

1.1 A bill for an act
1.2 relating to capital investment; authorizing spending to acquire and better land and
1.3 buildings and for other improvements of a capital nature with certain conditions;
1.4 establishing and modifying programs; canceling prior appropriations; appropriating
1.5 money; amending Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 15B.03, subdivision 4;
1.6 16A.966, subdivision 2; 116J.435, subdivisions 1, 7; 134.45, subdivision 5;
1.7 240A.20, subdivisions 1, 3, by adding subdivisions; 256E.37, subdivision 1;
1.8 repealing Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 16A.93; 16A.94; 16A.96.

1.9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.10 **ARTICLE 1**
1.11 **APPROPRIATIONS**

1.12 Section 1. **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT APPROPRIATIONS.**

1.13 (a) The sums shown in the column under "Appropriations" are appropriated from the
1.14 general fund in fiscal year 2024 to the state agencies or officials indicated, to be spent for
1.15 public purposes. These are onetime appropriations. Money appropriated in this act is available
1.16 until the project is completed or abandoned, subject to Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.642.

1.17 (b) For any project funded in whole or in part by this act, workers on the project must
1.18 be paid at least the prevailing wage rate as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 177.42,
1.19 subdivision 6, and the project is subject to the requirements and enforcement provisions in
1.20 Minnesota Statutes, sections 177.27, 177.30, 177.32, and 177.41 to 177.45. For the purposes
1.21 of this act, "project" means demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of
1.22 a public building, facility, or other public work financed in whole or part by state funds.
1.23 Project also includes demolition, erection, construction, remodeling, or repairing of a
1.24 building, facility, or public work when the acquisition of property, predesign, design, or
1.25 demolition is financed in whole or in part by state funds.

2.1 (c) Money appropriated in this act: (1) is available for a grant after the commissioner of
2.2 management and budget determines that an amount sufficient to complete the project as
2.3 described in this act has been committed to the project, as required by Minnesota Statutes,
2.4 section 16A.502; and (2) may be used to pay state agency staff costs that are attributed
2.5 directly to the capital program or project for capitalizable staff costs.

2.6 (d) The sustainable building guidelines under Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.325, are
2.7 mandatory for all new buildings and major renovations owned or to be owned by the state,
2.8 state agencies, Minnesota State Colleges and Universities, and the University of Minnesota
2.9 that are funded with an appropriation in this act.

2.10 (e) Recipients of grants from money appropriated in this act must demonstrate to the
2.11 commissioner of the agency making the grant that the recipient has the ability and a plan
2.12 to fund the program intended for the facility. This paragraph does not apply to state agencies.

2.14 **Sec. 2. NATURAL RESOURCES**

2.15 **Subdivision 1. Total Appropriation** **\$ 14,116,000**

2.16 (a) To the commissioner of natural resources
2.17 for the purposes specified in this section.

2.18 (b) The appropriations in this section are
2.19 subject to the requirements of the natural
2.20 resources capital improvement program under
2.21 Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.12, unless
2.22 this section or the statutes referred to in this
2.23 section provide more specific standards,
2.24 criteria, or priorities for projects than
2.25 Minnesota Statutes, section 86A.12.

2.26 **Subd. 2. Community Tree Planting Grants** **1,663,000**

2.27 For grants to cities, counties, townships, Tribal
2.28 governments, and park and recreation boards
2.29 in cities of the first class, to remove and plant
2.30 shade trees on public or Tribal land to provide
2.31 environmental benefits; to replace trees lost
2.32 to forest pests, disease, or storm; or to
2.33 establish a more diverse community forest

3.1 better able to withstand disease and forest
3.2 pests. For purposes of this appropriation,
3.3 "shade tree" means a woody perennial grown
3.4 primarily for aesthetic or environmental
3.5 purposes with minimal to residual timber
3.6 value. Any tree planted with money under this
3.7 subdivision must be a climate-adapted species
3.8 to Minnesota.

