1.11	Subd. 3. Postelection sampling. (a) Within ten days after an election, the county auditor
1.12	shall send the notice required by subdivision 2 to a random sampling of the individuals
1.13	registered on election day. The random sampling shall be determined in accordance with
1.14	the rules of the secretary of state. As soon as practicable after the election, the county auditor
1.15	shall mail the notice required by subdivision 2 to all other individuals registered on election
1.16	day. If a notice is returned as not deliverable, the county auditor shall attempt to determine
1.17	the reason for the return. A county auditor who does not receive or obtain satisfactory proof

204B.46 MAIL ELECTIONS; QUESTIONS.

A county, municipality, or school district submitting questions to the voters at a special 4.29 election may conduct an election by mail with no polling place other than the office of the 4.30 auditor or clerk. No offices may be voted on at a mail election-, except in overlapping school 4.31 and municipality jurisdictions, where a mail election may include an office when one of the 4.32 jurisdictions also has a question on the ballot. Notice of the election must be given to the 4.33

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county auditor at least 74 days prior to the election. This notice shall also fulfill the 5.1 requirements of Minnesota Rules, part 8210.3000. The special mail ballot procedures must 5.2 be posted at least six weeks prior to the election. Not more than 46 nor later than 14 days 5.3 prior to the election, the auditor or clerk shall mail ballots by nonforwardable mail to all 5.4 voters registered in the county, municipality, or school district. No later than 14 days before 5.5 the election, the auditor or clerk must make a subsequent mailing of ballots to those voters 5.6 who register to vote after the initial mailing but before the 20th day before the election. 5.7 Eligible voters not registered at the time the ballots are mailed may apply for ballots pursuant 5.8 to chapter 203B. The auditor or clerk must appoint a ballot board to examine the mail and 5.9 absentee ballot return envelopes and mark them "Accepted" or "Rejected" within three days 5.10 of receipt if there are 14 or fewer days before election day, or within five days of receipt if 5.11 there are more than 14 days before election day. The board may consist of deputy county 5.12 auditors, deputy municipal clerks, or deputy school district clerks who have received training 5.13 in the processing and counting of mail ballots, who need not be affiliated with a major 5.14 political party. Election judges performing the duties in this section must be of different 5.15 major political parties, unless they are exempt from that requirement under section 205.075, 5.16 subdivision 4, or section 205A.10. If an envelope has been rejected at least five days before 5.17 the election, the ballots in the envelope must remain sealed and the auditor or clerk must 5.18 provide the voter with a replacement ballot and return envelope in place of the spoiled ballot. 5.19 If the ballot is rejected within five days of the election, the envelope must remain sealed 5.20 and the official in charge of the ballot board must attempt to contact the voter by telephone 5.21 or e-mail to notify the voter that the voter's ballot has been rejected. The official must 5.22 document the attempts made to contact the voter. 5.23

If the ballot is accepted, the county auditor or municipal clerk must mark the roster to
indicate that the voter has already cast a ballot in that election. After the close of business
on the seventh day before the election, the ballots from return envelopes marked "Accepted"
may be opened, duplicated as needed in the manner provided by section 206.86, subdivision
5, initialed by the ballot board, and deposited in the appropriate ballot box.

5.29 In all other respects, the provisions of the Minnesota Election Law governing deposit5.30 and counting of ballots apply.

5.31 The mail and absentee ballots for a precinct must be counted together and reported as
5.32 one vote total. No vote totals from ballots may be made public before the close of voting
5.33 on election day.

Subdivision 1. Method. The election judges shall take all the ballots of the same kind 62 and count the votes cast for each office or question, beginning with the first office or question 6.3 on the ballot. They shall make one pile of the ballots for each candidate who received votes 6.4 for that office, or one pile for the "Yes" votes and one pile for the "No" votes on a question. 6.5 They shall make a pile of totally defective ballots and a pile of totally blank ballots. They 6.6 shall make a pile of ballots that are not totally defective but are defective with respect to 6.7 the office or question being counted and a pile of ballots that are not totally blank but are 6.8 blank with respect to the office or question being counted. After the separation into piles, 6.9 the election judges shall examine each pile and remove and place in the proper pile any 6.10 ballots that are found in the wrong pile. The election judges shall count the totally blank 6.11 and totally defective ballots and set them aside until the counting is over for that ballot. In 6.12 conducting the count of blank ballots, election judges may presume that the total count 6.13 provided for prepackaged ballots is correct. The election judges may pile ballots crosswise 6.14 in groups of 25 in the same pile to facilitate counting. When their counts agree, the election 6.15 judges shall announce the number of ballots in each pile, and shall write the number in the 6.16 proper place on the summary statements. 6.17

6.18 The election judges shall then return all the counted ballots, and all the partially defective
6.19 or partially blank ballots, to the original pile to be separated and counted in the same manner
6.20 for the next office or question.

