Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 609.375, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

Subdivision 1. **Crime defined.** Whoever is legally obligated to provide eare and

<u>court-ordered</u> support to a spouse or child, whether or not the child's custody has been granted to another, and knowingly omits and fails to do so is guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction may be sentenced to imprisonment for not more than 90 days or to

Subd. 7. **Conditions of work release; probation violation.** Upon conviction under this section, a defendant may obtain work release only upon the imposition of an automatic income withholding order, and may be required to post a bond in avoidance of jail time and conditioned upon payment of all <u>ehild court-ordered</u> support owed. Nonpayment of <u>ehild court-ordered</u> support is a violation of any probation granted following conviction under subdivision 2a.
