[15.0146] MINNESOTA YOUTH ADVISORY COUNCIL. 1.8 Subdivision 1. Council established. The Minnesota Youth Advisory Council is 1.9 established. The purpose of the council is to provide a voice to Minnesota's youth community 1.10 in policy development and decision making on issues that impact the community. 1.11 Subd. 2. **Membership.** (a) The membership of the council is as described in this 1.12 subdivision. 1.13 (b) The governor must appoint three members to represent each of the state's 1.14 congressional districts. Of these, two members from each congressional district must be in 1.15 grades 8 through 12 at the time of appointment, and one member must be between the ages 1.16 of 19 and 23 at the time of appointment. The governor may only appoint an individual under 1.17 the age of 18 to the council with the consent of the individual's parent or guardian. The 1.18 governor must attempt to ensure that the demographic composition of the council accurately 1.19 reflects the demographic composition of Minnesota's youth community as determined by 1.20 the state demographer. 1.21 (c) Four legislators are voting members of the council. The speaker of the house and the 1.22

house minority leader must each appoint one member to the council. The Subcommittee on

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Committees of the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration must appoint one member 2.1 of the majority caucus and one member of the minority caucus to the council. 2.2 (d) The governor may appoint a commissioner of a state agency or a designee of that 2.3 commissioner to serve as an ex officio, nonvoting member of the council. 2.4 2.5 Subd. 3. Appointments; terms; removal. (a) The council's executive director and the legislative members may offer advice to the governor on applicants seeking appointment 2.6 to the council. 2.7 (b) Terms, compensation, and filling of vacancies for members appointed by the governor 2.8 are as provided in section 15.059, except that the term of a member is two years. Removal 2.9 of members appointed by the governor is governed by section 15.059, except that: (1) a 2.10 member who missed more than half of the council meetings convened during a 12-month 2.11 2.12 period automatically is removed from the council; and (2) a member appointed by the governor may be removed by a vote of three of the four legislative members of the council. 2.13 The chair of the council must inform the governor of the need for the governor to fill a 2.14 vacancy on the council. Legislative members serve at the pleasure of their appointing 2.15 authority. 2.16 (c) An appointee of the governor may serve one term on the council. A legislator may 2.17 serve no more than eight consecutive years or 12 nonconsecutive years on this council or 2.18 a council established in section 15.0145. 2.19 Subd. 4. Training; executive committee; meetings; support. (a) A member appointed 2.20 by the governor must attend orientation training within the first six months of service for 2.21 the member's term. The commissioner of administration must arrange for the training to 2.22 include but not be limited to the legislative process and the duties and responsibilities 2.23 associated with membership on a state advisory council. The governor must remove a 2.24 member who does not complete the training. 2.25 (b) The council must annually elect from among the members appointed by the governor 2.26 a chair and other officers the council deems necessary. The elected officers and one legislative 2.27 member selected by the council must serve as the executive committee of the council. 2.28 (c) Forty percent of voting members of the council constitutes a quorum. A quorum is 2.29 required to conduct council business. A council member may not vote on any action if the 2.30 member has a conflict of interest under section 10A.07. 2.31 (d) The council must receive administrative support from the commissioner of 2.32 administration under section 16B.371. The council may contract in its own name but must 2.33

Sec. 3. EFFECTIVE DATE; INITIAL APPOINTMENTS.

This act is effective July 1, 2023. The governor and legislature must make initial
appointments to the council no later than August 1, 2023. The executive director of the
Legislative Coordinating Commission must convene the first meeting of the council no later
than September 15, 2023.

APPENDIX

Repealed Minnesota Statutes: 23-00569

124D.957 MINNESOTA YOUTH COUNCIL COMMITTEE.

Subdivision 1. **Establishment and membership.** The Minnesota Youth Council Committee is established within and under the auspices of the Minnesota Alliance With Youth. The committee consists of four members from each congressional district in Minnesota and four members selected at-large. Members must be selected through an application and interview process conducted by the Minnesota Alliance With Youth. In making its appointments, the Minnesota Alliance With Youth should strive to ensure gender and ethnic diversity in the committee's membership. Members must be between the ages of 13 and 19 and serve two-year terms, except that one-half of the initial members must serve a one-year term. Members may serve a maximum of two terms.

Subd. 2. **Duties.** The Minnesota Youth Council Committee shall:

- (1) provide advice and recommendations to the legislature and the governor on issues affecting youth;
 - (2) serve as a liaison for youth around the state to the legislature and the governor; and
 - (3) submit an annual report of the council's activities and goals.
- Subd. 3. **Partnerships.** The Minnesota Youth Council Committee shall partner with nonprofits, the private sector, and educational resources to fulfill its duties.
- Subd. 4. **Youth Council Committee in the legislature.** (a) The Minnesota Youth Council Committee shall meet at least twice each year during the regular session of the legislature.
 - (b) The committee may:
- (1) select introduced bills in the house of representatives and senate for consideration for a public hearing before the committee;
 - (2) propose youth legislation;
 - (3) provide advisory opinions to the legislature on bills heard before the committee; and
 - (4) prepare a youth omnibus bill.
- (c) The leaders of the majority and minority parties of the house of representatives and senate shall each appoint one legislator to serve as a legislative liaison to the committee. Leadership of the house of representatives and senate, on rotating years, may appoint a staff member to staff the committee.
