1.13	Subdivision 1. Establishment; purpose. There is established an early learning				
1.14	scholarships program in order to increase access to high-quality early childhood programs				
1.15	for children ages three to five.				
1.16	Subd. 2. Family eligibility. (a) For a family to receive an early learning scholarship,				
1.17	parents or guardians must meet the following eligibility requirements:				
1.18	(1) have a child three or four years of age on September 1 of the current school year,				
1.19	who has not yet started kindergarten; and				
1.20	(2) have income equal to or less than 185 percent of federal poverty level income

Administration. (a) The commissioner shall establish application 2.28 timelines and determine the schedule for awarding scholarships that meets operational 2.29 needs of eligible families and programs. The commissioner may prioritize applications 2.30 on factors including: 2.31 (1) family income; 2.32 (2) geographic location, and; 2.33 (3) whether the child's family is on a waiting list for a publicly funded program 2.34 providing early education or child care services-; 2.35

For fiscal year 2016 and later, the commissioner shall establish 3.5 a target for the average scholarship amount per child based on the results of the rate 3.6 survey conducted under section 119B.02. The commissioner may award a scholarship 3.7 in excess of this amount to a child who qualifies for priority enrollment under paragraph 3.8 (a), clause (4) or (5). 3.9 (c) A four-star rated program that has children eligible for a scholarship enrolled 3.10 in or on a waiting list for a program beginning in July, August, or September may notify 3.11 the commissioner, in the form and manner prescribed by the commissioner, each year 3.12 of the program's desire to enhance program services or to serve more children than 3.13 current funding provides. The commissioner may designate a predetermined number of 3.14 scholarship slots for that program and notify the program of that number. Beginning July 3.15 1, 2016, a school district or Head Start program qualifying under this paragraph may 3.16 use its established registration process to enroll scholarship recipients and may verify a 3.17 scholarship recipient's family income in the same manner as for other program participants. 3.18 (d) A scholarship is awarded for a 12-month period. If the scholarship recipient has 3.19 not been accepted and subsequently enrolled in a rated program within ten months of the 3.20 awarding of the scholarship, the scholarship cancels and the recipient must reapply in 3.21 order to be eligible for another scholarship. A child may not be awarded more than one 3.22 3.23 scholarship in a 12-month period. (e) A child who receives a scholarship who has not completed development 3.24 screening under sections 121A.16 to 121A.19 must complete that screening within 90 3.25 days of first attending an eligible program. 3.26 (f) For fiscal year 2017 and later, a school district or Head Start program enrolling 3.27 scholarship recipients under paragraph (c) may apply to the commissioner, in the form 3.28 and manner prescribed by the commissioner, for direct payment of state aid.
