(a) Notwithstanding the provisions of section 609.06 or 609.065, the use of deadly force by a peace officer in the line of duty is justified only if an 2.8 objectively reasonable officer would believe, based on the totality of the circumstances 2.9 known to the officer at the time and without the benefit of hindsight, that such force is 2.10 necessary. The reasonableness of the use of deadly force is based upon the totality of the 2.11 circumstances known to or perceived by the peace officer at the time, and the use of deadly 2.12 force is not to be judged on the basis of hindsight. Deadly force is justified: 2.13 (1) to protect the peace officer or another from a reasonably perceived risk of death or 2.14 great bodily harm, provided that the threat: 2.15 (i) can be articulated with specificity by the law enforcement officer; 2.16 (ii) the perceived risk of death or great bodily harm is reasonably likely to occur absent 2.17 action by the law enforcement officer the peace officer's use of deadly force; and 2.18 (ii) in light of the perceived risk of death or great bodily harm, the use of deadly force 2.19 could not have been reasonably delayed; 2.20 (iii) must be addressed through the use of deadly force without unreasonable delay; or 2.21 (2) to effect effectuate the arrest or capture, or prevent the escape, of a person whom 2.22 the peace officer knows or has reasonable grounds to believe where there is probable cause 2.23 to believe the person has committed or attempted to commit a felony and the peace officer 2.24 reasonably believes that the person will cause death or great bodily harm to another person 2.25 under the threat criteria in clause (1), items (i) to (iii) reasonably perceives the person poses 2.26 a risk of death or great bodily harm to the peace officer or another, unless immediately 2.27 apprehended. 2.28 (b) A peace officer shall not use deadly force against a person based only on the danger 2.29 the person poses to self if an objectively reasonable officer would believe, based on the 2.30 totality of the circumstances known to the officer at the time and without the benefit of 2.31
