1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.6	Section 1. [145.871] UNIVERSAL, VOLUNTARY HOME VISITING PROGRAM.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Grant program. (a) The commissioner of health shall award grants to
1.8	community health boards, nonprofit organizations, Tribal nations, and health care providers,
1.9	including those listed in clauses (1) to (5), to establish voluntary home visiting services to
1.10	families expecting or caring for an infant, including families adopting an infant. This section
1.11	includes:
1.12	<u>(1) doulas;</u>
1.13	(2) community health workers;
1.14	(3) perinatal health educators;
1.15	(4) early childhood family education home visiting providers; and
1.16	(5) local public health nurses.
1.17	(b) The grant money awarded under this section must be used to:
1.18	(1) establish home visiting services that provide a range of one to six visits that occur
1.19	prenatally or within the first four months of the expected birth or adoption of an infant; and
1.20	(2) improve outcomes in two or more of the following areas:
1.21	(i) maternal and newborn health;

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2.1	(ii) school readiness and achievement;
2.2	(iii) family economic self-sufficiency;
2.3	(iv) coordination and referral for other community resources and supports;
2.4	(v) reduction in child injuries, abuse, or neglect; or
2.5	(vi) reduction in crime or domestic violence.
2.6	(c) The commissioner shall ensure that the voluntary home visiting services established
2.7	under this section are available to all families residing in the state by June 30, 2025. In
2.8	awarding grants prior to the home visiting services being available statewide, the
2.9	commissioner shall prioritize applicants serving high-risk or high-need populations of
2.10	pregnant women and families with infants, including populations with insufficient access
2.11	to prenatal care, high incidence of mental illness or substance use disorder, low
2.12	socioeconomic status, and other factors as determined by the commissioner.

3.7	grantees, technical assistance, and evaluation support.

3.13	Sec. 3. <u>REVISOR INSTRUCTION.</u>
3.14	The revisor of statutes shall renumber Minnesota Statutes, sections 145A.145 and
3.15	145A.17, as new sections following Minnesota Statutes, section 145.871. The revisor shall
