1.13 Section 1. Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 13.02, is amended by adding a subdivision

1.15 Subd. 1a. **Chief administrative law judge.** "Chief administrative law judge" means the

1.16 chief administrative law judge of the state Office of Administrative Hearings.

1.17 Sec. 2. [13.071] **DATA PRACTICES COORDINATOR.**

1.18 Subdivision 1. **Appointment.** The chief administrative law judge shall appoint a data

1.19 practices coordinator in the unclassified service within the Office of Administrative Hearings.

1.20 Subd. 2. **Qualifications.** The coordinator must be knowledgeable about the Minnesota

1.21 Government Data Practices Act, the Minnesota Open Meeting Law, and federal laws and

1.22 regulations regarding data privacy. The coordinator must have experience in dealing with

1.23 both private enterprise and governmental entities, interpreting laws and regulations, record

1.24 keeping, report writing, public speaking, and management.

1.25 Subd. 3. **Duties.** The coordinator shall:

2.1 (1) advise and serve as a technical resource for government entities on questions related  
2.2 to public access to government data, rights of subjects of data, classification of data, or  
2.3 applicable duties under chapter 13D;

2.4 (2) advise persons regarding their rights under this chapter or chapter 13D;

2.5 (3) administer the public information policy training program under section 13.073; and

2.6 (4) perform other duties as directed by the chief administrative law judge.

2.7 Subd. 4. **Effect of coordinator advice.** The advice of the coordinator is not binding on  
2.8 a government entity or members of a body subject to chapter 13D, does not constitute legal  
2.9 advice, and has no effect on liability, fines, or fee awards arising from a violation of this  
2.10 chapter or chapter 13D. This section does not preclude a person from bringing any other  
2.11 action under this chapter or other law in addition to or instead of requesting advice from  
2.12 the coordinator.

2.13 Subd. 5. **Data submitted to coordinator.** A government entity may submit not public  
2.14 data to the coordinator for the purpose of requesting advice. Government data submitted to  
2.15 the coordinator by a government entity or copies of government data submitted by other  
2.16 persons have the same classification as the data have when held by the government entity.

2.17 Sec. 3. Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 13.08, subdivision 4, is amended to read:

2.18 Subd. 4. **Action to compel compliance.** (a) Actions to compel compliance may be  
2.19 brought either under this subdivision or section 13.085. For actions under this subdivision,  
2.20 in addition to the remedies provided in subdivisions 1 to 3 or any other law, any aggrieved  
2.21 person seeking to enforce the person's rights under this chapter or obtain access to data may  
2.22 bring an action in district court to compel compliance with this chapter and may recover  
2.23 costs and disbursements, including reasonable attorney's fees, as determined by the court.  
2.24 If the court determines that an action brought under this subdivision is frivolous and without  
2.25 merit and a basis in fact, it may award reasonable costs and attorney fees to the responsible  
2.26 authority. If the court issues an order to compel compliance under this subdivision, the court  
2.27 may impose a civil penalty of up to \$1,000 against the government entity. This penalty is  
2.28 payable to the state general fund and is in addition to damages under subdivision 1. The  
2.29 matter shall be heard as soon as possible. In an action involving a request for government  
2.30 data under section 13.03 or 13.04, the court may inspect in camera the government data in  
2.31 dispute, but shall conduct its hearing in public and in a manner that protects the security of  
2.32 data classified as not public. If the court issues an order to compel compliance under this  
2.33 subdivision, the court shall forward a copy of the order to the commissioner of administration.

3.1 (b) In determining whether to assess a civil penalty under this subdivision, the court or  
3.2 other tribunal shall consider whether the government entity has substantially complied with  
3.3 general data practices under this chapter, including but not limited to, whether the government  
3.4 entity has:

3.5 (1) designated a responsible authority under section 13.02, subdivision 16;

3.6 (2) designated a data practices compliance official under section 13.05, subdivision 13;

3.7 (3) prepared the data inventory that names the responsible authority and describes the  
3.8 records and data on individuals that are maintained by the government entity under section  
3.9 13.025, subdivision 1;

3.10 (4) developed public access procedures under section 13.03, subdivision 2; procedures  
3.11 to guarantee the rights of data subjects under section 13.025, subdivision 3; and procedures  
3.12 to ensure that data on individuals are accurate and complete and to safeguard the data's  
3.13 security under section 13.05, subdivision 5;

3.14 (5) acted in conformity with ~~an opinion issued under section 13.072 that was sought by~~  
3.15 ~~a government entity or another person~~ a previously issued advisory opinion of the  
3.16 commissioner of administration or a prior decision of the office; or

3.17 (6) provided ongoing training to government entity personnel who respond to requests  
3.18 under this chapter.

3.19 (c) The court shall award reasonable attorney fees to a prevailing plaintiff who has  
3.20 brought an action under this subdivision if the government entity that is the defendant in  
3.21 the action was also the subject of a ~~written opinion issued under section 13.072~~ previously  
3.22 issued advisory opinion of the commissioner of administration or a prior decision of the  
3.23 office and the court finds that the opinion or decision is directly related to the cause of action  
3.24 being litigated and that the government entity did not act in conformity with the opinion or  
3.25 decision.

3.26 Sec. 4. Minnesota Statutes 2016, section 13.085, subdivision 2, is amended to read:

3.27 Subd. 2. **Complaints.** (a) A complaint alleging a violation of this chapter for which an  
3.28 order to compel compliance is requested may be filed with the office. An action to compel  
3.29 compliance does not include procedures pursuant to section 13.04, subdivision 4 or 4a.

