1.5 and Minnesota GI bill program provisions; requiring reports; appropriating money;  
1.6 amending Minnesota Statutes 2022, sections 190.19, subdivision 2a; 197.236,  
1.7 subdivision 9; 197.79, subdivisions 1, 2, by adding a subdivision; 197.791,  
1.8 subdivisions 5, 6, 7; Laws 2021, First Special Session chapter 12, article 1, section

1.15 We, the undersigned conferees for H. F. No. 1937 report that we have agreed upon the  
1.16 items in dispute and recommend as follows:

1.17 That the Senate recede from its amendments and that H. F. No. 1937 be further amended  
1.18 as follows:

1.19 Delete everything after the enacting clause and insert:

1.20 **"ARTICLE 1**

1.21 **MILITARY AFFAIRS AND VETERANS AFFAIRS APPROPRIATIONS**

1.22 Section 1. **APPROPRIATIONS.**

1.23 The sums shown in the columns marked "Appropriations" are appropriated to the agencies  
1.24 and for the purposes specified in this article. The appropriations are from the general fund,  
1.25 or another named fund, and are available for the fiscal years indicated for each purpose.

1.26 The figures "2024" and "2025" used in this article mean that the appropriations listed under  
1.27 them are available for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2024, or June 30, 2025, respectively.

2.1 "The first year" is fiscal year 2024. "The second year" is fiscal year 2025. "The biennium"  
 2.2 is fiscal years 2024 and 2025.

2.7 Sec. 2. MILITARY AFFAIRS

2.8 Subdivision 1. Total Appropriation \$ 61,020,000 \$ 29,357,000

2.9 The amounts that may be spent for each  
 2.10 purpose are specified in the following  
 2.11 subdivisions. The base is \$26,724,000 in fiscal  
 2.12 year 2026 and \$26,730,000 in fiscal year 2027  
 2.13 and each fiscal year thereafter.

2.14 Subd. 2. Maintenance of Training Facilities 9,951,000 10,064,000

2.15 Subd. 3. General Support 36,755,000 5,279,000

2.16 The base for this appropriation is \$4,246,000  
 2.17 in fiscal year 2026 and \$4,252,000 in fiscal  
 2.18 year 2027 and each fiscal year thereafter.

2.19 (a) MN Cyber Coordination Cell (C3).  
 2.20 \$552,000 the first year and \$558,000 the  
 2.21 second year are for administrative and payroll  
 2.22 costs to create and operate a Cyber  
 2.23 Coordination Cell in the Minnesota National  
 2.24 Guard. The base for this appropriation is  
 2.25 \$297,000 in fiscal year 2026 and \$303,000 in  
 2.26 fiscal year 2027 and each fiscal year thereafter.

2.27 (b) Army Combat Fitness Test Field House.  
 2.28 \$17,600,000 the first year is for predesign,  
 2.29 design, construction, furnishing and equipping  
 2.30 costs for an Army Combat Fitness Test Field  
 2.31 House. This is a onetime appropriation and is  
 2.32 available until June 30, 2027.

3.1 **(c) Minnesota Military Museum at Camp**  
 3.2 **Ripley.** \$14,055,000 the first year is for the  
 3.3 design and construction of the Minnesota  
 3.4 military museum at Camp Ripley. This  
 3.5 appropriation is in addition to the  
 3.6 appropriation made in Laws 2020, Fifth  
 3.7 Special Session chapter 3, article 1, section  
 3.8 14, subdivision 6, for the same purposes. This  
 3.9 is a onetime appropriation and is available  
 3.10 until June 30, 2027.

3.11 **(d) Holistic Health and Fitness (H2F).**  
 3.12 \$760,000 the first year and \$772,000 the  
 3.13 second year are for administrative and payroll  
 3.14 costs to create and operate Holistic Health and  
 3.15 Fitness (H2F) initiatives across the Minnesota  
 3.16 Army National Guard. This is a onetime  
 3.17 appropriation.

