[148.9984] LICENSE RENEWAL REQUIREMENTS. 4.7 Subdivision 1. Biennial renewal. A license must be renewed every two years. 4.8 Subd. 2. License renewal notice. At least 60 calendar days before the renewal deadline 4.9 date, the board must mail a renewal notice to the licensee's last known address on file with 4.10 the board. The notice must include instructions for accessing an online application for license 4.11 renewal, the renewal deadline, and notice of fees required for renewal. The licensee's failure 4.12 to receive notice does not relieve the licensee of the obligation to meet the renewal deadline 4.13 and other requirements for license renewal. 4.14 Subd. 3. Renewal requirements. (a) To renew a license, a licensee must submit to the 4.15 board: 4.16 (1) a completed and signed application for license renewal; 4.17 (2) the license renewal fee as specified under section 148.9995; and 4.18 (3) evidence satisfactory to the board that the licensee holds a current and active national 4.19 certification as a behavior analyst or assistant behavior analyst from the certifying entity or 4.20 otherwise meets renewal requirements as established by the board, in consultation with the 4.21 advisory council. 4.22 (b) The application for license renewal and fee must be postmarked or received by the 4.23 4.24 board by the end of the day on which the license expires or the following business day if the expiration date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday. A renewal application that is 4.25 not completed and signed, or that is not accompanied by the correct fee, is void and must 4.26 be returned to the licensee. 4.27 Subd. 4. **Pending renewal.** If a licensee's application for license renewal is postmarked 4.28 or received by the board by the end of the business day on the expiration date of the license 4.29 or the following business day if the expiration date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday, 4.30 4.31 the licensee may continue to practice after the expiration date while the application for license renewal is pending with the board. 4.32

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Subd. 5. Late renewal fee. If the application for license renewal is postmarked or received after the expiration date of the license or the following business day if the expiration date falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or holiday, the licensee must pay a biennial renewal late fee as specified by section 148.9995, in addition to the renewal fee, before the licensee's application for license renewal will be considered by the board.

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- (a) Within 30 days after the renewal date, a licensee who has not renewed their license must be notified by letter, sent to the last known address of the licensee in the board's file, that the renewal is overdue and that failure to pay the current fee and current biennial renewal late fee within 60 days after the renewal date will result in termination of the license.
- (b) The board must terminate the license of a licensee whose license renewal is at least 60 days overdue and to whom notification has been sent as provided in paragraph (a). Failure of a licensee to receive notification is not grounds for later challenge of the termination.

 The former licensee must be notified of the termination by letter within seven days after board action, in the same manner as provided in paragraph (a).
- (c) Notwithstanding paragraph (b), the board retains jurisdiction over a former licensee for complaints received after termination of a license regarding conduct that occurred during licensure.

Sec. 6. [148.9986] PROHIBITED PRACTICE OR USE OF TITLES; PENALTY.

Subdivision 1. **Practice.** Effective January 1, 2022, an individual must not engage in the practice of applied behavior analysis unless the individual is licensed under sections 148.9981 to 148.9995 as a behavior analyst or assistant behavior analyst, or is exempt under section 148.9987. A psychologist licensed under sections 148.88 to 148.981 who practices behavior analysis is not required to obtain a license as a behavior analyst under sections 148.9981 to 148.9995.

- Subd. 2. Use of titles. (a) An individual must not use a title incorporating the words "licensed behavior analyst," "behavior analyst," "licensed assistant behavior analyst," or "assistant behavior analyst," or use any other title or description stating or implying that they are licensed or otherwise qualified to practice applied behavior analysis, unless that person holds a valid license under sections 148.9981 to 148.9995.
- (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a), a licensed psychologist who practices applied behavior
 analysis within the psychologist's scope of practice may use the title "behavior analyst," but

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must not use the title "licensed behavior analyst" unless the licensed psychologist holds a 6.1 valid license as a behavior analyst issued under sections 148.9981 to 148.9995. 6.2 Subd. 3. **Penalty.** An individual who violates this section is guilty of a misdemeanor. 6.3 Sec. 7. [148.9987] EXCEPTIONS TO LICENSE REQUIREMENT. 6.4 (a) Sections 148.9981 to 148.9995 must not be construed to prohibit or restrict: 6.5 (1) the practice of an individual who is licensed to practice psychology in the state or 6.6 an individual who is providing psychological services under the supervision of a licensed 6.7 psychologist in accordance with section 148.925; 6.8 (2) the practice of any other profession or occupation licensed, certified, or registered 6.9 by the state by an individual duly licensed, certified, or registered to practice the profession 6.10 or occupation or to perform any act that falls within the scope of practice of the profession 6.11 or occupation; 6.12 6.13 (3) an individual who is employed by a school district from providing behavior analysis services as part of the individual's employment with the school district, so long as the 6.14 6.15 individual does not provide behavior analysis services to any person or entity other than as an employee of the school district or accept remuneration for the provision of behavior 6.16 analysis services outside of the individual's employment with the school district; 6.17 (4) an employee of a program licensed under chapter 245D from providing the services 6.18 described in section 245D.091, subdivision 1; 6.19 (5) teaching behavior analysis or conducting behavior analysis research if the teaching 6.20 or research does not involve the direct delivery of behavior analysis services; 6.21 (6) providing behavior analysis services by an unlicensed supervisee or trainee under 6.22 the authority and direction of a licensed behavior analyst or licensed assistant behavior 6.23 6.24 analyst and in compliance with the licensure and supervision standards required by statute or rule; 6.25 (7) a family member or guardian of the recipient of behavior analysis services from 6.26 performing behavior analysis services under the authority and direction of a licensed behavior 6.27 analyst or a licensed assistant behavior analyst; or 6.28 (8) students or interns enrolled in an accredited school or educational program, or 6.29 participating in a behavior analysis practicum, from engaging in the practice of applied 6.30

behavior analysis while supervised by a licensed behavior analyst, licensed assistant behavior

