1.6	Section 1. [256C.07] IN-HOME AND COMMUNITY SERVICES FOR OLDER
1.7	ADULTS WITH VISION LOSS.
1.8	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The commissioner of human services shall establish
1.9	a program to provide grant funds for in-home and community services for older adults
1.10	with vision loss to allow older adults with vision loss to live independently and age in
1.11	place. Grant funds shall be distributed to community benefit organizations and nonprofit
1.12	organizations using a request for proposals process.
1.13	Subd. 2. Organizations eligible for grant funds. A community benefit
1.14	organization or nonprofit organization seeking grant funds must submit an application to
1.15	the commissioner according to the terms of the request for proposals. To be eligible for
1.16	grant funds, a community benefit organization or nonprofit organization must:
1.17	(1) have a demonstrated history of providing in-home and community services
1.18	to older adults with vision loss;
1.19	(2) have knowledge of the issues and challenges facing older adults living with
1.20	vision loss;
1.21	(3) have the capacity to provide services to older adults in their homes; and
