1.13	(a) The commissioner may deny a license if an applicant or controlling individual:

- (b) An applicant whose application has been denied by the commissioner must be given 2.15 notice of the denial, which must state the reasons for the denial in plain language. Notice 2.16 must be given by certified mail or personal service. The notice must state the reasons the 2.17 application was denied and must inform the applicant of the right to a contested case hearing 2.18 under chapter 14 and Minnesota Rules, parts 1400.8505 to 1400.8612. The applicant may 2.19 appeal the denial by notifying the commissioner in writing by certified mail or personal 2.20 service. If mailed, the appeal must be postmarked and sent to the commissioner within 20 2.21 calendar days after the applicant received the notice of denial.