3.9 **Subd. 3. Canisteo Legacy Mine Pit Complex** 8,875,000

3.10 (a) For the acquisition of land or interests in
3.11 land and for construction of publicly owned
3.12 infrastructure to mitigate the imminent threat
3.13 to public safety, property, and regional water
3.14 quality from the rising water at the Canisteo
3.15 legacy mine pit complex.

3.16 (b) Upon substantial completion of the project
3.17 authorized in this subdivision and after written
3.18 notice to the commissioner of management
3.19 and budget, the commissioner of natural
3.20 resources may use any money remaining in
3.21 this appropriation to design, engineer, and
3.22 construct publicly owned water mitigation
3.23 infrastructure at the Hill annex open pit mining
3.24 complex.

3.25 (c) Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes,
3.26 sections 92.50 and 282.04, or other law to the
3.27 contrary, the commissioner and the county
3.28 may enter into leases for this project for a term
3.29 that is consistent with meeting project needs.
3.30 A lease entered into under this subdivision
3.31 must include a provision that provides for the
3.32 amendment or termination of the lease when
3.33 (1) the commissioner of natural resources
3.34 determines that the project is no longer needed
3.35 to serve the intended purpose or identifies a

4.1 more effective alternative to the constructed
4.2 project; or (2) mining operations are fully
4.3 permitted to resume in all or part of the
4.4 property acquired or improved with this
4.5 appropriation.

4.6 **Subd. 4. Grant Administration** 209,000

4.7 For administration of direct grants funded with
4.8 an appropriation in bills that appropriate
4.9 money for capital investment projects.

4.10 **Subd. 5. Glendalough State Park** 200,000

4.11 To complete the paved multipurpose trail from
4.12 the bridge at the northwest corner of Annie
4.13 Battle Lake to the park entrance at
4.14 Glendalough State Park established under
4.15 Minnesota Statutes, section 85.012,
4.16 subdivision 23a.

4.17 **Subd. 6. All-Terrain Vehicle Trail Systems** 1,294,000

4.18 (a) For capital improvements to the Voyageur
4.19 Country, Prospector Loop, and Quad Cities
4.20 all-terrain vehicle trail systems in the counties
4.21 of St. Louis, Lake, and Koochiching. This
4.22 appropriation is exempt from the requirements
4.23 under Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.86,
4.24 subdivision 4.

4.25 (b) \$844,000 of this appropriation is for
4.26 acquisition of real property, predesign, design,
4.27 and construction of alignment and extension
4.28 of the Voyageur Country all-terrain vehicle
4.29 trail.

4.30 (c) \$450,000 of this appropriation is for
4.31 predesign, design, and construction of capital
4.32 improvements to and extension of the
4.33 Prospector all-terrain vehicle trail to create a

5.1 trail connection point at the Pfeiffer Lake
5.2 recreation area.
5.3 (d) \$50,000 of this appropriation is for
5.4 predesign, design, and construction of capital
5.5 improvements to the Quad Cities all-terrain
5.6 vehicle trail to repair erosion damage, improve
5.7 storm water management, and widen the trail.

5.8 (e) Any unexpended amount for a project
5.9 described in paragraph (b), (c), or (d) that has
5.10 been substantially completed may be applied
5.11 to any other project described in this
5.12 subdivision.

5.13 **Subd. 7. Rochester; Willow Creek Trail** 1,875,000

5.14 For a grant to the city of Rochester to
5.15 predesign, design, engineer, construct, furnish,
5.16 and equip a paved trail to extend the Rochester
5.17 Trail network approximately 2.5 miles from
5.18 28th Street SE to Gamehaven Regional Park
5.19 and the future extension of the Bluestem Trail
5.20 to Stewartville. This project includes a trail
5.21 crossing under U.S. Highway 52,
5.22 property/easement acquisition, trail
5.23 rehabilitation, creek crossing, trail
5.24 construction, installation of trail wayfinding
5.25 and rest areas, and a trailhead located at
5.26 Gamehaven Regional Park.