3.18 **Subd. 4. Enlistment Incentives** 13,614,000 13,614,000

3.19 The appropriations in this subdivision are  
 3.20 available until June 30, 2027. The base for this  
 3.21 appropriation is \$12,114,000 in fiscal year  
 3.22 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

3.23 If the amount for fiscal year 2024 is  
 3.24 insufficient, the amount for 2025 is available  
 3.25 in fiscal year 2024. Any unencumbered  
 3.26 balance does not cancel at the end of the first  
 3.27 year and is available for the second year.

3.28 **Subd. 5. Emergency Services** 700,000 400,000

3.29 **Sustain Domestic Operations**  
 3.30 **Communication Capabilities.** For ongoing  
 3.31 replacement of communications systems to  
 3.32 support domestic operations when ordered  
 3.33 into state service by the governor. The base

4.1 for this appropriation is \$300,000 in fiscal year  
4.2 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

4.3 **Sec. 3. VETERANS AFFAIRS**

4.4 **Subdivision 1. Total Appropriation** **\$ 146,548,000 \$ 132,011,000**

4.5 The amounts that may be spent for each  
4.6 purpose are specified in the following  
4.7 subdivisions. The base is \$123,645,000 in  
4.8 fiscal year 2026 and \$124,693,000 in fiscal  
4.9 year 2027 and each fiscal year thereafter.

4.10 **Subd. 2. Veterans Programs and Services** **56,523,000** **31,214,000**

4.11 The amounts that may be spent for each  
4.12 purpose are specified in the following  
4.13 subdivisions. The base is \$30,258,000 in fiscal  
4.14 year 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

4.15 **(a) State's Veterans Cemeteries. \$4,282,000**  
4.16 each year is for the operation of the state's  
4.17 veterans cemeteries. The base for this  
4.18 appropriation is \$3,782,000 in fiscal year 2026  
4.19 and each fiscal year thereafter.

4.20 **(b) Veterans Service Organizations.**  
4.21 \$500,000 each year is for grants to the  
4.22 following congressionally chartered veterans  
4.23 service organizations as designated by the  
4.24 commissioner: Disabled American Veterans,  
4.25 Military Order of the Purple Heart, the  
4.26 American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars,  
4.27 Vietnam Veterans of America, AMVETS, and  
4.28 Paralyzed Veterans of America. This funding  
4.29 must be allocated in direct proportion to the  
4.30 funding currently being provided by the  
4.31 commissioner to these organizations.

4.32 **(c) Honor Guards. \$200,000 each year is for**  
4.33 **compensation for honor guards at the funerals**

5.1 of veterans under Minnesota Statutes, section  
5.2 197.231.

5.3 (d) **Minnesota GI Bill.** \$200,000 each year is  
5.4 for the costs of administering the Minnesota  
5.5 GI Bill postsecondary educational benefits,  
5.6 on-the-job training, and apprenticeship  
5.7 program under Minnesota Statutes, section  
5.8 197.791.

5.9 (e) **Gold Star Program.** \$100,000 each year  
5.10 is for administering the Gold Star Program for  
5.11 surviving family members of deceased  
5.12 veterans.

5.13 (f) **County Veterans Service Office.**  
5.14 \$1,550,000 each year is for funding the  
5.15 County Veterans Service Office grant program  
5.16 under Minnesota Statutes, section 197.608.

5.17 (g) **Camp Bliss.** \$150,000 each year is for a  
5.18 grant to Camp Bliss as provided under article  
5.19 2, section 9.

5.20 (h) **Veterans on the Lake.** \$50,000 each year  
5.21 is for a grant to Veterans on the Lake for  
5.22 expenses related to retreats for veterans,  
5.23 including therapy, transportation, and activities  
5.24 customized for veterans. These are onetime  
5.25 appropriations.

5.26 (i) **Veteran Resilience Project.** \$300,000 each  
5.27 year is for a grant to the veteran resilience  
5.28 project. Grant funds must be used to make eye  
5.29 movement desensitization and reprocessing  
5.30 therapy available to veterans, veterans'  
5.31 spouses, current military service members,  
5.32 and current military service members' spouses  
5.33 who are suffering from posttraumatic stress  
5.34 disorder and trauma. The base for this

6.1 appropriation is \$200,000 in fiscal year 2026  
6.2 and each fiscal year thereafter.

