3.27 (a) The Minnesota Housing Finance Agency in collaboration with the Chicano Latino

3.28 Affairs Council, Council on Asian-Pacific Minnesotans, Council on Black Minnesotans,

- 3.29 and Minnesota Indian Affairs Council shall establish the Housing Opportunities Made
- 3.30 Equitable (HOME) pilot project to support closing the disparity gap in affordable
- 3.31 homeownership for all communities of color and American Indians in Minnesota and
- 3.32 increase housing opportunities for specific groups while closing the disparity gap that
- 3.33 exists in Minnesota. Nothing in this section shall interfere with the agency's ability to meet
- 3.34 <u>obligations to bondholders or violate Minnesota Statutes, section 462A.15.</u>

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4.1	(b) With the funds available to the Minnesota Housing Finance Agency, the
4.2	commissioner may support the capacity of several local community nonprofit housing and
4.3	service providers to administer the HOME pilot project under this section. The Minnesota
4.4	Housing Finance Agency shall choose providers that have proven track records of assisting
4.5	culturally diverse groups of people with long-term education services and wraparound
4.6	services that have historically resulted in sustainable affordable housing opportunities for
4.7	culturally diverse groups. The pilot project may also support the redevelopment and
4.8	rebuilding of challenged neighborhoods affected by foreclosure crisis.
4.9	(c) A portion of funds must be awarded to providers to assist families to attain
4.10	sustainable affordable homeownership. Assistance may include long-term financial
4.11	education, training, case management, credit mending, homebuyer education, foreclosure
4.12	prevention mitigation services, and supporting wraparound services.
4.13	(d) A portion of funds must be used to develop and administer loans to assist families
4.14	with credit financing who cannot use conventional financing due to cultural or religious
4.15	beliefs that will be originated by the qualified providers. A qualified provider is a provider
4.16	that has a proven track record of assisting culturally diverse groups of people in obtaining
4.17	sustainable affordable homeownership and that, at a minimum, is in good standing with
4.18	the Minnesota Department of Commerce, is licensed to originate mortgage loans, and has
4.19	demonstrated an ability to underwrite to HFA or conventional underwriting guidelines.
4.20	Qualified providers may be paid an origination fee, service release premium and a standard
4.21	fee set in order to expand capacity to assist more families with purchasing a home.