5.27 **Subd. 8. Unspent Appropriations**

5.28 The unspent portion of an appropriation for a
5.29 project in this section that is complete, upon
5.30 written notice to the commissioner of
5.31 management and budget, is available for asset
5.32 preservation under Minnesota Statutes, section
5.33 84.946. Minnesota Statutes, section 16A.642,
5.34 applies from the date of the original

6.1 appropriation to the unspent amount
6.2 transferred.

6.3 **Sec. 3. POLLUTION CONTROL AGENCY**

6.4 **Subdivision 1. Total Appropriation** **\$ 47,728,000**

6.5 To the Pollution Control Agency for the
6.6 purposes specified in this section.

6.7 **Subd. 2. Pope-Douglas Solid Waste**
6.8 **Management; Materials Recovery Facility** **12,833,000**

6.9 For a grant to the Pope-Douglas Solid Waste
6.10 Management Joint Powers Board under the
6.11 solid waste capital assistance grant program
6.12 under Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.54,
6.13 to predesign, design, and construct the
6.14 renovation of the existing Material Recovery
6.15 Facility to add additional space for the
6.16 installation of advanced processing equipment
6.17 with the ability to process raw incoming
6.18 municipal solid waste with the capability to
6.19 switch over to processing single sort recycling.
6.20 This appropriation is notwithstanding the
6.21 maximum amount of grant assistance for a
6.22 project under Minnesota Statutes, section
6.23 115A.54, and is in addition to the
6.24 appropriation made in Laws 2020, Fifth
6.25 Special Session chapter 3, article 1, section 8,
6.26 subdivision 4.

6.27 **Subd. 3. Andover; Drinking Water**
6.28 **Contamination Mitigation** **6,100,000**

6.29 (a) For a grant to the city of Andover for the
6.30 design and construction of new municipal
6.31 water mains, new water service lines on
6.32 private property that connect to the municipal
6.33 water mains, and for capping private wells in
6.34 the city's Red Oaks neighborhood where

7.1 testing has found contamination in private
7.2 drinking water wells.

7.3 (b) Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes,
7.4 section 115B.17, subdivisions 6 and 16, any
7.5 money recovered by the Pollution Control
7.6 Agency in a civil action for expenses paid
7.7 under this appropriation shall be transferred
7.8 to the commissioner of management and
7.9 budget for deposit in the general fund.

7.10 **Subd. 4. Hennepin County; Anaerobic Digester** **26,000,000**

7.11 For a grant to Hennepin County to predesign,
7.12 design, construct, furnish, and equip a new
7.13 anaerobic digestion facility in the city of
7.14 Brooklyn Park.

7.15 This appropriation is not available until
7.16 Hennepin County submits a plan for the
7.17 cessation of operations at the Hennepin Energy
7.18 Recovery Center to the chairs and ranking
7.19 minority members of the legislative
7.20 committees with primary jurisdiction over
7.21 capital investment and environment and
7.22 natural resources.

7.23 **Subd. 5. Todd County; Solid Waste Facility** **2,795,000**

7.24 For a grant to Todd County under the solid
7.25 waste capital assistance grant program under
7.26 Minnesota Statutes, section 115A.54, to
7.27 design, construct, and equip a new solid waste
7.28 transfer station and household hazardous waste
7.29 facility. This appropriation is in addition to
7.30 the appropriation in Laws 2020, Fifth Special
7.31 Session chapter 3, article 1, section 8,
7.32 subdivision 8, for the same purpose.

7.33 **Sec. 4. BOARD OF WATER AND SOIL**
7.34 **RESOURCES** **\$ 1,500,000**

8.1 To the Board of Water and Soil Resources for
8.2 one or more grants to local governments for
8.3 the state's share of a grant for capital
8.4 improvements to prevent or alleviate flood
8.5 damage in Area II of the Minnesota River
8.6 Basin. This appropriation is not available until
8.7 the board determines that \$1 has been
8.8 committed from nonstate sources for every \$3
8.9 of state grant funding.

