1.6	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 169A.55, subdivision 4, is amended to read:
1.7	Subd. 4. Reinstatement of driving privileges; multiple incidents. (a) A person whose
1.8	driver's license has been revoked as a result of an offense listed under clause (2), shall not
1.9	be eligible for reinstatement of driving privileges without an ignition interlock restriction
1.10	until the commissioner certifies that either:
1.11	(1) the person did not own or lease a vehicle, or commit a violation of chapter 169,
1.12	169A, or 171 at the time of the arrest for the offense listed under clause (2), item (i), subitem
1.13	(A) or (B), or (ii), subitem (A) or (B), as based on:
1.14	(i) records available to the commissioner;
1.15	(ii) the person's attestation under penalty of perjury; and
1.16	(iii) the submission by the driver of certified copies of vehicle registration records and
1.17	driving records for the period from the arrest until the driver seeks reinstatement of driving

2.3	(B) an offense occurring after two qualified prior impaired driving incidents; or

2.5	(A) an offense occurring under clause (i), subitem (A) or (B), and the test results indicated

2.24	(3) six years, for a person whose driver's license was canceled or denied for an offense

2.26	(c) The commissioner shall establish performance standards and a process for certifying
2.27	chemical monitoring devices. The standards and procedures are not rules and are exempt
2.28	from chapter 14, including section 14.386.
