1.14	system to identify coursework to fulfill the peer specialist training requirements. In

1.16	to increase their knowledge on how peer specialists can be utilized, best practices on
1.17	hiring peer specialists, how peer specialist activities can be billed, and the benefits of

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3.1 Sec. 6. <u>APPROPRIATION; SPECIAL PROJECTS FOR ADOLESCENT AND</u> 3.2 YOUNG ADULT INTENSIVE TREATMENT AND SUPPORTS.

(a) \$500,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$500,000 in fiscal year 2017 are appropriated 3.3 from the general fund to the commissioner of human services to fund special projects to 3.4 provide intensive treatment and supports to adolescents and young adults 26 years of age 3.5 or younger who are experiencing their first psychotic or manic episode. Intensive treatment 3.6 and supports includes medication management, psychoeducation for the individual and 3.7 family, care coordination, employment supports, education supports, cognitive behavioral 3.8 approaches, cognitive remediation, social skills training, peer support, crisis planning, and 3.9 stress management. The special projects must utilize all available funding streams. 3.10 (b) \$100,000 in fiscal year 2016 is appropriated from the general fund to the 3.11 commissioner of human services to fund a project to conduct outreach, training, and 3.12 guidance to mental health and health care professionals, including postsecondary 3.13 health clinics, on early psychosis symptoms, screening tools, and best practices. This 3.14 3.15 appropriation is available until expended.

3.16 Sec. 7. APPROPRIATION; SUPPORTIVE HOUSING SERVICES FOR

3.17 **ADULTS WITH MENTAL ILLNESS.**

- 3.18 <u>\$2,500,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$2,500,000 in fiscal year 2017 are appropriated</u>
- 3.19 from the general fund to the commissioner of human services for adult mental health
- 3.20 grants to increase the availability of a range of housing options with supports for persons
- 3.21 with serious mental illness.
