1.5	Section 1. [609.2295] CRIMES MOTIVATED BY BIAS.
1.6	Subdivision 1. Crime. A person who commits a crime because of the victim's,
1.7	the property owner's, or another's actual or perceived race, color, religion, sex, sexual
1.8	orientation, disability as defined in section 363A.03, age, or national origin, is guilty of
1.9	a crime motivated by bias and may be sentenced as provided in subdivision 2, unless
1.10	a greater penalty is provided elsewhere.
1.11	Subd. 2. Penalty. (a) If the crime committed in violation of subdivision 1 is a
1.12	felony, the statutory maximum for the crime is five years longer than the statutory
1.13	maximum for the underlying crime.
