1.8	Subdivision 1. Establishment. The commissioner of human services must establish and
1.9	appoint a task force on trauma-informed policy and practices to prevent and reduce children's
1.10	exposure to adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) consisting of the following members:
1.11 1.12	(1) the commissioners of human services, public safety, health, and education or the commissioners' designees;
1.13	(2) two members representing law enforcement with expertise in juvenile justice;
1.14	(3) two members representing county social services agencies;
1.15	(4) four members of the legislature, two members of the senate, one appointed by the
1.16	majority leader and one appointed by the minority leader, and two members of the house
1.17	of representatives, one appointed by the speaker of the house and one appointed by the

2.6	(11) two ombudspersons from the Minnesota Office of Ombudsperson for Families; and
2.7	(12) representatives of any other group the commissioner of human services deems
2.8	appropriate to complete the duties of the task force.
2.9	Subd. 2. Staff. The commissioner of human services must provide meeting space, support
2.10	staff, and administrative services for the task force.
2.11	Subd. 3. Duties. The task force must perform the following duties:
2.12	(1) engage the human services, education, public health, juvenile justice, and criminal
2.13	justice systems in the creation of trauma-informed policy and practices in each of these
2.14	systems to prevent and reduce ACEs and to support the health and well-being of all families;

2.16	(2) identify social determinants of the health and well-being of all families and
2.17	recommend solutions to eliminate racial and ethnic disparities in the state.
2.18	Subd. 4. Report. The task force must submit a report on the results of its duties outlined
2.19	in subdivision 3 and any policy recommendations to the chairs and ranking minority members
2.20	of the legislative committees with jurisdiction over health and human services, public safety,
2.21	judiciary, and education by January 15 of each year.
2.22	Subd. 5. Expiration. The task force expires June 30, 2025.
2.23	EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.
