. 2. Purpose. (a) The purpose of the service-learning grant program is to increase
1.17	safety in schools and communities, reduce academic disparities, improve the environment,
1.18	increase youth engagement with the community, and expand positive intergenerational and
1.19	multicultural relationships. The grant program supports this purpose by more effectively
1.20	using the skills, insights, and creativity of Minnesota youth, and by combining classroom

2.31	(b) The council must give priority	to applications the	at demonstrate the com	ponents of

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3.1	service-learning program activities beyond the grant period. Start-up grant funds must not
3.2	be used for the purpose of attempting to influence legislative or administrative action, or
3.3	the official action of a metropolitan governmental unit, by communicating or urging others
3.4	to communicate with public or local officials.
3.5	(c) The council may award up to 25 grants. Each grant must not exceed \$20,000. The
3.6	council must award at least three grants in each congressional district.
3.7	Subd. 6. Evaluation. The National Youth Leadership Council must contract with a third
3.8	party to perform an evaluation of the activities funded under the grant program. By February
3.9	15, 2023, the evaluation report must be submitted to the commissioner of education and to
3.10	the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees with jurisdiction
3.11	over prekindergarten through grade 12 education. The evaluation report must be filed with
3.12	the Legislative Reference Library according to Minnesota Statutes, section 3.195.
