1.19	(b) \$8,425,000 in the first year and \$1,425,000

up to five percent is for administration and
monitoring of the business development
competitive grant program and \$7,000,000 in

businesses. Funding for technical assistance
to small businesses in the second year shall
be divided proportionately between program
grantees from the first year. Except for awards
for technical assistance for small businesses,
all grant awards shall be for two consecutive
years. Grants and shall be awarded in the first
year. The small business partnership grant
program shall also provide business
development assistance and services to
commercial cooperatives, employee-owned
businesses, and commercial land trusts.
(c) \$1,772,000 each year is for contaminated
site cleanup and development grants under
Minnesota Statutes, sections 116J.551 to
116J.558. This appropriation is available until
expended.
(d) \$700,000 each year is from the remediation
fund for contaminated site cleanup and
development grants under Minnesota Statutes,
sections 116J.551 to 116J.558. This
appropriation is available until expended.
(e) \$139,000 each year is for the Center for
Rural Policy and Development.
(f) \$25,000 each year is for the administration
of state aid for the Destination Medical Center
under Minnesota Statutes, sections 469.40 to
469.47.

(g) \$875,000 each year is for the host 3.1 community economic development program 3.2 established in Minnesota Statutes, section 3.3 116J.548. 3.4 (h)(1) \$2,500,000 each year is for grants to 3.5 local communities to increase the number of 3.6 quality child care providers to support 3.7 economic development. This appropriation is 3.8 available through June 30, 2023. Fifty percent 3.9 of grant funds must go to communities located 3.10 outside the seven-county metropolitan area as 3.11 defined in Minnesota Statutes, section 3.12 473.121, subdivision 2. In fiscal year 2024 3.13 and beyond, the base amount is \$1,500,000. 3.14 (2) Grant recipients must obtain a 50 percent 3.15 nonstate match to grant funds in either cash 3.16 or in-kind contribution, unless the 3.17 commissioner waives the requirement. Grant 3.18 funds available under this subdivision must 3.19 be used to implement projects to reduce the 3.20 child care shortage in the state, including but 3.21 not limited to funding for child care business 3.22 start-ups or expansion, training, facility 3.23 modifications, direct subsidies or incentives 3.24 to retain employees, or improvements required 3.25 for licensing, and assistance with licensing 3.26 and other regulatory requirements. In awarding 3.27 grants, the commissioner must give priority 3.28 3.29 to communities that have demonstrated a shortage of child care providers. 3.30 (3) Within one year of receiving grant funds, 3.31 grant recipients must report to the 3.32 commissioner on the outcomes of the grant 3.33 program, including but not limited to the 3.34 number of new providers, the number of 3.35

4.5	recipients reporting on program outcomes, the

4.11	(i) \$1,500,000 each year is for a grant to the
4.12	Minnesota Initiative Foundations. This
4.13	appropriation is available until June 30, 2025.
4.14	In fiscal year 2024 and beyond, the base
4.15	amount is \$1,000,000. The Minnesota
4.16	Initiative Foundations must use grant funds
4.17	under this section to:
4.18	(1) facilitate planning processes for rural
4.19	communities resulting in a community solution
4.20	action plan that guides decision making to
4.21	sustain and increase the supply of quality child
4.22	care in the region to support economic
4.23	development;
4.24	(2) engage the private sector to invest local

5.19	commissioner of employment and economic
5.20	development may use up to three percent for
5.21	administrative expenses. This appropriation
5.22	is available until expended.
5.23	(k) \$10,029,000 the first year and \$10,028,000
5.24	the second year are for the Minnesota
5.25	investment fund under Minnesota Statutes,
5.26	section 116J.8731. Of this amount, the
5.27	commissioner of employment and economic
5.28	development may use up to three percent for
5.29	administration and monitoring of the program.
5.30	In fiscal year 2024 and beyond, the base
5.31	amount is \$12,370,000. This appropriation is
5.32	available until expended. Notwithstanding
5.33	Minnesota Statutes, section 116J.8731, money
5.34	appropriated to the commissioner for the
5.35	Minnesota investment fund may be used for

6.18	available until expended. Of this amount, up
6.19	to four percent is for administration and
6.20	monitoring of the program.
6.21	(n) \$325,000 each year is for the Minnesota
6.22	Film and TV Board. The appropriation in each
6.23	year is available only upon receipt by the
6.24	board of \$1 in matching contributions of
6.25	money or in-kind contributions from nonstate
6.26	sources for every \$3 provided by this
6.27	appropriation, except that each year up to
6.28	\$50,000 is available on July 1 even if the
6.29	required matching contribution has not been
6.30	received by that date.