6.3 The veteran resilience project must report to  
6.4 the commissioner of veterans affairs and the  
6.5 chairs and ranking minority members of the  
6.6 legislative committees with jurisdiction over  
6.7 veterans affairs policy and finance by January  
6.8 15 of each year on the program. The report  
6.9 must include an overview of the program's  
6.10 budget, a detailed explanation of program  
6.11 expenditures, the number of veterans and  
6.12 service members served by the program, and  
6.13 a list and explanation of the services provided  
6.14 to program participants.

6.15 **(j) CORE Program.** \$1,225,000 each year is  
6.16 for the Counseling and Case Management  
6.17 Outreach Referral and Education (CORE)  
6.18 program.

6.19 **(k) LinkVet Call Center.** \$369,000 each year  
6.20 is for the operation of the state's LinkVet Call  
6.21 Center.

6.22 **(l) Recently Separated Veterans Program.**  
6.23 \$350,000 each year is for operation of the  
6.24 recently separated veterans program. The  
6.25 commissioner of veterans affairs may use  
6.26 Department of Defense and other veteran data  
6.27 that were provided with an appropriate  
6.28 disclosure to assist with connecting veterans  
6.29 to resources and new programming. The  
6.30 commissioner may use money for personnel,  
6.31 research, marketing, technology solutions, and  
6.32 professional or technical contracts. The base  
6.33 for this appropriation is \$300,000 in fiscal year  
6.34 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

7.1 **(m) Homeless Veterans and SOAR**  
7.2 **Program.** \$1,035,000 each year is to operate  
7.3 the homeless veteran registry and homeless  
7.4 programs and to assist veterans, former service  
7.5 members, and veterans' and former service  
7.6 members' dependents with obtaining federal  
7.7 benefits through the Social Security  
7.8 Administration. The commissioner of veterans  
7.9 affairs may use money for personnel, training,  
7.10 research, marketing, and professional or  
7.11 technical contracts. The base for this  
7.12 appropriation is \$1,344,000 in fiscal year 2026  
7.13 and each fiscal year thereafter.

7.14 **(n) Minnesota Assistance Council for**  
7.15 **Veterans.** \$7,865,000 the first year and  
7.16 \$1,075,000 the second year are for grants to  
7.17 the Minnesota Assistance Council for Veterans  
7.18 to provide assistance throughout Minnesota  
7.19 to veterans and veterans' families who are  
7.20 homeless or in danger of homelessness,  
7.21 including assistance with:  
7.22 (1) supportive services to maintain housing;  
7.23 (2) employment;  
7.24 (3) legal issues;  
7.25 (4) housing and housing-related costs;  
7.26 (5) transportation;  
7.27 (6) the acquisition and creation of permanent  
7.28 supportive housing; and  
7.29 (7) property management of permanent  
7.30 supportive housing.

7.31 Of these amounts, \$6,350,000 the first year is  
7.32 for the establishment of permanent supportive  
7.33 housing options for homeless veterans and

8.1 former service members. This is a onetime  
8.2 appropriation and is available until June 30,  
8.3 2026. \$440,000 the first year is for the direct  
8.4 veteran assistance grant. This is a onetime  
8.5 appropriation. Any unencumbered balance  
8.6 remaining in this subdivision in the first year  
8.7 for grants to the Minnesota Assistance Council  
8.8 for Veterans does not cancel and is available  
8.9 for the second year. Assistance authorized  
8.10 under this paragraph must be provided only  
8.11 to a veteran who has resided in Minnesota for  
8.12 30 days prior to the veteran's application for  
8.13 assistance and according to other guidelines  
8.14 established by the commissioner. To avoid  
8.15 duplication of services, the commissioner must  
8.16 ensure that this assistance is coordinated with  
8.17 all other available programs for veterans.

