| 1.6               | Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 16C.16, subdivision 1, is amended to read:   |
| 1.7               | Subdivision 1. Small business procurements. (a) The commissioner shall for each  |
| 1.8               | fiscal year ensure that small businesses receive at least 25 percent of the value of anticipated   |
| 1.9               | total state procurement of goods and services, including printing and construction. The  |
| 1.10              | commissioner shall divide the procurements so designated into contract award units of  |
| 1.11              | economically feasible production runs in order to facilitate offers or bids from small   |
| 1.12              | businesses.  |
| 1.13              | (b) The commissioner must solicit and encourage Minnesota small businesses to submit   |
| 1.14              | responses or bids when the commissioner is entering into master contracts. If cost-effective,  |

2.6 Subd. 4. **Targeted group purchasing.** The commissioner shall establish a program for 2.7 purchasing goods and services, including construction, from targeted group businesses, as 2.8 designated in subdivision 5. The purpose of the program is to remedy the effects of past 2.9 discrimination against members of targeted groups. In furtherance of this purpose, the 2.10 commissioner shall attempt to ensure that purchases from targeted group businesses reflect 2.11 a fair and equitable representation of all the state's purchasing.

2.12 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 16C.16, subdivision 5, is amended to read:

Subd. 5. Designation of targeted groups. (a) The commissioner of administration shall 2.13 periodically designate businesses that are majority owned and operated by women, persons 2.14 with a substantial physical disability, or specific minorities as targeted group businesses 2.15 within purchasing categories as determined by the commissioner. (b) In addition to designations under paragraph (a), an individual business may be
included as a targeted group business if the commissioner determines that inclusion is
necessary to remedy discrimination against the owner based on race, gender, or disability
in attempting to operate a business that would provide goods or services, including
<u>construction</u>, to public agencies.

(c) The designations of purchasing categories and businesses under paragraphs (a) and
(b) are not rules for purposes of chapter 14, and are not subject to rulemaking procedures
of that chapter.

The subcontracting 4.8 requirements of this paragraph do not apply to prime contractors who are veteran-owned 4.9 small businesses. 4.10

4.11 (e) The purpose of this designation is to facilitate the transition of veterans from military
4.12 to civilian life, and to help compensate veterans for their sacrifices, including but not limited
4.13 to their sacrifice of health and time, to the state and nation during their military service, as
4.14 well as to enhance economic development within Minnesota.

4.15 (f) Before the commissioner certifies that a small business is majority-owned and operated
4.16 by a veteran, the commissioner of veterans affairs must verify that the owner of the small
4.17 business is a veteran, as defined in section 197.447.

(2) the owner resides in or the business is located in an area designated a labor surplus 5.11 area by the United States Department of Labor; or 5.12

(3) the business is a certified rehabilitation facility or extended employment provider as 5.13 described in chapter 268A. 5.14

(f) The commissioner may designate one or more areas designated as targeted 5.15 neighborhoods under section 469.202 or as border city enterprise zones under section 5.16 469.166 as economically disadvantaged areas for purposes of this subdivision if the 5.17 commissioner determines that this designation would further the purposes of this section. 5.18 If the owner of a small business resides or is employed in a designated area, the small 5.19 business is eligible for any preference provided under this subdivision. 5.20

(g) The Department of Revenue shall gather data necessary to make the determinations 5.21 required by paragraph (e), clause (1), and shall annually certify counties that qualify under 5.22 paragraph (e), clause (1). An area designated a labor surplus area retains that status for 120 5.23 days after certified small businesses in the area are notified of the termination of the 5.24 designation by the United States Department of Labor. 5.25
