1.10	Subdivision 1. Definitions. (a) For the purposes of this section, the following terms have

1.12	(b) "Qualified small business" means a business that has been certified by the
1.13	commissioner under subdivision 2.
1.14	(c) "Qualified investor" means an investor who has been certified by the commissioner

(d) In order for a qualified investment in a qualified small business to be eligible for tax
credits, a qualified investor who makes the investment must have applied for and received
certification for the calendar year prior to making the qualified investment, except in the
case of an investor who is not an accredited investor, within the meaning of Regulation D
of the Securities and Exchange Commission, Code of Federal Regulations, title 17, section
230.501, paragraph (a), application for certification may be made within 30 days after
making the qualified investment.

(d) Applications for tax credits for 2010 must be made available on the department's
 website by September 1, 2010, and the department must begin accepting applications by
 September 1, 2010. (f) Applications for subsequent years must be made available on the
 department's website by November 1 of the preceding year preceding the year for which a
 business is applying for certification.

(e) (g) Qualified investors and qualified funds must apply to the commissioner for tax 10.20 credits. Tax credits must be allocated to qualified investors or qualified funds in the order 10.21 that the tax credit request applications are filed with the department. The commissioner 10.22 must approve or reject tax credit request applications within 15 days of receiving the 10.23 application. The investment specified in the application must be made within 60 days of 10.24 the allocation of the credits. If the investment is not made within 60 days, the credit allocation 10.25 is canceled and available for reallocation.  lesser amount of credits that remain unallocated on that day, then the credits must be allocated

116J.8737 SMALL BUSINESS INVESTMENT TAX CREDIT.

Subd. 12. **Sunset.** This section expires for taxable years beginning after December 31, 2017, except that reporting requirements under subdivision 6 and revocation of credits under subdivision 7 remain in effect through 2019 for qualified investors and qualified funds, and through 2021 for qualified small businesses, reporting requirements under subdivision 9 remain in effect through 2022, and the appropriation in subdivision 11 remains in effect through 2021.