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analyst, or instructor of an accredited school or educational program. These individuals 7.1 must be designated as a behavior analyst student or intern. 7.2 (b) Notwithstanding paragraph (a), a licensed psychologist may supervise an unlicensed 7.3 supervisee, trainee, student, or intern who is engaged in the practice of behavior analysis if 7.4 7.5 the supervision is authorized under the Minnesota Psychology Practice Act. Sec. 8. [148.9988] NONTRANSFERABILITY OF LICENSES. 7.6 A behavior analyst license or an assistant behavior analyst license is not transferable. 7.7 Sec. 9. [148.9989] DUTY TO MAINTAIN CURRENT INFORMATION. 7.8 All licensees and applicants for licensure must notify the board within 30 days of the 7.9 occurrence of: 7.10 (1) a change of name, address, place of employment, or home or business telephone 7.11 number; or 7.12 (2) a change in any other application information. 7.13 Sec. 10. [148.999] DISCIPLINE; REPORTING. 7.14 For purposes of sections 148.9981 to 148.9995, behavior analysts and assistant behavior 7.15 7.16 analysts are subject to the provisions of sections 148.941, 148.952 to 148.965, and 148.98. Sec. 11. [148.9991] COMPETENT PROVISION OF SERVICES. 7.17 Subdivision 1. Limits on practice. Behavior analysts must limit practice to the client 7.18 populations and services for which the behavior analysts have competence or for which the 7.19 behavior analysts are developing competence. 7.20 Subd. 2. **Developing competence.** When a behavior analyst is developing competence 7.21 in a service, method, or procedure, or is developing competence to treat a specific client 7.22 population, the behavior analyst must obtain professional education, training, continuing 7.23 education, consultation, supervision or experience, or a combination thereof, necessary to 7.24 demonstrate competence. 7.25 7.26 Subd. 3. Limitations. A behavior analyst must recognize the limitations to the scope of practice of applied behavior analysis. When the needs of a client appear to be outside the 7.27 behavior analyst's scope of practice, the behavior analyst must inform the client that there 7.28 may be other professional, technical, community, and administrative resources available to 7.29

[148.9992] DUTY TO WARN; LIMITATION ON LIABILITY; VIOLENT 8.6 BEHAVIOR OF PATIENT. 8.7 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) For the purposes of this section, the terms in this 8.8 subdivision have the meanings given. 8.9 (b) "Other person" means an immediate family member or someone who personally 8.10 knows the client and has reason to believe the client is capable of and will carry out a serious, 8.11 specific threat of harm to a specific, clearly identified or identifiable victim. 8.12 8.13 (c) "Reasonable efforts" means communicating a serious, specific threat to the potential victim and, if unable to make contact with the potential victim, communicating the serious, 8.14 specific threat to the law enforcement agency closest to the potential victim or the client. 8.15 (d) "Licensee" includes behavior analysis students, interns, and unlicensed supervisees 8.16 who are participating in a behavior analysis practicum or enrolled in an accredited school 8.17 or educational program. 8.18 Subd. 2. Duty to warn. The duty to predict, warn of, or take reasonable precautions to 8.19 provide protection from violent behavior arises only when a client or other person has 8.20 communicated to the licensee a specific, serious threat of physical violence against a specific, 8.21 clearly identified or identifiable potential victim. If a duty to warn arises, the duty is 8.22 discharged by the licensee if reasonable efforts are made to communicate the threat. 8.23 Subd. 3. Liability standard. If no duty to warn exists under subdivision 2, then no 8.24 monetary liability and no cause of action may arise against a licensee for failure to predict, 8.25 warn of, or take reasonable precautions to provide protection from a client's violent behavior. 8.26 Subd. 4. Disclosure of confidences. Good faith compliance with the duty to warn must 8.27

Subd. 5. Continuity of care. Subdivision 2 must not be construed to authorize a licensee to terminate treatment of a client as a direct result of a client's violent behavior or threat of

[148.9993] INFORMED CONSENT. Subdivision 1. Obtaining informed consent for services. A behavior analyst must 9.17 9.18 obtain informed consent from the client or the client's legal guardian before initiating services. The informed consent must be in writing, signed by the client, and include, at a 9.19 minimum, the following: 9.20 (1) consent for the behavior analyst to engage in activities that directly affect the client; 9.21 (2) the goals, purposes, and procedures of the proposed services; 9.22 (3) the factors that may impact the duration of the proposed services; 9.23 9.24 (4) the applicable fee schedule for the proposed services; (5) the significant risks and benefits of the proposed services; 9.25 (6) the behavior analyst's limits under section 148.9991, including, if applicable, 9.26 information that the behavior analyst is developing competence in the proposed service, 9.27 9.28 method, or procedure, and alternatives to the proposed service, if any; and (7) the behavior analyst's responsibilities if the client terminates the service. 9.29

10.8	Subdivision 1. Membership. The Behavior Analyst Advisory Council is created and
10.9	composed of seven members appointed by the board. The advisory council consists of:

10.11	(2) three members who are licensed behavior analysts;
10.12	(3) two members who are licensed assistant behavior analysts; and
10.13	(4) one member who is a licensed psychologist and, to the extent practicable, who

10.16	section 15.059, except that the advisory council does not expire.
