

A bill for an act
relating to capital improvements; appropriating money for environment and
natural resource purposes; spending to acquire and better public land, improve
water quality, and other improvements of a capital nature; authorizing the sale
and issuance of state bonds.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. **OUTDOOR TRADITIONS INVESTMENT; CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT
APPROPRIATIONS.**

The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
bond proceeds fund, or another named fund, to the state agencies or officials indicated,
to be spent for public purposes. Appropriations of bond proceeds must be spent as
authorized by the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5, paragraph (a), to acquire
and better public land and buildings and other public improvements of a capital nature, or
as authorized by the Minnesota Constitution, article XI, section 5, paragraphs (b) to (j), or
article XIV. Unless otherwise specified, the appropriations in this act are available until
the project is completed or abandoned subject to Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.642.

8.2 To provide the money appropriated in section 1 from the bond proceeds fund, the
8.3 commissioner of finance, on request of the governor, shall sell and issue bonds of the
8.4 state in an amount up to \$344,600,000, in the manner, on the terms, and with the effect
8.5 prescribed by Minnesota Statutes, sections 16A.631 to 16A.675, and by the Minnesota
8.6 Constitution, article XI, sections 4 to 7.

8.7 Sec. 8. **EFFECTIVE DATE.**

8.8 Sections 1 to 7 are effective the day following final enactment.
