Section 1. COMMISSION ON FATHERHOOD. Subdivision 1. Creation and duties. (a) A Commission on Fatherhood is examines and consists of 12 members. Members must be appointed by August 1, 2020. 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2.1	Subd. 2. Membership. (a) The Commission on Fatherhood consists of the following
2.2	individuals or the individuals' designees:
2.3	(1) two members of the senate, one appointed by the majority leader and one appointed

2.5	(2) two members of the house of representatives, one appointed by the speaker of the
2.6	house and one appointed by the minority leader;
2.7	(3) the commissioner of the Department of Human Services;
2.8	(4) the commissioner of economic development;
2.9	(5) one representative from the judicial branch, appointed by the chief justice of the
2.10	supreme court; and
2.11	(6) five representatives from the public who work with or for father-focused nonprofits,
2.12	legal nonprofit organizations, and nonprofit organizations working to help employ fathers,
2.13	appointed by the governor.
2.14	(b) Members of the commission serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority or until
2.15	the commission expires. Vacancies in commissioner-appointed positions must be filled by
2.16	the commissioner consistent with the qualifications of the vacating member required by
2.17	this subdivision.
2.18	Subd. 3. Officers; meetings. (a) The commission members must annually elect a chair
2.19	and vice-chair from among the commission's members and may elect other officers as
2.20	necessary. The commission must meet at least quarterly, or upon the call of its chair, and
2.21	may hold meetings throughout the state. The commission must meet frequently enough to
2.22	accomplish the tasks identified in this section, but must meet at least four times each year.
2.23	Meetings of the commission are subject to Minnesota Statutes, chapter 13D. The commission
2.24	must seek out and enlist the cooperation and assistance of nongovernmental organizations.

 - Sec. 2. FUNDING FOR THE COMMISSION ON FATHERHOOD;
- 3.6 **APPROPRIATION.**

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\$50,000 in fiscal year 2021 and \$50,000 in fiscal year 2022 are appropriated from the general fund to the Legislative Coordinating Commission to implement section 1 relating to the Commission on Fatherhood. Unexpended funds from fiscal year 2021 do not cancel and may be spent in fiscal year 2022.
