1.6	Section 1. SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS TASK FORCE.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The School Resource Officers Task Force
1.8	is established to identify, review, evaluate, and recommend standards and training
1.9	requirements for school resource officers.
1.10	Subd. 2. Membership; meetings; staff. (a) The task force shall be composed of
1.11	22 members:
1.12	(1) the director of the Minnesota School Safety Center;
1.13	(2) the commissioner of education or the commissioner's designee;
1.14	(3) one member appointed by the Board of Peace Officer Standards and Training;
1.15	(4) one sheriff appointed by the governor;
1.16	(5) one peace officer appointed by the Minnesota Chiefs of Police Association;
1.17	(6) one school administrator appointed by the Minnesota Association of School
1.18	Administrators;
1.19	(7) two school resource officers appointed by the Minnesota Police and Peace
1.20	Officers Association;
1.21	(8) two licensed teachers, one from a traditional kindergarten through grade 12
1.22	public school setting and one from an intermediate school district or public alternative
1.23	learning center or program, appointed by Education Minnesota;

2.30	Subd. 3. Duties. (a) The duties of the task force shall, at a minimum, include:
2.31	(1) recommending strategies to increase diversity among school resource officers by
2.32	considering how to assign school resource officers so that the demographic characteristics
2.33	of the officer reflect the demographic characteristics of the majority of students attending
2.34	the school served by the officer;

3.3	(3) recommending statewide standards as to how and when school resource officers
3.4	should participate in student discipline in school, including but not limited to student
3.5	dismissal from school under Minnesota Statutes, sections 121A.40 to 121A.56, among
3.6	other student discipline provisions in chapter 121A;
3.7	(4) reviewing and recommending a written operating protocol in the memorandum
3.8	of understanding between a school and a law enforcement agency;
3.9	(5) reviewing and recommending criteria for selecting school resource officers;
3.10	(6) developing and recommending a training protocol; and
3.11	(7) reviewing and recommending best practices for school resource officers.
3.12	(b) At its discretion, the task force may examine other related issues consistent

3.14	Subd. 4. Report. By February 1, 2017, the task force shall submit a written report
3.15	consistent with this section to the chairs and ranking minority members of the house of
3.16	representatives and senate committees and divisions with primary jurisdiction over public
3.17	safety and kindergarten through grade 12 education.
3.18	Subd. 5. Sunset. The task force sunsets the day after submitting its report under
3.19	subdivision 4 or February 2, 2017, whichever is earlier.
3.20	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.

Section 1. 3
