| 1.7 | WHEREAS, Congress in its initial passage of the Individuals with Disabilities Education |

| 1.9 | WHEREAS, the federal government's share of funding for special education costs in |
| 1.10 | Minnesota has never, except for one year, due to federal stimulus funds appropriated by the |
| 1.11 | American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, exceeded 18 percent of total special |
| 1.12 | education costs; and |
| 1.13 | WHEREAS, since the passage of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the states |
| 1.14 | and local districts have been primarily responsible for providing funding for special education |
| 1.15 | services due to a lack of federal funds; and |
| 1.16 | WHEREAS, special education services are being provided to all eligible children in the |
| 1.17 | State of Minnesota; and |
| 1.18 | WHEREAS, many states, including Minnesota, must provide substantial state funding to |
| 1.19 | fill the gaps left by Congress' unfunded promise; and |
| 1.20 | WHEREAS, Congress is now currently debating the most effective ways to improve |
| 1.21 | education among the states; NOW, THEREFORE, |

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that federal special education maintenance of effort
requirements should only apply to state appropriations for special education and not to local
school district subsidies for special education from general education funds.