8.18 **(o) Veterans Bonus Program. \$15,000,000**  
8.19 the first year is for service bonuses to  
8.20 Post-9/11 Veterans and Gold Star families  
8.21 under Minnesota Statutes, section 197.79. This  
8.22 is a onetime appropriation and is available  
8.23 until June 30, 2024.

8.24 **(p) Metro Meals on Wheels. \$540,000 each**  
8.25 year is for a grant to Metro Meals on Wheels  
8.26 to provide: (1) home-delivered meals to  
8.27 veterans; and (2) technical, enrollment,  
8.28 outreach, and volunteer recruitment assistance  
8.29 to member programs. Metro Meals on Wheels  
8.30 must report to the commissioner of veterans  
8.31 affairs and the chairs and ranking minority  
8.32 members of the legislative committees with  
8.33 jurisdiction over veterans affairs policy and  
8.34 finance by September 1 each year with a  
8.35 detailed explanation of how the grant money



9.1 was used and the number of veterans and  
9.2 service members served by the program. This  
9.3 is a onetime appropriation.

9.4 **(q) Minnesota Military and Veterans**  
9.5 **Museum.** \$225,000 the second year is for a  
9.6 grant to the Minnesota Military and Veterans  
9.7 Museum for museum staff to provide direct  
9.8 services to veterans and their families. The  
9.9 base for this appropriation is \$300,000 in fiscal  
9.10 year 2026 and each fiscal year thereafter.

9.11 **(r) Every Third Saturday.** \$100,000 each  
9.12 year is for a grant to Every Third Saturday to  
9.13 provide veterans with emergency assistance  
9.14 and internships. Every Third Saturday must  
9.15 report to the commissioner of veterans affairs  
9.16 and the chairs and ranking minority members  
9.17 of the legislative committees with jurisdiction  
9.18 over veterans affairs policy and finance no  
9.19 later than September 1, 2024, and by  
9.20 September 1 of each subsequent year. Each  
9.21 report must include, at a minimum, a detailed  
9.22 explanation of how the grant money was used  
9.23 and the number of veterans served by the  
9.24 program. These are onetime appropriations.

9.25 **(s) Veteran Homelessness Initiative.**  
9.26 \$4,311,000 the first year and \$1,311,000 the  
9.27 second year are for an initiative to prevent and  
9.28 end veteran homelessness.

9.29 **(t) Veterans Campground Wastewater**  
9.30 **System Upgrades.** \$744,000 the first year is  
9.31 for one or more grants to the Veterans  
9.32 Campground on Big Marine Lake, a 501(c)(3)  
9.33 nonprofit organization, to design, engineer,  
9.34 permit, and construct wastewater systems on  
9.35 campground property to increase the capacity

10.1 of wastewater systems. This is a onetime  
10.2 appropriation.

10.3 Subd. 3. Veterans Health Care 90,025,000 100,797,000

10.4 (a) The base for this appropriation in fiscal  
10.5 year 2026 is \$93,387,000 and \$94,435,000 in  
10.6 fiscal year 2027 and each fiscal year thereafter.

10.7 (b) \$88,885,000 the first year and \$99,847,000  
10.8 the second year may be transferred to a  
10.9 veterans homes special revenue account in the  
10.10 special revenue fund in the same manner as  
10.11 other receipts are deposited according to  
10.12 Minnesota Statutes, section 198.34, and are  
10.13 appropriated to the commissioner of veterans  
10.14 affairs for the operation of veterans homes  
10.15 facilities and programs. The base for this  
10.16 transfer is \$92,437,000 in fiscal year 2026 and  
10.17 \$93,485,000 in fiscal year 2027.

10.18 (c) The department shall seek opportunities to  
10.19 maximize federal reimbursements of  
10.20 Medicare-eligible expenses and provide annual  
10.21 reports to the commissioner of management  
10.22 and budget on the federal Medicare  
10.23 reimbursements that are received. Contingent  
10.24 upon future federal Medicare receipts,  
10.25 reductions to the veterans homes' general fund  
10.26 appropriation may be made.

10.27 (d) \$400,000 each year is for the department  
10.28 to staff Veteran Community Health Navigators  
10.29 in community-based hospitals.

