TASK FORCE ON SHELTER RESIDENT RIGHTS AND SHELTER 1.5 PROVIDER PRACTICES. 1.6 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) For purposes of this section, the following terms have 1.7 the meanings given. 1.8 (b) "Director" means the state director of the Minnesota Interagency Council on 1.9 1.10 Homelessness. (c) "Homeless" or "homelessness" means lacking a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime 1.11 residence. 1.12 (d) "Resident" means a person residing in a shelter, including all members of a family 1.13 unit. 1.14 (e) "Shelter" means an indoor sleeping and sanitary dwelling, whether in a fixed or 1.15 rotating location, intended for individuals and families experiencing homelessness, provided 1.16 by a unit of government, a nonprofit organization, or a place of worship. Shelter includes 1.17 rooms in hotels or motels paid for by a unit of government or nonprofit organization and 1.18 daytime accommodations for individuals or families for whom shelter is provided only 1.19 overnight. 1.20

4.3	(b) Appointments must be made no later than July 1, 2021.
4.4	(c) Task force members shall serve without compensation, except for members who are
4.5	individuals who have experienced homelessness and resided in a shelter or who are
4.6	individuals representing shelter providers. Members eligible for compensation shall receive
4.7	expenses as provided in Minnesota Statutes, section 15.059, subdivision 6.
4.8	(d) Vacancies shall be filled by the director consistent with the qualifications of the
4.9	vacating member required by this subdivision.
4.10	Subd. 4. Meetings; officers. (a) The director shall convene the first meeting of the task
4.11	force no later than August 15, 2021, and shall provide physical or virtual meeting space as
4.12	necessary for the task force to conduct its work.
4.13	(b) At its first meeting, the task force shall elect a chair and vice-chair from among the
4.14	task force members and may elect other officers as necessary.
4.15	(c) The task force shall meet according to a schedule determined by the members or
4.16	upon the call of its chair. The task force shall meet as often as necessary to accomplish the
4.17	duties under subdivision 5.
4.18	(d) Meetings of the task force are subject to Minnesota Statutes, chapter 13D.
4.19	Subd. 5. Duties. (a) The task force must seek input from:
4.20	(1) individuals who are experiencing or who have experienced homelessness and reside
4.21	or have resided in a shelter;
4.22	(2) providers of shelter, including winter shelter, cold weather shelter, family shelter,
4.23	youth shelter, and shelter for survivors of domestic abuse or sexual violence; providers who
4.24	are funded by state, city, or local governments; providers who operate with nonpublic funds;
4.25	providers who provide shelter in urban and suburban areas; providers who provide shelter
4.26	in greater Minnesota; and providers of shelter in apartments, hotels, and motels; and
4.27	(3) any other persons or organizations with experience or expertise in homelessness,
4.28	homeless outreach, or homeless prevention.
4.29	(b) The task force must:
4.30	(1) conduct research into and analyze establishing government oversight and registration
4.31	of homeless shelters in Minnesota; and

(2) id	lentify and analyze policies, rights, and responsibilities of shelter residents and
shelter p	roviders regarding, at a minimum:
<u>(i) the</u>	e treatment of shelter residents with dignity and respect, including but not limited
to address	ssing conflict resolution, ensuring cultural sensitivity, engaging people with mental
illnesses	, implementing crisis response, and providing trauma-informed services;
(ii) sl	helter terminations and appeals;
(iii) r	remedies for and enforcement of shelter resident rights violations and illegal
terminat	ions;
(iv) t	ime limits on residency and policies on temporary absences;
(v) se	ecurity and personal safety of shelter residents;
<u>(vi)</u> s	staffing ratios;
(vii)	appropriate, adequate, and safe storage and protection of resident property and
personal	information during a resident's stay and following a resident's exit from shelter;
(viii)	maintaining family units intact while in shelter;
<u>(ix) p</u>	preventing discrimination based on race, color, creed, ethnicity, national origin,
citizensh	ip, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, familial status, marital status, veteran
status, in	nmigration status, status with regard to public assistance, disability, religion, or
age;	
(x) se	eizure of persons and property;
<u>(xi)</u> t	he expectation of the resident's personal property privacy;
(xii)	access to emergency and nonemergency medical and dental care;
(xiii)	access to hygiene and sanitary products;
(xiv)	maintenance of cleanliness of the facilities;
(xv) a	accommodations for a resident's nontraditional work hours and schedules,
circumst	rances involving members of the resident's immediate family who do not reside in
the shelt	er, and other extenuating life circumstances;
(xvi)	reasonable accommodations for residents with disabilities, including residents with
physical	, developmental, and communication challenges, persons whose primary language
is not En	nglish, and persons with food and other allergies or dietary restrictions;

6.1	(xvii) the provision of information regarding shelter policies, procedures, rules,
6.2	restrictions, and notices of eviction;
6.3	(xviii) the filing of grievances; and
6.4	(xix) the provision of case management, referral, and other supports regarding housing,
6.5	supportive housing, mental health, physical health, substance abuse, government assistance,
6.6	and employment services and resources.
6.7	(c) The task force must review the application of housing support payments under
6.8	Minnesota Statutes, section 256I.06, for shelter purposes and personal allowance policies
6.9	to determine how residents can retain a maximum amount of their income.
6.10	(d) The task force shall develop recommendations for the establishment of a statewide
6.11	shelter call line to ensure that all residents are receiving adequate service in a shelter. The
6.12	task force shall evaluate the appropriate state agency, nonprofit organization, or other entity
6.13	to house and operate the call line and the funding necessary to establish and maintain the
6.14	ongoing operation of the call line.
6.15	(e) The task force may examine any other related issues consistent with this section.
6.16	Subd. 6. Administrative support. The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency must provide
6.17	administrative support and meeting space for the task force.
6.18	Subd. 7. Report. (a) No later than February 1, 2022, the task force shall submit an initial
6.19	report to the chairs and ranking minority members of the house of representatives and senate
6.20	committees and divisions with jurisdiction over housing and preventing homelessness on
6.21	the findings and recommendations for:
6.22	(1) legislation establishing:
6.23	(i) a bill of rights for, and uniform standards of treatment of, individuals and families
6.24	residing in a shelter;
6.25	(ii) shelter provider standards of practice; and
6.26	(iii) a statewide shelter call line; and
6.27	(2) the establishment of government oversight and registration of the provision of shelter
6.28	in Minnesota.
6.29	(b) No later than August 31, 2022, the task force shall submit a final report to the chairs
6.30	and ranking minority members of the house of representatives and senate committees and
6.31	divisions with jurisdiction over housing and preventing homelessness on the findings and
6.32	recommendations listed in paragraph (a).
