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## 1.5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

1.6	Section 1. [3.8843] LEGISLATIVE COMMISSION ON DATA PRACTICES.
1.7	Subdivision 1. Established. The Legislative Commission on Data Practices and
1.8	Personal Data Privacy is created to study issues relating to government data practices and
1.9	individuals' personal data privacy rights and to review legislation impacting data practices,
1.10	data security, and personal data privacy.
1.11	Subd. 2. Membership. The commission consists of four senators appointed by the
1.12	senate Subcommittee on Committees of the Committee on Rules and Administration, and
1.13	four members of the house of representatives appointed by the speaker. Two members
1.14	from each chamber must be from the majority party in that chamber and two members
1.15	from each chamber must be from the minority party in that chamber. Each appointing
1.16	authority must make appointments as soon as possible after the beginning of the regular
1.17	legislative session in the odd-numbered year. The commission may elect up to four former
1.18	legislators who have demonstrated an interest in, or have a history of working in, the areas
1.19	of government data practices and personal data privacy to serve as nonvoting members
1.20	of the commission. The former legislators must not be registered lobbyists and shall be
1.21	compensated as provided under section 15.0575, subdivision 3.
1.22	Subd. 3. Terms; vacancies. Members of the commission serve for terms beginning
1.23	upon appointment and ending at the beginning of the regular legislative session in the next
