1.8	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 155A.20, is amended to read:
1.9	155A.20 BOARD OF COSMETOLOGIST EXAMINERS CREATED; TERMS.
1.10	(a) A Board of Cosmetologist Examiners is established to consist of seven 11 members,
1.11	appointed by the governor as follows:
1.12	(1) two cosmetologists, one of whom is recommended by a professional association of
1.13	cosmetologists, nail technicians, and estheticians;
1.14	(2) two school instructors, one of whom is teaching at a public cosmetology school in
1.15	the state and one of whom is teaching at a private cosmetology school in the state;
1.16	(3) one esthetician;
1.17	(4) one advanced practice esthetician;
1.18	(4) (5) one nail technician; and
1.19	(6) one hair technician; and
1.20	(5) one (7) three public member members, as defined in section 214.02.
1.21	(b) All cosmetologist, esthetician, advanced practice esthetician, hair technician, and
1.22	nail technician members must be currently licensed in the field of cosmetology, advanced

(c) Membership terms, compensation of members, removal of members, the filling of

sections 214.07 to 214.09. The provision of staff, administrative services, and office space;
the review and processing of complaints; the setting of board fees; and other provisions
relating to board operations shall be as provided in chapter 214.
