A bill for an act
relating to natural resources; modifying restrictions on mowing ditches;
providing civil penalties; amending Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 160.232.
BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2014, section 160.232, is amended to read:

160.232 MOWING DITCHES OUTSIDE CITIES.

(a) To provide enhanced roadside habitat for pollinators, nesting birds, and other small wildlife, road authorities or persons may not mow, hay, burn, or till the right-of-way of a road or highway located outside of a home rule charter or statutory city except as allowed in this section and section 160.23.

(b) A person must obtain a permit from the commissioner of transportation to mow, hay, burn, or till on a trunk highway right-of-way.

~~(b) (c) On any road or highway, a road authority or a person acting on behalf of a road authority may at any time mow, hay, burn, or till the first eight 15 feet or a single pass of mowing equipment, whichever width is less, away from the road surface, or shoulder if one exists, may be mowed at any time.~~

~~(e) (d) A person or road authority may mow, hay, burn, or till an entire right-of-way may be mowed after July 31. From August 31 to the following July 31, the entire right-of-way may only be mowed if necessary for safety reasons, but may not be mowed to a height of less than 12 inches from August 1 to March 31.~~

~~(d) A right-of-way may be mowed as necessary to maintain sight distance for safety and may be mowed at other times under rules of the commissioner, or by ordinance of a local road authority not conflicting with the rules of the commissioner.~~

2.1 (e) From April 1 to July 31, a road authority or person acting on behalf of a road
2.2 authority may mow, hay, burn, or till the road or highway right-of-way outside of that
2.3 portion described in paragraph (c) only if necessary for transportation purposes such as
2.4 safety, construction, maintenance, survey, or as otherwise allowed under this section and
2.5 section 160.23. During a U.S. Department of Agriculture drought disaster declaration,
2.6 haying may be permitted by a road authority before August 1.

2.7 (e) (f) A right-of-way may be mowed, ~~hayed~~, burned, or tilled by or on behalf of a
2.8 road authority at any time to prepare the right-of-way for the establishment of permanent
2.9 vegetative cover or for prairie vegetation management.

2.10 (f) (g) When feasible, road authorities are encouraged to utilize low maintenance,
2.11 native vegetation that reduces the need to mow, provides pollinator and small wildlife
2.12 habitat, and maintains public safety.

2.13 (g) (h) The commissioner of natural resources shall ~~cooperate~~ coordinate with the
2.14 commissioner of transportation and local road authorities to provide enhanced roadside
2.15 habitat for nesting birds, honeybees and native pollinators, and other small wildlife.

2.16 (i) Notwithstanding paragraphs (a) to (h), the following areas within a road or
2.17 highway right-of-way may be maintained as lawns and mowed at any time:

2.18 (1) areas within 100 feet on either side of a driveway access serving an inhabited
2.19 dwelling or a commercial business; and

2.20 (2) areas within rest areas, weigh stations, historical and geological markers, and
2.21 parks.

2.22 (j) A person who violates paragraph (a) or the terms of a permit issued under
2.23 paragraph (b) is guilty of a petty misdemeanor. Peace officers, as defined in section
2.24 626.84, subdivision 1, paragraph (c), may enforce this section. The road authority may
2.25 also seek recovery of damages under section 548.05.

2.26 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** Paragraphs (a) to (i) are effective the day following final
2.27 enactment. Paragraph (j) is effective August 1, 2017.
