- 3.3 (3) prescribing, dispensing, or administering legend drugs or controlled substances
  3.4 including chemotherapeutic substances; or
- 3.5 (4) performing or inducing abortions.
- 3.6 (b) A naturopathic doctor registered under this chapter shall not perform surgical
  3.7 procedures using a laser device or perform surgical procedures beyond superficial tissue.
- 3.8 (c) A naturopathic doctor shall not practice or claim to practice as a medical doctor,
  3.9 surgeon, osteopathic physician, dentist, podiatrist, optometrist, psychologist, advanced
  3.10 practice professional nurse, physician assistant, chiropractor, physical therapist, acupuncturist,
  3.11 dietician, nutritionist, or any other health care professional, unless the naturopathic physician
  3.12 doctor also holds the appropriate license or registration for the health care profession.

6.2	required under section 147E.40 that includes:
6.3	(i) the applicant's name, Social Security number, home address and telephone number,
6.4	and business address and telephone number;
6.5	(ii) the name and location of the naturopathic medical program the applicant completed;
6.6	(iii) a list of degrees received from other educational institutions;
6.7	(iv) a description of the applicant's professional training;
6.8	(v) a list of registrations, certifications, and licenses held in other jurisdictions;
6.9	(vi) a description of any other jurisdiction's refusal to credential the applicant;
6.10	(vii) a description of all professional disciplinary actions initiated against the applicant
6.11	in any jurisdiction; and
6.12	(viii) any history of drug or alcohol abuse, and any misdemeanor or felony conviction;
6.13	(2) submit a copy of a diploma from an approved naturopathic medical education

6.19	(4) submit additional information as requested by the board, including providing any
6.20	additional information necessary to ensure that the applicant is able to practice with

6.22	(5) sign a statement that the information in the application is true and correct to the best
6.23	of the applicant's knowledge and belief; and
6.24	(6) sign a waiver authorizing the board to obtain access to the applicant's records in this

6.27	Subd. 2. Registration Licensure by endorsement; reciprocity. (a) To be eligible for
6.28	registration licensure by endorsement or reciprocity, the applicant must hold a current
6.29	naturopathic license, registration, or certification in another state, Canadian province, the
6.30	District of Columbia, or territory of the United States, whose standards for licensure,
6.31	registration, or certification are at least equivalent to those of Minnesota, and must:

(1) submit the application materials and fees as required by subdivision 1, clauses (1),
(2), and (4) to (6);

7.3 (2) have successfully passed either:

7.4 (i) the Naturopathic Physicians Licensing Examination; or

(ii) if prior to 1986, the state or provincial naturopathic board licensing examination

7.29 Subd. 5. Renewal. (a) To be eligible for registration license renewal a registrant licensee
7.30 must:

(1) annually, or as determined by the board, complete a renewal application on a form
provided by the board;

8.1 (2) submit the renewal fee;

8.2 (3) provide evidence of a total of 25 hours of continuing education approved by the
8.3 board as described in section 147E.25; and

8.4 (4) submit any additional information requested by the board to clarify information
8.5 presented in the renewal application. The information must be submitted within 30 days
8.6 after the board's request, or the renewal request is nullified.

(b) A registrant licensee must maintain a correct mailing address with the board for
receiving board communications, notices, and registration license renewal documents.
Placing the registration license renewal application in first-class United States mail, addressed
to the registrant licensee at the registrant's licensee's last known address with postage prepaid,
constitutes valid service. Failure to receive the renewal documents does not relieve a
registrant licensee of the obligation to comply with this section.

(c) The name of a registrant licensee who does not return a complete registration license
renewal application, annual registration license fee, or late application fee, as applicable,
within the time period required by this section shall be removed from the list of individuals
authorized to practice during the current renewal period. If the registrant's registration
licensee's license is reinstated, the registrant's licensee's name shall be placed on the list of
individuals authorized to practice.

8.19 Subd. 6. Change of address. A registrant licensee who changes addresses must inform
8.20 the board within 30 days, in writing, of the change of address. All notices or other
8.21 correspondence mailed to or served on a registrant licensee by the board are considered as
8.22 having been received by the registrant licensee.

8.23 Subd. 7. Registration License renewal notice. At least 45 days before the registration license renewal date, the board shall send out a renewal notice to the last known address of 8.24 the registrant licensee on file. The notice must include a renewal application and a notice 8.25 of fees required for renewal or instructions for online renewal. It must also inform the 8.26 registrant licensee that registration the license will expire without further action by the board 8.27 if an application for registration license renewal is not received before the deadline for 8.28 renewal. The registrant's licensee's failure to receive this notice does not relieve the registrant 8.29 licensee of the obligation to meet the deadline and other requirements for registration license 8.30 renewal. Failure to receive this notice is not grounds for challenging expiration of registration 8.31 8.32 licensure status.

8.33 Subd. 8. Renewal deadline. The renewal application and fee must be postmarked on or
