1.11	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2012, section 84.7741, subdivision 7, is amended to read:
1.12	Subd. 7. Presumptions; limitations on vehicle forfeiture. (a) An off-highway
1.13	vehicle is presumed subject to forfeiture under this section if the driver:
1.14	(1) is convicted of the designated offense upon which the forfeiture is based; or

 reasonable steps to terminate use of the vehicle by the offender.

 or constructive knowledge that the vehicle would be used or operated in any manner
 contrary to law or that the owner took reasonable steps to prevent use of the vehicle by

 or more prior off-highway vehicle convictions, the owner is presumed to know of any

The limitations and defenses in section 609.531, subdivision 9, apply to forfeitures under
subdivisions 1 and 1a.

(b) Property is subject to forfeiture under this section only if the owner was privy to
the act or omission upon which the forfeiture is based, or the act or omission occurred
with the owner's knowledge or consent.

(c) Property encumbered by a bona fide security interest is subject to the interest of
the secured party unless the party had knowledge of or consented to the act or omission
upon which the forfeiture is based. A person claiming a security interest bears the burden
of establishing that interest by clear and convincing evidence.
