1.5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2018, section 124D.2211, is amended to read:

124D.2211 AFTER-SCHOOL COMMUNITY LEARNING PROGRAMS.

Subdivision 1. **Establishment.** A competitive statewide after-school community learning grant program is established to provide grants to eommunity or nonprofit organizations, political subdivisions, for-profit or nonprofit child care centers, or school-based programs that serve youth after school or during nonschool hours organizations that offer academic and enrichment activities for elementary and secondary school students during nonschool hours. Grants must be used to offer a broad array of enrichment activities that promote positive after-school activities, including art, music, community engagement, literacy, science, technology, engineering, math, health, and recreation programs. The commissioner shall must develop criteria for after-school community learning programs. The commissioner may award grants under this section to community or nonprofit organizations, political subdivisions, public libraries, for-profit or nonprofit child care centers, or school-based programs that serve youth after school or during nonschool hours.

Subd. 2. **Program outcomes Objectives.** The expected outcomes objectives of the after-school community learning programs are to increase:

1.22 (1) school connectedness of participants;

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2.1	(2) academic achievement of participating students in one or more core academic areas;
2.2	(3) the capacity of participants to become productive adults; and
2.3	(4) prevent truancy from school and prevent juvenile crime.
2.4	(1) increase access to protective factors that build young people's capacity to become
2.5	productive adults, such as through connections to a caring adult in order to promote healthy
2.6	behavior, attitudes, and relationships;
2.7	(2) develop skills and behaviors necessary to succeed in postsecondary education or
2.8	career opportunities; and
2.9	(3) encourage school attendance and improve academic performance in accordance with
2.10	the state's world's best workforce goals under section 120B.11.
2.11	Subd. 3. Grants. (a) An applicant shall must submit an after-school community learning
2.12	program proposal to the commissioner. The submitted plan proposal must include:
2.13	(1) collaboration with and leverage of existing community resources that have
2.14	demonstrated effectiveness;
2.15	(2) outreach to children and youth; and
2.16	(3) involvement of local governments, including park and recreation boards or schools,
2.17	unless no government agency is appropriate.
2.18	Proposals will be reviewed and approved by the commissioner.
2.19	(3) an explanation of how the proposal will support the objectives identified in subdivision
2.20	<u>2; and</u>
2.21	(4) a plan to implement effective after-school practices and provide staff access to
2.22	professional development opportunities.
2.23	(b) The commissioner must review proposals and award grants to programs that:
2.24	(1) primarily serve students eligible for free or reduced-price meals; and
2.25	(2) provide opportunities for academic enrichment, and a broad array of additional
2.26	services and activities to meet program objectives.
2.27	(c) To the extent practicable, the commissioner must award grants equitably among the
2.28	geographic areas of Minnesota, including rural, suburban, and urban communities.
2.29	(d) The commissioner must award grants without giving preference to any particular
2.30	grade of students served by an applicant program.

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3.1	Subd. 4. Technical assistance and continuous improvement. (a) The commissioner
3.2	must monitor and evaluate the performance of grant recipients to assess the effectiveness
3.3	of after-school community learning programs in meeting the objectives identified in
3.4	subdivision 2.
3.5	(b) The commissioner must provide technical assistance, capacity building, and
3.6	professional development to grant recipients, including guidance on:
3.7	(1) aligning activities with the state's world's best workforce goals under section 120B.11;
3.8	<u>and</u>
3.9	(2) effective practices for after-school programs.
3.10	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.
3.11	Sec. 2. AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAM GRANT; APPROPRIATIONS.
3.12	Subdivision 1. Commissioner of education. The sums indicated in this section are
3.13	appropriated from the general fund to the commissioner of education for the fiscal years
3.14	designated.
3.15	Subd. 2. After-school community learning programs. (a) For grants for after-school
3.16	community learning programs established under Minnesota Statutes, section 124D.2211:
3.17	<u>\$</u> <u>2,500,000</u> <u></u> <u>2021</u>
3.18	(b) \$500,000 of the appropriation for fiscal year 2021 must be awarded to Ignite
3.19	Afterschool to award grants to support the Million Girls Moonshot National Initiative.
3.20	(c) This appropriation does not cancel but is available until June 30, 2023.
3.21	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective July 1, 2020.

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
