1.1 A bill for an act

relating to education; modifying the definition of hours of instruction; providing for distance instruction; establishing an instruction model working group; requiring a report; amending Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 120A.41; proposing coding for new law in Minnesota Statutes, chapter 124D.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF MINNESOTA:

Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2020, section 120A.41, is amended to read:

## 120A.41 LENGTH OF SCHOOL YEAR; HOURS OF INSTRUCTION.

- (a) A school board's annual school calendar must include at least 425 hours of instruction for a kindergarten student without a disability, 935 hours of instruction for a student in grades 1 through 6, and 1,020 hours of instruction for a student in grades 7 through 12, not including summer school. The school calendar for all-day kindergarten must include at least 850 hours of instruction for the school year. The school calendar for a prekindergarten student under section 124D.151, if offered by the district, must include at least 350 hours of instruction for the school year. A school board's annual calendar must include at least 165 days of instruction for a student in grades 1 through 11 unless a four-day week schedule has been approved by the commissioner under section 124D.126.
  - (b) A school board's annual school calendar may include plans for up to five days of instruction provided through online instruction due to inclement weather. The inclement weather plans must be developed according to section 120A.414.
- (c) Hours of instruction include all learning opportunities and services designed to
  support a student to be prepared to succeed and lead by having the knowledge and skills to
  learn, engage civically, and lead meaningful lives, through implementation of evidence-based

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2.1	practices, quality instruction, and personalized learning supports. Such opportunities and
2.2	services include but are not limited to blended learning, distance learning, project-based
2.3	learning, work-based learning, service learning, supervised internships, and in-person
2.4	learning in a school building.
2.5	Sec. 2. [124D.097] DISTANCE INSTRUCTION OPTION.
2.6	Subdivision 1. Definition. "Distance instruction" means instruction provided to students
2.7	remotely, with students and teachers interacting through synchronous and other online
2.8	interactions, and students being provided appropriate education materials. During the period
2.9	of time when a student is participating exclusively in distance instruction for the full
2.10	instructional day, the student is considered to be engaged in full-day distance instruction.
2.11	Subd. 2. District option. (a) A school district may offer a full-time distance instruction
2.12	option to its enrolled resident students. A distance instruction option may be part of a school's
2.13	curriculum offerings. A student may complete all educational expectations and graduation
2.14	requirements under section 120B.02 through distance instruction. A school district that
2.15	offers distance instruction is not an online learning provider and is not subject to Department
2.16	of Education approval under section 124D.095.
2.17	(b) A school district may assign a student who is participating in full-time distance
2.18	instruction to a school site for purposes of determining compensatory revenue pupil units
2.19	under section 126C.05, subdivision 3, and free and reduced-price meal eligibility under
2.20	section 126C.05, subdivision 16.
2.21	<b>EFFECTIVE DATE.</b> This section is effective for the 2021-2022 school year and later.
2.22	Sec. 3. INSTRUCTION MODEL WORKING GROUP.
2.23	Subdivision 1. <b>Working group.</b> A working group is established to review how school
2.24	districts and charter schools implemented distance and hybrid instruction due to disruptions
2.25	to on-site instruction caused by COVID-19 and make recommendations to increase flexibility
2.26	for school districts and charter schools to implement instruction models that meet students'
2.27	diverse learning needs.

particular, the group must consider:			
(1) the impact of lower class size	es on student engage	ment and academic	growth;
(2) how modifications to the scho	ool calendar would af	fect learning retention	on and student
engagement;			
(3) the impact of distance instruc	ction on students req	uiring special educa	tion services
and supports, students identified as E	nglish learners, and s	tudents experiencing	; homelessness
or who are highly mobile;			
(4) the effect of distance instruct	ion on students' soci	al and emotional gro	owth, student
discipline, and bullying;			
(5) how students' educational ne	eds vary by age grou	p; and	
(6) students' access to technolog	<u>y.</u>		
(b) The working group must repo	ort its findings and re	ecommendations to	the chairs and
ranking minority members of the leg	islative committees y	with jurisdiction ove	r kindergarten
through grade 12 education by Januar	ry 17, 2022. The repo	rt must be submitted	in accordance
with Minnesota Statutes, section 3.1	95.		
(c) The commissioner of educati	on must provide tecl	nnical assistance and	d public data
on student academic needs and perfo	rmance, to the extent	it is available, to he	lp the working
group make evidence-based recomn	nendations.		
(d) The working group expires J	anuary 18, 2022.		
Subd. 4. Members. (a) The com	missioner of education	on or the commission	ner's designee
must serve as a member of the working	ng group. In addition,	by July 1, 2021, the	commissioner
of education must review application	ns to be named to the	e group and appoint	the following
group members:			

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(1) two superintendents;

(2) four teachers;

4.4	(6) one assessment coordinator;
4.5	(7) two technology directors;
4.6	(8) one parent of a student enrolled in a school district or charter school;

4.10	(b) When appointing members to the working group, the commissioner must consider
4.11	whether the working group represents communities of color, American Indian communities,
4.12	and communities from throughout Minnesota.
4.13	Subd. 5. Meetings. (a) The commissioner of education must convene the first meeting
4.14	of the working group no later than August 30, 2021. The working group must select a chair
4.15	or cochairs from among its members at the first meeting. The working group must meet
4.16	periodically.
4.17	(b) The commissioner must provide technical and administrative assistance to the working
4.18	group upon request.
4.19	(c) Working group members are not eligible to receive expenses or per diem payments
4.20	for serving on the working group.
4.21	<b>EFFECTIVE DATE.</b> This section is effective the day following final enactment.

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
