7.26 is eligible to apply for and receive a grant in any year of undergraduate study unless the
7.27 student has obtained a baccalaureate degree or previously has been enrolled full time or
7.28 the equivalent for ~~nine~~ eight semesters or the equivalent, excluding courses taken from a
7.29 Minnesota school or postsecondary institution which is not participating in the state grant
7.30 program and from which a student transferred no credit. A student who withdraws from
7.31 enrollment for active military service, or for a major illness, while under the care of a
7.32 medical professional, that substantially limits the student's ability to complete the term is
7.33 entitled to an additional semester or the equivalent of grant eligibility. A student enrolled

13.10 ~~that represents a significant departure in the objectives, content, or method of delivery of~~
13.11 ~~programs to those~~ that are currently offered by the school is \$500 per program.

13.12 Subd. 5. **Visit or consulting fee.** If the office determines that a fact-finding visit
13.13 or outside consultant is necessary to review or evaluate any new or revised program, the
13.14 office shall be reimbursed for the expenses incurred related to the review as follows:

13.15 (1) ~~\$300~~ \$400 for the team base fee or for a paper review conducted by a consultant

13.20 Subd. 6. **Modification fee.** The fee for modification of any existing program is

13.22 (1) an increase or decrease of 25 percent or more, from the original date of program
13.23 approval, in clock hours, credit hours, or calendar length of an existing program;

13.24 (2) a change in academic measurement from clock hours to credit hours or vice
13.25 versa; or

13.26 (3) an addition or alteration of courses that represent a 25 percent change or more in
13.27 the objectives, content, or methods of delivery.

13.28 Subd. 7. **Solicitor permit fee.** The solicitor permit fee is \$350 and must be paid
13.29 annually.

13.30 Subd. 8. **Multiple location fee.** Schools wishing to operate at multiple locations
13.31 must pay:

13.32 (1) \$250 per location, for locations two to five ~~locations~~; and

13.33 (2) an additional ~~\$50~~ \$100 for each location over five.

13.34 Subd. 9. **Student transcript fee.** The fee for a student transcript requested from