3.30 (b) The complaint must be filed with the office within two years after the occurrence of  
3.31 the act or failure to act that is the subject of the complaint, except that if the act or failure  
3.32 to act involves concealment or misrepresentation by the government entity that could not

4.1 be discovered during that period, the complaint may be filed with the office within one year  
4.2 after the concealment or misrepresentation is discovered.

4.3 (c) The complaint must be made in writing, submitted under oath, and detail the factual  
4.4 basis for the claim that a violation of law has occurred. The office may prescribe a standard  
4.5 form for the complaint. ~~The complaint must be accompanied by a filing fee of \$1,000 or a~~  
4.6 ~~bond to guarantee the payment of this fee.~~ The office may not charge a filing fee for the  
4.7 complaint.

4.8 (d) Upon receipt of a filed complaint, the office must immediately notify the respondent  
4.9 and, if known, the applicable responsible authority for the government entity, if the  
4.10 responsible authority is not otherwise named as the respondent. The office must provide  
4.11 the respondent with a copy of the complaint by the most expeditious means available. Notice  
4.12 to a responsible authority must be delivered by certified mail. The office must also notify,  
4.13 to the extent practicable, any individual or entity that is the subject of all or part of the data  
4.14 in dispute.

5.20 or awards of attorney fees for acting in conformity with that order in actions under this  
5.21 section or section 13.08, or for a penalty under section 13.09.

6.22 in a decision must be redacted prior to public dissemination.

11.26 (a) Responsibilities of the commissioner of administration under Minnesota Statutes,  
11.27 sections 13.06, 13.07, and 13.073, and any other law providing general oversight  
11.28 responsibilities related to operation of the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act and  
11.29 the Minnesota Open Meeting Law, are transferred from the commissioner to the chief  
11.30 administrative law judge in the Office of Administrative Hearings. Minnesota Statutes,  
11.31 section 15.039, applies to the transfer of these responsibilities. The commissioner may, with

Subdivision 1. **Opinion; when required.** (a) Upon request of a government entity, the commissioner may give a written opinion on any question relating to public access to government data, rights of subjects of data, or classification of data under this chapter or other Minnesota statutes governing government data practices. Upon request of any person who disagrees with a determination regarding data practices made by a government entity, the commissioner may give a written opinion regarding the person's rights as a subject of government data or right to have access to government data.

(b) Upon request of a body subject to chapter 13D, the commissioner may give a written opinion on any question relating to the body's duties under chapter 13D. Upon request of a person who disagrees with the manner in which members of a governing body perform their duties under chapter 13D, the commissioner may give a written opinion on compliance with chapter 13D. A governing body or person requesting an opinion under this paragraph must pay the commissioner a fee of \$200. Money received by the commissioner under this paragraph is appropriated to the commissioner for the purposes of this section.

(c) If the commissioner determines that no opinion will be issued, the commissioner shall give the government entity or body subject to chapter 13D or person requesting the opinion notice of the decision not to issue the opinion within five business days of receipt of the request. If this notice is not given, the commissioner shall issue an opinion within 20 days of receipt of the request.

(d) For good cause and upon written notice to the person requesting the opinion, the commissioner may extend this deadline for one additional 30-day period. The notice must state the reason for extending the deadline. The government entity or the members of a body subject to chapter 13D must be provided a reasonable opportunity to explain the reasons for its decision regarding the data or how they perform their duties under chapter 13D. The commissioner or the government entity or body subject to chapter 13D may choose to give notice to the subject of the data concerning the dispute regarding the data or compliance with chapter 13D.

(e) This section does not apply to a determination made by the commissioner of health under section 13.3805, subdivision 1, paragraph (b), or 144.6581.

(f) A written, numbered, and published opinion issued by the attorney general shall take precedence over an opinion issued by the commissioner under this section.

Subd. 2. **Effect.** Opinions issued by the commissioner under this section are not binding on the government entity or members of a body subject to chapter 13D whose data or performance of duties is the subject of the opinion, but an opinion described in subdivision 1, paragraph (a), must be given deference by a court or other tribunal in a proceeding involving the data. The commissioner shall arrange for public dissemination of opinions issued under this section, and shall indicate when the principles stated in an opinion are not intended to provide guidance to all similarly situated persons or government entities. This section does not preclude a person from bringing any other action under this chapter or other law in addition to or instead of requesting a written opinion. A government entity, members of a body subject to chapter 13D, or person that acts in conformity with a written opinion of the commissioner issued to the government entity, members, or person or to another party is not liable for compensatory or exemplary damages or awards of attorneys fees in actions for violations arising under section 13.08 or 13.085, or for a penalty under section 13.09 or for fines, awards of attorney fees, or any other penalty under chapter 13D. A member of a body subject to chapter 13D is not subject to forfeiture of office if the member was acting in reliance on an opinion.

Subd. 4. **Data submitted to commissioner.** A government entity may submit not public data to the commissioner for the purpose of requesting or responding to a person's request for an opinion. Government data submitted to the commissioner by a government entity or copies of government data submitted by other persons have the same classification as the data have when held by the government entity. If the nature of the opinion is such that the release of the opinion would reveal not public data, the commissioner may issue an opinion using pseudonyms for individuals. Data maintained by the commissioner, in the record of an opinion issued using pseudonyms that would

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reveal the identities of individuals protected by the use of the pseudonyms, are private data on individuals.

**13.085 ADMINISTRATIVE REMEDY.**

Subd. 7. **Special account; appropriation.** Proceeds collected by the office from filing fees and bonds submitted under this section shall be deposited into the administrative hearings account established under section 14.54 and are appropriated to the office for use in administering the requirements of this section. By September 1 each year, the chief administrative law judge must report to the chairs and ranking minority members of the legislative committees and divisions with jurisdiction over the office on receipt and expenditure of money under this section in the preceding fiscal year.
