1.8	Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2022, section 123B.595, subdivision 4, is amended to read:
1.9	Subd. 4. Facilities plans. (a) To qualify for revenue under this section, a school district
1.10	or intermediate district, not including a charter school, must have a ten-year facility plan
1.11	adopted by the school board and approved by the commissioner. The plan must include
1.12	provisions for implementing a health and safety program that complies with health, safety,
1.13	and environmental regulations and best practices, including indoor air quality management
1.14	and remediation of lead hazards.
1.15	(b) The facilities plan must also include a safe schools plan for each school site identifying
1.16	physical modifications to improve student and staff safety at the school site.
1.17	(b) (c) The district must annually update the plan, submit the plan to the commissioner
1.18	for approval by July 31, and indicate whether the district will issue bonds to finance the
1.19	plan or levy for the costs.
1.20	(e) (d) For school districts issuing bonds to finance the plan, the plan must include a
1.21	debt service schedule demonstrating that the debt service revenue required to pay the principal

**EFFECTIVE DATE.** This section is effective for plans submitted to the commissioner 2.1 2.2 on or after August 1, 2023. Sec. 2. APPROPRIATION; SCHOOL SECURITY GRANTS. 2.3 (a) \$100,000,000 in fiscal year 2024 is appropriated from the general fund to the 2.4 Department of Public Safety for the Office of Justice Programs, in consultation with the 2.5 Minnesota School Safety Center, to issue school security grants to school districts and 2.6 charter schools. 2.7 (b) A school district or charter school may apply for a grant in the form and manner 2.8 specified by the Office of Justice Programs. The Office of Justice Programs may establish 2.9 application timelines for the award of grants and may award grants in more than one round. 2.10 Applications for the last round of grants must be received by the Office of Justice Programs 2.11 no later than August 1, 2024. 2.12 (c) Grants may be awarded in an amount not to exceed \$300,000 per district. The grants 2.13 must be awarded to schools located in all geographic regions of the state and priority must 2.14 be given to facilities serving the largest number of students within that geographic region. 2.15 2.16 (d) The Minnesota School Safety Center must prepare a list of vendors authorized to provide the security services and products listed in this paragraph. medical services, and law enforcement personnel;

(7) an access control system with remote door-release capabilities;

3.15	(g) By February 15 following each year a grant is awarded under this section, the
3.16	Minnesota School Safety Center, Office of Justice Programs, and Department of Public

3.18	with jurisdiction over kindergarten through grade 12 education on the number and amoun
3.19	of grant awards, a description of each grant recipient's purchased items and vendors

3.22	(h) This is a onetime appropriation. This appropriation does not cancel but is available
3.23	until June 30, 2026.

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