8.10 **Sec. 5. AGRICULTURE** **\$** **73,000**

8.11 To the commissioner of administration to
8.12 design, construct, and equip the renovation
8.13 and repair of the plant protection division's
8.14 potato inspection facility located in East Grand
8.15 Forks. This appropriation may also be used to
8.16 design and complete hazardous materials
8.17 abatement.

8.18 **Sec. 6. ADMINISTRATION**

8.19 **Subdivision 1. Total Appropriation** **\$** **5,143,000**

8.20 To the commissioner of administration for the
8.21 purposes specified in this section.

8.22 **Subd. 2. Capitol Complex - Physical Security**
8.23 **Upgrades Phase II** **297,000**

8.24 For the continuation of the design,
8.25 construction, and equipping required to
8.26 upgrade the physical security elements and
8.27 systems for the Capitol Mall and the buildings
8.28 listed in this subdivision, their attached tunnel
8.29 systems, their surrounding grounds, and
8.30 parking facilities as identified in the 2017
8.31 Minnesota State Capitol Complex Physical
8.32 Security Predesign completed by Miller
8.33 Dunwiddie and an updated assessment
8.34 completed in 2022. Upgrades include but are

9.1 not limited to the installation of bollards, blast
9.2 protection, infrastructure security screen walls,
9.3 door access controls, emergency call stations,
9.4 surveillance systems, security kiosks, locking
9.5 devices, and traffic and crowd control devices.

9.6 This appropriation includes money for work
9.7 associated with the following buildings:

9.8 Anderson, Freeman, Minnesota Senate,
9.9 Retirement Systems, and Transportation
9.10 buildings.

9.11 **Subd. 3. Ford Building** 4,542,000

9.12 (a) To design the abatement of hazardous
9.13 materials and demolition of, and to demolish
9.14 and abate hazardous materials at, the Ford
9.15 Building and associated infrastructure located
9.16 on the Capitol complex as the first phase of
9.17 overall site redevelopment. This appropriation
9.18 may also be used to design, construct, and
9.19 equip improvements to maintain access to the
9.20 Capitol complex tunnel system as well as to
9.21 provide security, irrigation, and landscaping
9.22 for the site.

9.23 (b) Notwithstanding Minnesota Statutes,
9.24 chapter 15B, or the Comprehensive Plan for
9.25 the Minnesota State Capitol Area, no
9.26 additional study shall be required prior to a
9.27 building permit being issued for the work
9.28 authorized in this appropriation or to proceed
9.29 with such work.

9.30 **Subd. 4. Sustainable Building Guidelines;**
9.31 **Recommendations and Report** 304,000

9.32 To develop recommendations for updating
9.33 goals, measuring project performance in
9.34 meeting the goals, applicability, compliance,
9.35 waivers, outreach, and administration of the

10.1 sustainable building guidelines under
10.2 Minnesota Statutes, section 16B.325, in
10.3 collaboration with the commissioner of
10.4 commerce and the Center for Sustainable
10.5 Building Research at the University of
10.6 Minnesota. The commissioner of
10.7 administration may contract with the
10.8 commissioner of commerce and the Center
10.9 for Sustainable Building Research at the
10.10 University of Minnesota for assistance in
10.11 developing the recommendations, including
10.12 obtaining input from public owners, nonprofit
10.13 owners, design professionals, and other
10.14 stakeholders. The commissioner of
10.15 administration must provide a report of
10.16 findings and recommendations to the chairs
10.17 and ranking minority members of the
10.18 legislative committees with jurisdiction over
10.19 capital investment, energy finance and policy,
10.20 and environment finance and policy on or
10.21 before October 15, 2023.

