1.8	Section 1. [214.078] PROTECTION FROM CONVERSION THERAPY.
1.9	Subdivision 1. Definition. "Conversion therapy" means any practice by a mental health
1.10	practitioner as defined in section 245I.02, subdivision 26, or mental health professional as
1.11	defined in section 245I.02, subdivision 27, that seeks to change an individual's sexual
1.12	orientation or gender identity, including efforts to change behaviors or gender expressions
1.13	or to eliminate or reduce sexual or romantic attractions or feelings toward individuals of
1.14	the same gender. Conversion therapy does not include counseling, practice, or treatment
1.15	that provides assistance to an individual undergoing gender transition, or counseling, practice,
1.16	or treatment that provides acceptance, support, and understanding of an individual or
1.17	facilitates an individual's coping, social support, and identity exploration and development,
1.18	including sexual-orientation-neutral interventions to prevent or address unlawful conduct
1.19	or unsafe sexual practices, as long as the counseling does not seek to change an individual's
