1.8	Section 1. [161.462] FIBER COLLABORATION DATABASE.
1.9	Subdivision 1. Purpose. The purpose of the fiber collaboration database is
1.10	to provide broadband providers with advance notice of upcoming Department of
1.11	Transportation construction projects, so that they may notify the department of their
1.12	interest in installing broadband infrastructure within the right-of-way during construction
1.13	in order to minimize installation costs.
1.14	Subd. 2. Database. (a) The Department of Transportation shall post on its Web site,
1.15	and update annually, the list of upcoming construction projects contained in its statewide
1.16	transportation improvement program, including, for each project:
1.17	(1) the geographical location where construction will occur;
1.18	(2) the estimated start and end dates of construction; and
1.19	(3) a description of the nature of the construction project.