10.22 **Sec. 7. AMATEUR SPORTS COMMISSION** **\$ 4,000,000**

10.23 (a) To the Minnesota Amateur Sports
10.24 Commission for grants to cities, towns,
10.25 counties, park boards, and school districts for
10.26 the planning and building of public skate parks
10.27 under Minnesota Statutes, section 240A.20,
10.28 subdivision 3, with the assistance of the
10.29 nonprofit consultant hired under paragraph
10.30 (b).

10.31 (b) Of this appropriation, up to \$100,000 may
10.32 be used to hire a Minnesota nonprofit
10.33 consultant with expertise in public skate park
10.34 development to assist the commission in
10.35 developing and applying the criteria for

- (1) state income taxes and any other revenues collected in the year after the service was provided that would not have been collected without the service; and
- (2) costs avoided by the state by providing the service.

Prior to entering into a contract under subdivision 3, the commissioner in consultation with the oversight committee must determine that the services provided under the contract will yield a positive return on investment for the state that will cover the estimated state costs in financing and administering the pilot program through documented increased state tax revenue or cost avoidance.

Subd. 5. **Report to governor and legislature.** The commissioner must report to the governor and legislative committees with jurisdiction over capital investment, finance, and ways and means, and the services included in the pilot program, by January 15 of each year following a year in which the pilot program is operating. The report must describe and discuss the criteria for selection and evaluation of services to be provided through the program, the net benefits to the state of the program, the state's return on investment, the cost of the services provided by other means in the most recent past, the time frame for payment for the services, and the timing and costs for sale and issuance of the bonds authorized in section 16A.96.

16A.96 MINNESOTA PAY-FOR-PERFORMANCE PROGRAM; APPROPRIATION BONDS.

Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) The definitions in this subdivision apply to this section.

(b) "Appropriation bond" means a bond, note, or other similar instrument of the state payable during a biennium from one or more of the following sources:

- (1) money appropriated by law in any biennium for debt service due with respect to obligations described in subdivision 2, paragraph (b);

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(2) proceeds of the sale of obligations described in subdivision 2, paragraph (b);

(3) payments received for that purpose under agreements and ancillary arrangements described in subdivision 2, paragraph (d); and

(4) investment earnings on amounts in clauses (1) to (3).

(c) "Debt service" means the amount payable in any biennium of principal, premium, if any, and interest on appropriation bonds.

Subd. 2. **Authority.** (a) Subject to the limitations of this subdivision, the commissioner of management and budget may sell and issue appropriation bonds of the state under this section for the purposes of the Minnesota pay-for-performance program established in sections 16A.93 to 16A.96. Proceeds of the bonds must be credited to a special appropriation bond proceeds account in the state treasury. Net income from investment of the proceeds, as estimated by the commissioner, must be credited to the special appropriation bond proceeds account.

(b) Appropriation bonds may be sold and issued in amounts that, in the opinion of the commissioner, are necessary to provide sufficient funds for achieving the purposes authorized as provided under paragraph (a), and pay debt service, pay costs of issuance, make deposits to reserve funds, pay the costs of credit enhancement, or make payments under other agreements entered into under paragraph (d); provided, however, that bonds issued and unpaid shall not exceed \$10,000,000 in principal amount, excluding refunding bonds sold and issued under subdivision 4. The commissioner may sell and issue bonds only in an amount that the commissioner determines will result in principal and interest payments less than the amount of savings to be generated through pay-for-performance contracts under section 16A.94. For programs achieving savings under a pay-for-performance contract, the commissioner must reduce general fund appropriations by at least the amount of principal and interest payments on bonds issued under this section.

(c) Appropriation bonds may be issued in one or more series on the terms and conditions the commissioner determines to be in the best interests of the state, but the term on any series of bonds may not exceed 20 years.

