1.8	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 609.2231, subdivision 2, is amended to read:
1.9	Subd. 2. Firefighters and, emergency medical personnel, and other health care
1.10	professionals. Whoever assaults any of the following persons and inflicts demonstrable
1.11	bodily harm on or intentionally throws or otherwise transfers bodily fluids or feces at or
1.12	onto any of the following persons is guilty of a felony and may be sentenced to imprisonment
1.13	for not more than two years or to payment of a fine of not more than \$4,000, or both:
