[136F.405] ACADEMIC FREEDOM PROTECTION. 1.7 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** (a) For purposes of this section, the following term has the 1.8 meaning given. 1.9 (b) "Academic freedom" means the freedom of an educator or researcher in higher 1.10 education to investigate and discuss the issues in their academic field, and to teach or publish 1.11 findings without interference from political figures, boards of trustees, donors, or other 1.12 entities. 1.13 Subd. 2. Faculty rights. (a) Minnesota State Colleges and Universities must maintain 1 14 policies that support and encourage academic freedom. A faculty member at a Minnesota 1.15 state institution may, without limitation, discuss the subject matter in the classroom of the 1.16 courses the faculty member is assigned to teach without interference from political figures, 1.17 boards of trustees, donors, or other entities. Each faculty member shall have the right to 1.18 teach in an atmosphere of free intellectual inquiry and shall not be subjected to restraints 1.19 1.20 or harassment that would impair teaching.

(b) A faculty member is entitled to full freedom in research and in the publication of

Subd. 3. Artificial intelligence regulation. (a) Minnesota State Colleges and University	ities
institutions may not use artificial or generative intelligence as the primary instructor for	or a
credit-bearing course. Credit-bearing courses must be taught by an instructor of record	who
is a living human being employed by the Minnesota State Colleges and Universities.	
(b) Minnesota State Colleges and Universities institutions may not use artificial or	
generative intelligence to provide library services, counseling and crisis intervention serv	ices,
athletic coaching, and training. Library services, counseling services, athletic coaching,	and
training must be provided by a faculty member of Minnesota State Colleges and Univers	ities
who is a living human employed by Minnesota State Colleges and Universities.	
(c) Notwithstanding paragraphs (a) and (b), faculty retain the right to use artificial	or
generative intelligence as part of their teaching and other work duties.

State Colleges and Universities institution, it must be cited and made clear to students	as