(d) At the time of, or in anticipation of, issuing the appropriation bonds, and at any time thereafter, so long as the appropriation bonds are outstanding, the commissioner may enter into agreements and ancillary arrangements relating to the appropriation bonds, including but not limited to trust indentures, liquidity facilities, remarketing or dealer agreements, letter of credit agreements, insurance policies, guaranty agreements, reimbursement agreements, indexing agreements, or interest exchange agreements. Any payments made or received according to the agreement or ancillary arrangement shall be made from or deposited as provided in the agreement or ancillary arrangement. The determination of the commissioner included in an interest exchange agreement that the agreement relates to an appropriation bond shall be conclusive.

Subd. 3. **Form; procedure.** (a) Appropriation bonds may be issued in the form of bonds, notes, or other similar instruments, and in the manner provided in section 16A.672. In the event that any provision of section 16A.672 conflicts with this section, this section shall control.

(b) Every appropriation bond shall include a conspicuous statement of the limitation established in subdivision 6.

(c) Appropriation bonds may be sold at either public or private sale upon such terms as the commissioner shall determine are not inconsistent with this section and may be sold at any price or percentage of par value. Any bid received may be rejected.

(d) Appropriation bonds may bear interest at a fixed or variable rate.

Subd. 4. **Refunding bonds.** The commissioner from time to time may issue appropriation bonds for the purpose of refunding any appropriation bonds then outstanding, including the payment of any redemption premiums on the bonds, any interest accrued or to accrue to the redemption date, and costs related to the issuance and sale of the refunding bonds. The proceeds of any refunding bonds may, in the discretion of the commissioner, be applied to the purchase or payment at maturity of the appropriation bonds to be refunded, to the redemption of the outstanding bonds on any redemption date, or to pay interest on the refunding bonds and may, pending application, be placed in escrow to be applied to the purchase, payment, retirement, or redemption. Any escrowed proceeds, pending such use, may be invested and reinvested in obligations that are authorized investments under section 11A.24. The income earned or realized on the investment may also be applied to the payment of the bonds to be refunded or interest or premiums on the refunded bonds, or to pay interest on the refunding bonds. After the terms of the escrow have been fully satisfied, any balance

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of the proceeds and any investment income may be returned to the general fund or, if applicable, the appropriation bond proceeds account for use in any lawful manner. All refunding bonds issued under this subdivision must be prepared, executed, delivered, and secured by appropriations in the same manner as the bonds to be refunded.

Subd. 5. **Appropriation bonds as legal investments.** Any of the following entities may legally invest any sinking funds, money, or other funds belonging to them or under their control in any appropriation bonds issued under this section:

(1) the state, the investment board, public officers, municipal corporations, political subdivisions, and public bodies;

(2) banks and bankers, savings and loan associations, credit unions, trust companies, savings banks and institutions, investment companies, insurance companies, insurance associations, and other persons carrying on a banking or insurance business; and

(3) personal representatives, guardians, trustees, and other fiduciaries.

Subd. 6. **No full faith and credit; state not required to make appropriations.** The appropriation bonds are not public debt of the state, and the full faith, credit, and taxing powers of the state are not pledged to the payment of the appropriation bonds or to any payment that the state agrees to make under this section. Appropriation bonds shall not be obligations paid directly, in whole or in part, from a tax of statewide application on any class of property, income, transaction, or privilege. Appropriation bonds shall be payable in each fiscal year only from amounts that the legislature may appropriate for debt service for any fiscal year, provided that nothing in this section shall be construed to require the state to appropriate funds sufficient to make debt service payments with respect to the bonds in any fiscal year.

Subd. 7. **Appropriation of proceeds.** The proceeds of appropriation bonds and interest credited to the special appropriation bond proceeds account are appropriated to the commissioner for payment of contract obligations under the pay-for-performance program, as permitted by state and federal law, reasonable administrative costs of the program that are directly attributable to the program, issuance costs, and nonsalary expenses incurred in conjunction with the sale of the appropriation bonds.

Subd. 8. **Appropriation for debt service.** The amount needed to pay principal and interest on appropriation bonds issued under this section is appropriated each year to the commissioner from the general fund subject to the repeal, unallotment under section 16A.152, or cancellation otherwise pursuant to subdivision 6.

Subd. 9. **Administrative costs.** The commissioner may accept donations from private sources to defray administrative costs under this section. Amounts received are appropriated to the commissioner.

Subd. 10. **Validation.** (a) Appropriation bonds issued under this section may be validated in the manner provided by this subdivision. If comparable appropriation bonds are judicially determined to be valid, nothing in this subdivision shall be construed to prevent sale or delivery of any appropriation bonds or notes after entry of a judgment of validation by the Minnesota Supreme Court as provided in this subdivision with respect to the appropriation bonds authorized under this section.

(b) Any appropriation bonds issued under this section that are validated shall be validated in the manner provided by this subdivision.

(c) The Minnesota Supreme Court shall have original jurisdiction to determine the validation of appropriation bonds and all matters connected with the issuance of the bonds.

(d) The commissioner may determine the commissioner's authority to issue appropriation bonds and the legality of all proceedings in connection with issuing bonds. For this purpose, a complaint shall be filed by the commissioner in the Minnesota Supreme Court against the state and the taxpayers and citizens.

(e) As a condition precedent to filing of a complaint for the validation of appropriation bonds, the commissioner shall take action providing for the issuance of appropriation bonds in accordance with law.

(f) The complaint shall set out the state's authority to issue appropriation bonds, the action or proceeding authorizing the issue and its adoption, all other essential proceedings had or taken in

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connection with issuing bonds, the amount of the appropriation bonds to be issued and the maximum interest they are to bear, and all other pertinent matters.

(g) The Minnesota Supreme Court shall issue an order directed against the state and taxpayers, citizens, and others having or claiming any right, title, or interest affected by the issuance of appropriation bonds, or to be affected by the bonds, allowing all persons, in general terms and without naming them, and the state through its attorney general to appear before the Minnesota Supreme Court at a designated time and place and show why the complaint should not be granted and the proceedings and appropriation bonds validated. A copy of the complaint and order shall be served on the attorney general at least 20 days before the time fixed for hearing. The attorney general shall examine the complaint, and, if it appears or there is reason to believe that it is defective, insufficient, or untrue, or if in the opinion of the attorney general the issuance of the appropriation bonds in question has not been duly authorized, defense shall be made by the attorney general as the attorney general deems appropriate.

(h) Before the date set for hearing, as directed by the Minnesota Supreme Court, either the clerk of the Minnesota Appellate Courts or the commissioner shall publish a copy of the order in a legal newspaper of general circulation in Ramsey County and the state, at least once each week for two consecutive weeks, commencing with the first publication, which shall not be less than 20 days before the date set for hearing. By this publication, all taxpayers, citizens, and others having or claiming any right, title, or interest in the state, are made parties defendant to the action and the Minnesota Supreme Court has jurisdiction of them to the same extent as if named as defendants in the complaint and personally served with process.

(i) Any taxpayer, citizen, or person interested may become a party to the action by moving against or pleading to the complaint at or before the time set for hearing. The Minnesota Supreme Court shall determine all questions of law and fact and make orders that will enable it to properly try and determine the action and render a final judgment within 30 days of the hearing with the least possible delay.

(j) If the judgment validates appropriation bonds, the judgment is forever conclusive as to all matters adjudicated and as against all parties affected and all others having or claiming any right, title, or interest affected by the issuance of appropriation bonds, or to be affected in any way by issuing the bonds, and the validity of appropriation bonds or of any revenues pledged for the payment of the bonds, or of the proceedings authorizing the issuance of the bonds, including any remedies provided for their collection, shall never be called in question in any court by any person or party.

(k)(1) Appropriation bonds, when validated under this section, shall have stamped or written on the bonds, by the proper officers of the state issuing them, a statement in substantially the following form: "This bond is one of a series of appropriation bonds, which were validated by judgment of the Supreme Court of the State of Minnesota, rendered on, (year)".

(2) A certified copy of the judgment or decree shall be received as evidence in any court in this state.
