relating to economic assistance; providing assistance for housing, the Minnesota 1.2 family investment program, food, and broadband; appropriating and transferring 1.3 money. 1.4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA: 1.5 **ARTICLE 1** 1.6 HOUSING ASSISTANCE 1.7 Section 1. EVICTION NOTICE AND LATE FEES; STATE OF EMERGENCY. 1.8 1.9 (a) Before bringing an eviction action upon the conclusion of the peacetime emergency declared in Executive Order 20-01 and the termination of Executive Order 20-79 and the 1.10 termination of any similar federal eviction suspension impacting Minnesota, a landlord must 1.11 provide a 60-day written notice to the residential tenant specifying the basis for a future 1.12 eviction action. For 60 days after the end of the peacetime emergency, residential landlords 1.13 must not issue notices of termination of lease or nonrenewal of lease or terminate residential 1.14 leases during the pendency of the peacetime emergency. No late fees may be assessed by 1 15 the landlord during the 60-day notice period required in this section. This section does not 1.16 apply to the nonrenewal of a lease or an eviction based on the following circumstances: 1.17

(1) the tenant seriously endangers the safety of other residents;

(2) the tenant violates Minnesota Statutes, section 504B.171, subdivision 1;

vacate or nonrenewal; or

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(3) the tenant remains in the property past the vacate date after receiving a notice to

	(4) the tenant materially violates a residential lease by the following actions on the
pre	mises, including the common area and the curtilage of the premises:
	(i) seriously endangers the safety of others; or
	(ii) significantly damages property.
	(b) For an allegation of nonpayment of rent or other unpaid financial obligations in
vio	lation of the lease, the landlord must include the following in a written notice:
	(1) the total amount due;
	(2) a specific itemized accounting of the amount of the total due that is comprised of
unp	paid rents or other charges under the lease, including any rent amounts expected to be
due	during that 60-day period; and
	(3) the name and address of the person authorized to receive rent and fees on behalf of
the	landlord.
	(c) A notice provided under this section must:
	(1) provide a statement that a residential tenant may be eligible for financial assistance
froi	m the county, state, or federal government;
	(2) provide a description on how to access legal and financial assistance through the
"La	w Help" website at www.lawhelpmn.org and "Minnesota 211" through its website at
ХW	w.211unitedway.org or by calling 211; and
	(3) state that the landlord may bring an eviction action following expiration of the 60-day
not	ice period if the residential tenant fails to pay the total amount due or fails to vacate.
	(d) The landlord or an agent of the landlord must deliver the notice personally or by first
clas	ss mail to the residential tenant at the address of the leased premises.
	(e) If the residential tenant fails to correct the rent delinquency or other unpaid financial
obl	igation in violation of the lease within 14 days of the delivery or fails to vacate, the
lano	dlord may bring an eviction action based on the nonpayment of rent.
	(f) Receipt of a notice under this section is an emergency situation under Minnesota
Sta	tutes, section 256D.06, subdivision 2, and Minnesota Rules, chapter 9500. For purposes
of N	Minnesota Statutes, chapter 256J, and Minnesota Rules, chapter 9500, a county agency
ver	ifies an emergency situation by receiving and reviewing a notice under this section. A
ver	bal statement by the residential tenant to the county agency that the residential tenant
rece	eived such a notice shall presume the residential tenant's eligibility for assistance. If a

3.1	residential tenant applies for financial assistance from the county, state, or federal
3.2	government, the landlord must cooperate with the application process by:

- (1) supplying all information and documentation requested by the residential tenant or the county; and
- (2) accepting or placing into escrow partial rent payments where necessary to establish a residential tenant's eligibility for assistance.
  - (g) If applicable, the person filing a complaint must attach a copy of the written notice described in paragraph (a). The court shall dismiss an action without prejudice for failure to provide a notice as described in paragraph (b) and grant an expungement of the eviction case court file.
    - (h) Nothing in this section reduces the rent owed by the tenant to the landlord, prevents the landlord from collecting rent owed, reduces arrears owed by a tenant for rent, or alters the terms of the lease between the landlord and tenant.
  - (i) Upon a finding that the plaintiff has violated a provision of this section, the court must dismiss and expunge the action and may not require the residential tenant as defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 504B.001, subdivision 12, to pay any filing fee.
- 3.17 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

## Sec. 2. FORECLOSURE; STATE OF EMERGENCY.

Prior to the expiration of the public health emergency, and for 60 days after the expiration of a public health emergency, no notice of a pendency for a foreclosure by advertisement may be recorded and no action may commence under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 580 or 581, and no vendor may terminate a contract for deed except for an action necessary to protect holders of bonds issued under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 462A. Nothing in this section alters the payments owed; any other obligations under the mortgage, common interest community bylaws, or contract for deed; or the pledge made by the state to holders of bonds issued under Minnesota Statutes, chapter 462A. For purposes of this section, "public health emergency" means the peacetime emergency declared by the governor on March 13, 2020, in Executive Order 20-01 in response to COVID-19 or any other peacetime emergency declared by the governor by an executive order that relates to the infectious disease known as COVID-19.

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment and applies to actions taken on or after that date.

4.14	infectious disease known as COVID-19. To be eligible for funding, applicants must:
4.15	(1) have a rent payment, mortgage payment, homeowner association dues, lot rent due
4.16	to a manufactured home park, contract for deed payment, homeowner insurance payment,
4.17	property tax payment, or utility payment, including internet services, with a due date of
4.18	March 1, 2020, or later, or have another expense that is needed to maintain housing as
4.19	determined by the agency;

4.21	(3) be a household with a current gross income at or below 200 percent of the federal

subdivision 8, the express audit clause requirement.	
(c) The commissioner shall ensure grant funds are prioritized for nonprofit communi	ity
organizations contracting with restaurants and catering companies to provide meals.	
(d) The commissioner shall consider geographic distribution when awarding grants.	
(e) Grant funds may supplement, but not supplant, any other funding used to provide	<u> </u>
prepared meals to Minnesotans experiencing food insecurity.	
(f) The commissioner shall begin issuing COVID-19 food relief grants to eligible grante	es
no later than January 15, 2021.	
(g) The commissioner's determination of the grant amount determined under this	
subdivision is final and is not subject to appeal.	
Subd. 6. Nonstate funds. If a grant recipient receives funds from a nonstate source oth	<u>ier</u>
than a local unit of government or a tribe for activities listed in subdivision 3, the grant	
recipient must notify the commissioner of the amount received from the nonstate source	<u>).</u>
If the commissioner determines that the total amount the grant recipient received under the	<u>iis</u>

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## Section 1. BROADBAND GRANT PROGRAM; TRANSFER.

\$35,000,000 in fiscal year 2022 and \$35,000,000 in fiscal year 2023 are transferred from
the general fund to the commissioner of employment and economic development for deposit
in the border-to-border broadband fund account established in Minnesota Statutes, section
116J.396, subdivision 1, for the purposes specified in Minnesota Statutes, section 116J.396,
subdivision 2.
