1.7	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:
1.8	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 13.43, subdivision 2, is amended to read:
1.9	Subd. 2. Public data. (a) Except for employees described in subdivision 5 and
1.10	subject to the limitations described in subdivision 5a, the following personnel data on
1.11	current and former employees, volunteers, and independent contractors of a government
1.12	entity is public:
1.13	(1) name; employee identification number, which must not be the employee's Social
1.14	Security number; actual gross salary; salary range; terms and conditions of employment
1.15	relationship; contract fees; actual gross pension; the value and nature of employer paid
1.16	fringe benefits; and the basis for and the amount of any added remuneration, including
1.17	expense reimbursement, in addition to salary;

1.19	and previous work experience;
1.20	(3) date of first and last employment;

2.1 (6) the complete terms of any agreement settling any dispute arising out of an
2.2 employment relationship, including a buyout agreement as defined in section 123B.143,

A disciplinary action does not become public data if an 2.18arbitrator sustains a grievance and reverses all aspects of any disciplinary action. 2.19

The superintendent of a school district or the superintendent's designee, 3.24 or a person having administrative control of a charter school, must release to a requesting 3.25 school district or charter school private personnel data on a current or former employee 3.26 related to acts of violence toward or <u>conduct or</u> sexual contact with a student, if:

(a) "Family assessment" means a comprehensive assessment of child safety, risk 47 of subsequent child maltreatment, and family strengths and needs that is applied to a 4.8 child maltreatment report that does not allege substantial child endangerment. Family 4.9 assessment does not include a determination as to whether child maltreatment occurred 4.10 but does determine the need for services to address the safety of family members and the 4.11 risk of subsequent maltreatment. 4.12

(b) "Investigation" means fact gathering related to the current safety of a child 4.13 and the risk of subsequent maltreatment that determines whether child maltreatment 4.14 occurred and whether child protective services are needed. An investigation must be used 4.15 when reports involve substantial child endangerment, and for reports of maltreatment in 4.16 facilities required to be licensed under chapter 245A or 245D; under sections 144.50 to 4.17 144.58 and 241.021; in a school as defined in sections 120A.05, subdivisions 9, 11, and 4.18 13, and 124D.10; or in a nonlicensed personal care provider association as defined in 4.19 section 256B.0625, subdivision 19a. 4.20

(c) "Substantial child endangerment" means a person responsible for a child's care, 4.21 and in the case of sexual abuse includes a person who has a significant relationship to the 4.22 child as defined in section 609.341, or a person in a position of authority as defined in 4.23 section 609.341, who by act or omission commits or attempts to commit an act against a 4.24 4.25 child under their care that constitutes any of the following:

(f) "Neglect" means the commission or omission of any of the acts specified under
clauses (1) to (9), other than by accidental means:

(1) failure by a person responsible for a child's care to supply a child with necessary 6.1 food, clothing, shelter, health, medical, or other care required for the child's physical or 6.2 mental health when reasonably able to do so; 6.3

- (2) failure to protect a child from conditions or actions that seriously endanger the 6.4 child's physical or mental health when reasonably able to do so, including a growth delay, 6.5 which may be referred to as a failure to thrive, that has been diagnosed by a physician and 6.6 is due to parental neglect; 6.7
- (3) failure to provide for necessary supervision or child care arrangements 6.8 appropriate for a child after considering factors as the child's age, mental ability, physical 6.9 condition, length of absence, or environment, when the child is unable to care for the 6.10 child's own basic needs or safety, or the basic needs or safety of another child in their care; 6.11
- (4) failure to ensure that the child is educated as defined in sections 120A.22 and 6.12 260C.163, subdivision 11, which does not include a parent's refusal to provide the parent's 6.13 child with sympathomimetic medications, consistent with section 125A.091, subdivision 5; 6.14
- (5) nothing in this section shall be construed to mean that a child is neglected solely 6.15 because the child's parent, guardian, or other person responsible for the child's care in 6.16 good faith selects and depends upon spiritual means or prayer for treatment or care of 6.17 disease or remedial care of the child in lieu of medical care; except that a parent, guardian, 6.18 or caretaker, or a person mandated to report pursuant to subdivision 3, has a duty to report 6.19 if a lack of medical care may cause serious danger to the child's health. 8.36	birth record or recognition of parentage identifying a child who is subject to threatened

injury under paragraph (n), the Department of Human Services shall send the data to the 9.1 9.2 responsible social services agency. The data is known as "birth match" data. Unless the responsible social services agency has already begun an investigation or assessment of the 9.3 report due to the birth of the child or execution of the recognition of parentage and the 9.4 parent's previous history with child protection, the agency shall accept the birth match 9.5 data as a report under this section. The agency may use either a family assessment or 9.6 investigation to determine whether the child is safe. All of the provisions of this section 9.7 apply. If the child is determined to be safe, the agency shall consult with the county 9.8 attorney to determine the appropriateness of filing a petition alleging the child is in need 9.9 of protection or services under section 260C.007, subdivision 6, clause (16), in order to 9.10 deliver needed services. If the child is determined not to be safe, the agency and the county 9.11 attorney shall take appropriate action as required under section 260C.503, subdivision 2. 9.12 (p) Persons who conduct assessments or investigations under this section shall take 9.13 into account accepted child-rearing practices of the culture in which a child participates 9.14 and accepted teacher discipline practices, which are not injurious to the child's health, 9.15 welfare, and safety. 9.16 (q) "Accidental" means a sudden, not reasonably foreseeable, and unexpected 9.17 occurrence or event which: 9.18 (1) is not likely to occur and could not have been prevented by exercise of due 9.19 care; and 9.20 (2) if occurring while a child is receiving services from a facility, happens when the 9.21 facility and the employee or person providing services in the facility are in compliance 9.22 9.23 with the laws and rules relevant to the occurrence or event. (r) "Nonmaltreatment mistake" means: 9.24 (1) at the time of the incident, the individual was performing duties identified in the 9.25 center's child care program plan required under Minnesota Rules, part 9503.0045; 9.26 (2) the individual has not been determined responsible for a similar incident that 9.27 resulted in a finding of maltreatment for at least seven years; 9.28 (3) the individual has not been determined to have committed a similar 9.29 nonmaltreatment mistake under this paragraph for at least four years; 9.30 (4) any injury to a child resulting from the incident, if treated, is treated only with 9.31 remedies that are available over the counter, whether ordered by a medical professional or 9.32 not; and 9.33 (5) except for the period when the incident occurred, the facility and the individual 9.34 providing services were both in compliance with all licensing requirements relevant to the 9.35 incident. 9.36

- 10.1 This definition only applies to child care centers licensed under Minnesota
- 10.2 Rules, chapter 9503. If clauses (1) to (5) apply, rather than making a determination of
- 10.3 substantiated maltreatment by the individual, the commissioner of human services shall
- 10.4 determine that a nonmaltreatment mistake was made by the individual.