Subdivision 1. Publicly funded recounts. (a) Except as provided in paragraphs (b) and 6.22 (c), a losing candidate for nomination or election to a county, municipal, or school district 6.23 office may request a recount of the votes cast for the nomination or election to that office 6.24 if the difference between the vote cast for that candidate and for a winning candidate for 6.25 nomination or election is less than one-quarter of one percent of the total votes counted for 6.26 that office. In case of offices where two or more seats are being filled from among all the 6.27 6.28 candidates for the office, the one-quarter of one percent difference is between the elected candidate with the fewest votes and the candidate with the most votes from among the 6.29 candidates who were not elected. 6.30

(b) A losing candidate for nomination or election to a county, municipal, or school
district office may request a recount of the votes cast for nomination or election to that
office if the difference between the votes cast for that candidate and for a winning candidate
for nomination or election is less than one-half of one percent, and the total number of votes

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cast for the nomination or election of all candidates is more than 400 but less than 50,000.
In cases of offices where two or more seats are being filled from among all the candidates
for the office, the one-half of one percent difference is between the elected candidate with
the fewest votes and the candidate with the most votes from among the candidates who
were not elected.

(c) A losing candidate for nomination or election to a county, municipal, or school district 7.6 office may request a recount of the votes cast for nomination or election to that office if the 7.7 difference between the vote cast for that candidate and for a winning candidate for nomination 7.8 or election is ten votes or less, and the total number of votes cast for the nomination or 7.9 election of all candidates is no more than 400. In cases of offices where two or more seats 7.10 are being filled from among all the candidates for the office, the ten vote difference is 7.11 between the elected candidate with the fewest votes and the candidate with the most votes 7.12 from among the candidates who were not elected. 7.13

(d) Candidates for county offices shall file a written request for the recount with the
county auditor. Candidates for municipal or school district offices shall file a written request
with the municipal or school district clerk as appropriate. All requests <u>under this paragraph</u>
shall be filed by between the close of the canvass of a primary or special primary and 5:00
p.m. on the fifth day after the canvass of a primary or special primary or by between the
close of the canvass of a special or general election and 5:00 p.m. on the seventh day of the
canvass of a special or general election for which a recount is sought.

(e) Upon receipt of a request made pursuant to this section, the county auditor shall
recount the votes for a county office at the expense of the county, the governing body of
the municipality shall recount the votes for a municipal office at the expense of the
municipality, and the school board of the school district shall recount the votes for a school
district office at the expense of the school district.

four days after the returns of the county canvassing boards are certified to the secretary of

nominated individuals, prepare notices of nomination, and notify each nominee of the
nomination. In case of a contest of a special primary for state senator or state representative,

On optical scan ballots, the names of candidates and the words "yes" and "no" for ballot 8.17 questions must be printed as close to their corresponding vote targets as possible. 8.18 The line on an optical scan ballot for write-in votes must contain the words "write-in, 8.19 if any." 8.20 If a primary ballot contains both a partisan ballot and a nonpartisan ballot, the instructions 8.21 to voters must include a statement that reads substantially as follows: "This ballot card 8.22 contains a partisan ballot and a nonpartisan ballot. On the partisan ballot you are permitted 8.23 to vote for candidates of one political party only." If a primary ballot contains political party 8.24 columns on both sides of the ballot, the instructions to voters must include a statement that 8.25 reads substantially as follows: "Additional political parties are printed on the other side of 8.26 8.27 this ballot. Vote for one political party only." At the bottom of each political party column on the primary ballot, the ballot must contain a statement that reads substantially as follows: 8.28 "Continue voting on the nonpartisan ballot." The instructions in section 204D.08, subdivision 8.29 4, do not apply to optical scan partisan primary ballots. Electronic ballot displays and audio 8.30 ballot readers must follow the order of offices and questions on the optical scan or paper 8.31 8.32 ballot used in the same precinct, or the sample ballot posted for that precinct.