10.30 (e) \$190,000 the first year is for the working  
10.31 group established under article 2, section 8.

11.1 Sec. 4. CANCELLATION; FISCAL YEAR 2023.

11.2 (a) \$3,000,000 of the fiscal year 2023 general fund appropriation under Laws 2021, First  
11.3 Special Session chapter 12, article 1, section 37, subdivision 2, paragraph (i), is canceled  
11.4 to the general fund by June 30, 2023.

11.5 (b) \$744,000 of the fiscal year 2023 general fund appropriation under Laws 2022, chapter  
11.6 54, article 1, section 3, subdivision 2, paragraph (k), is canceled to the general fund by June  
11.7 30, 2023.

11.8 EFFECTIVE DATE. This section is effective the day following final enactment.

11.9 **ARTICLE 2**  
11.10 **VETERANS AFFAIRS STATUTORY CHANGES**

11.11 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 197.79, subdivision 1, is amended to read:

11.12 Subdivision 1. **Definitions.** For purposes of this section, the following terms have the  
11.13 meanings given them.

11.14 (a) "Applicant" means a veteran or a veteran's guardian, conservator, or personal  
11.15 representative or a beneficiary or a beneficiary's guardian, conservator, or personal  
11.16 representative who has filed an application with the commissioner for a bonus under this  
11.17 section.

11.18 (b) "Application" means a request for a bonus payment by a veteran, a veteran's  
11.19 beneficiary, or a veteran's guardian, conservator, or personal representative through  
11.20 submission of written information on a form designed by the commissioner for this purpose.

11.21 (c) "Beneficiary" means in relation to a deceased veteran and in the order named:

11.22 (1) the surviving spouse, if not remarried;

11.23 (2) the children of the veteran, if there is no surviving spouse or the surviving spouse  
11.24 has remarried;

11.25 (3) the veteran's surviving parent or parents;

11.26 (4) the veteran's surviving sibling or siblings; or

11.27 (5) the veteran's estate.

11.28 (d) "Commissioner" means the commissioner of the Department of Veterans Affairs.

11.29 (e) "Department" means the Department of Veterans Affairs.

12.1 (f) "Eligibility period for the bonus" means the period from September 11, 2001, to  
12.2 August 30, 2021.

12.3 (g) "Guardian" or "conservator" means the legally appointed representative of a minor  
12.4 or incapacitated beneficiary or veteran, the chief officer of a hospital or institution in which  
12.5 the incapacitated veteran is placed if the officer is authorized to accept money for the benefit  
12.6 of the minor or incapacitated veteran, the person determined by the commissioner to be the  
12.7 person who is legally charged with the responsibility for the care of the minor or incapacitated  
12.8 beneficiary or veteran, or the person determined by the commissioner to be the person who  
12.9 has assumed the responsibility for the care of the minor or incapacitated beneficiary or  
12.10 veteran.

12.11 (h) "Honorable service" means honorable federal service in the United States armed  
12.12 forces, as evidenced by:

12.13 (1) an honorable discharge;

12.14 (2) a general discharge under honorable conditions;

12.15 (3) in the case of an officer, a certificate of honorable service; or

12.16 (4) in the case of an applicant who is currently serving in active duty in the United States  
12.17 armed forces, a certificate from an appropriate service authority that the applicant's service  
12.18 to date has been honorable.

12.19 (i) "Incapacitated person" means an individual who, for reasons other than being a minor,  
12.20 lacks sufficient understanding or the capacity to make personal decisions and who is unable  
12.21 to meet the individual's own personal needs for medical care, nutrition, clothing, shelter, or  
12.22 safety even when assisted by appropriate technology or supported decision making.

