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12.1 ARTICLE 2

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12.2 HIGHER EDUCATION POLICY

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 136A.101, subdivision 5a, is amended to read:

- Subd. 5a. **Assigned family responsibility.** "Assigned family responsibility" means the amount of a family's contribution to a student's cost of attendance, as determined by a federal need analysis. For dependent students, the assigned family responsibility is 96 94 percent of the parental contribution. For independent students with dependents other than a spouse, the assigned family responsibility is 86 70 percent of the student contribution. For independent students without dependents other than a spouse, the assigned family responsibility is 50 34 percent of the student contribution.
- Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 136A.121, subdivision 5, is amended to read:
 - Subd. 5. **Grant stipends.** The grant stipend shall be based on a sharing of responsibility for covering the recognized cost of attendance by the applicant, the applicant's family, and the government. The amount of a financial stipend must not exceed a grant applicant's recognized cost of attendance, as defined in subdivision 6, after deducting the following:
 - (1) the assigned student responsibility of at least 50 percent of the cost of attending the institution of the applicant's choosing;

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- (2) the assigned family responsibility as defined in section 136A.101; and
- 12.21 (3) the amount of a federal Pell grant award for which the grant applicant is
 12.22 <u>financially</u> eligible, unless the student is ineligible to receive a Pell grant under United
 12.23 States Code, title 20, section 1091(a)(5) or (d).
- The minimum financial stipend is \$100 per academic year.