12.23 (j) "Resident veteran" means a veteran who served in active duty in the United States  
12.24 armed forces at any time during the eligibility period for the bonus, and who also:

12.25 (1) has been separated or discharged from the United States armed forces, ~~and whose~~  
12.26 ~~home of record at the time of entry into active duty in the United States armed forces, as~~  
12.27 ~~indicated on the person's form DD-214 or other documents the commissioner may authorize,~~  
12.28 ~~is the state of Minnesota and who~~ resides in Minnesota at the time of application with the  
12.29 intention of residing in the state and not for any temporary purpose. An applicant may verify  
12.30 a residence address by presenting a valid state driver's license; a state identification card; a  
12.31 voter registration card; a rent receipt; a statement by the landlord, apartment manager, or  
12.32 homeowner verifying that the individual is residing at the address; or other form of  
12.33 verification approved by the commissioner; or

13.1 (2) is currently serving in the United States armed forces, and has a certificate from an  
13.2 appropriate service authority stating that the person: (i) served in active duty in the United  
13.3 States armed forces at any time during the eligibility period for the bonus; and (ii) has  
13.4 Minnesota listed as the veteran's home of record in the veteran's official military personnel  
13.5 file.

13.6 (k) "Service connected" means caused by an injury or disease incurred or aggravated  
13.7 while on active duty, as determined by the United States Department of Veterans Affairs.

13.8 (l) "Veteran" has the meaning given in section 197.447 and does not include a member  
13.9 of the National Guard or the reserve components of the United States armed forces ordered  
13.10 to active duty for the sole purpose of training. Veteran also includes a person who is providing  
13.11 honorable service on active duty in the United States armed forces and has not been separated  
13.12 or discharged.

13.13 Sec. 2. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 197.79, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

13.14 Subd. 2. **Bonus amount.** (a) For a resident veteran who provided honorable service in  
13.15 the United States armed forces at any time during the eligibility period for the bonus, the  
13.16 bonus amount is:

13.17 (1) \$600, if the veteran did not receive the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Global  
13.18 War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, ~~or~~ Afghanistan Campaign  
13.19 Medal, or Inherent Resolve Campaign Medal during the eligibility period for the bonus;

13.20 (2) \$1200, if the veteran received the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Global War  
13.21 on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, ~~or~~ Afghanistan Campaign Medal,  
13.22 or Inherent Resolve Campaign Medal during the eligibility period for the bonus; or

13.23 (3) \$2,000, if the veteran was eligible for the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Global  
13.24 War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal, ~~or~~ Afghanistan Campaign  
13.25 Medal, or Inherent Resolve Campaign Medal during the eligibility period for the bonus,  
13.26 and died during that time period as a direct result of a service connected injury, disease, or  
13.27 condition.

13.28 (b) In the case of a deceased veteran, the commissioner shall pay the bonus to the veteran's  
13.29 beneficiary.

14.1 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 197.79, is amended by adding a subdivision to  
14.2 read:

14.3 Subd. 11. **Reapplication allowed.** Notwithstanding any law to the contrary, an eligible  
14.4 veteran who previously applied for a bonus under this section may reapply if the veteran  
14.5 either was denied a bonus or is entitled to receive a larger bonus than was originally awarded  
14.6 based on the amendments to this section contained in this act.

14.7 **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective the day following final enactment.

14.8 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 197.791, subdivision 5, is amended to read:

14.9 Subd. 5. **Educational assistance.** (a) On approval by the commissioner of eligibility  
14.10 for the program, the applicant shall be awarded, on a funds-available basis, the educational  
14.11 assistance under the program for use at any time according to program rules at any eligible  
14.12 institution.

14.13 (b) The amount of educational assistance in any semester or term for an eligible person  
14.14 must be determined by subtracting from the eligible person's cost of attendance the amount  
14.15 the person received or was eligible to receive in that semester or term from:

14.16 (1) the federal Pell Grant;

14.17 (2) the state grant program under section 136A.121; and

14.18 (3) any federal military or veterans educational benefits including but not limited to the  
14.19 Montgomery GI Bill, GI Bill Kicker, the federal tuition assistance program, vocational  
14.20 rehabilitation benefits, and any other federal benefits associated with the person's status as  
14.21 a veteran, except veterans disability payments from the United States Department of Veterans  
14.22 Affairs.

14.23 (c) The amount of educational assistance for any eligible person who is a ~~full-time~~  
14.24 student must not exceed the following:
